

# BOISE STATE UNIVERSITY

Boise State is Idaho's metropolitan university, located in the state's population center and capital city, a hub of government, business, the arts, health care, industry and technology. The university offers a variety of undergraduate, graduate and technical programs to serve the diverse needs of the area.

The university offers courses in eight colleges: Applied Technology, Arts and Sciences, Business and Economics, Education, Engineering, Graduate Studies, Health Sciences, and

Social Sciences and Public Affairs.

In addition to its main campus located less than one mile from downtown Boise, the university operates education centers in Canyon County, Mountain Home Air Force Base, Gowen Field and Twin Falls. A new satellite campus — Boise State West in Canyon County — is in the planning stages.

The university delivers classes via the Internet, compressed video, microwave, wireless cable, computer conferencing and radio. The university has an extensive evening program at both the undergraduate and graduate levels, and the summer session is the state's largest.

Boise State is accredited by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges. Several individual programs are accred-

ited by professional accrediting associations.

Through all of its programs, Boise State University is fulfilling its commitment to the citizens of Idaho by providing quality teaching, research and public service.

- 1932 Boise Junior College founded by Episcopal Church.
- 1934 BJC governed by board of directors after Episcopal Church ends affiliation.
- 1940 Campus moved from original location at St. Margaret's Hall to present site.
- 1965 BJC initiated baccaluareate degrees and became Boise College.
- 1969 School moved to state system of higher education and named Boise State College.
- 1974 BSC named Boise State University.

#### FACILITIES

The university is located on a 153-acre main campus that includes 60 buildings. Boise State facilities include the Special Events Center (capacity 435), the Grace Jordan Grand Ballroom in the Student Union (1,000), Bronco Stadium (30,000), Pavilion (12,000), Morrison Center (2,000) and Centennial Amphitheatre (800).

Boise State also operates the Canyon County Center at 2407 Caldwell Boulevard in Nampa, where a variety of applied technology programs and adademic and non-credit courses are offered.

### BROADCAST SERVICES

The Boise State Radio Network includes an FM all-news service, an FM arts and performance service and AM jazz service broadcast through southern and south central Idaho on a network of 20 stations. Studios are located at Boise State and the College of Southern Idaho in Twin Falls.

Boise State's Simplot Micron Instructional Technology Center delivers courses via cable and microwave systems. The Knowledge Network broacasts live interactive for-credit classes throughout the valley and will have a full-time channel on ATT cable beginning in January 2001. The Distance Learning Network connects six southwest Idaho school districts via microwave.

### INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS

Studies abroad sites include Australia, Canada, Chile, China, Costa Rica, Denmark, England, France, Germany, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Malta, Mexico, New Zealand, Norway, Scotland, Spain and Thailand.

Boise State enrolls 237 international students from 55 foreign countries and students from around the world participate in the university's Intensive English Program, which serves as a gateway to other university academic programs.

Boise State continues its partnerships with the National Economics University in Hanoi, Vietnam, by working together on projects to develop higher education in Vietnam and with Asia University by providing English language training to junior college students from Japan.

### OUTREACH

Boise State University serves more than 30,000 people annually through workshops, short courses, apprenticeship training and other non-credit programs. Outreach education is provided by the Division of Extended Studies, Center for Workforce Training, Adult Learning Center, Center for New Directions, Center for Management Development, Idaho Small Business Development Center and Idaho Council on Economic Education. Approximately 800,000 people attend cultural, athletic and entertainment events on campus annually.
