In addition to its main campus less than one mile from downtown Boise, the university operates education centers in Canyon County, Mountain Home Air Force Base, Gowen Field and Twin Falls. A new satellite campus — Boise State-West in Canyon County — is in the construction stages.

The university delivers classes via the Internet, compressed video, microwave, cable, computer conferencing and radio. The university has an extensive evening program at both the undergraduate and graduate levels, and the summer session is the state's largest.

Boise State is accredited by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges. Several individual programs are accredited by professional accrediting associations.

Through all of its programs, Boise State University is fulfilling its commitment to the citizens of Idaho by providing quality teaching, research and public service.

UNIVERSITY HISTORY

1932 — Boise Junior College founded by Episcopal Church.

1934 — BJC governed by board of directors after Episcopal Church ends affiliation.

1940 — Campus moved from original location at St. Margaret's Hall to present site.

1965 — BJC initiated baccalaureate degrees and became Boise College.

1969 — School moved to state system of higher education and named Boise State College.

1974 — BSC named Boise State University.

FACILITIES

The university is located on a 168-acre main campus that includes more than 60 buildings. Boise State facilities include the Special Events Center (capacity 435), the Grace Jordan Grand Ballroom in the Student Union (1,000), Bronco Stadium (30,000), Pavilion (12,000), Morrison Center (2,000) and Centennial Amphitheatre (800).

Most buildings on campus are equipped with wireless connections for laptop computer users.

Boise State also operates the Canyon County Center at 2407 Caldwell Blvd. in Nampa, where a variety of academic, non-credit and applied technology courses are offered.

Construction Projects

Completed in 2003: Children's Center expansion, parking structure II and TECenter business incubator.

Under construction: Two residence halls, apartment complex and Boise State-West classroom building.

In planning: Interactive learning center, student services center and environmental science and policy center.

ALBERTSONS LIBRARY

Library resources include print subscriptions to 4,300 journals and other serials and access to approximately 8,000 additional journals online, 601,000 books and bound periodical volumes, 1.4 million pieces of microform, 102,600 maps, 96,500 government documents, over 100 electronic databases, and a state-of-the-art library instruction room. BROADCAST SERVICES

The Knowledge Network is the Boise State television network. Courses, course resources, and other educational programming are broadcast to community sites and individual homes via wireless cable and standard cable television by Academic Technologies. Academic Technologies also operates a standards-based two-way videoconferencing system to locations throughout the state and the world. Reception of satellite programs and uplinks to satellite can also be arranged through Academic Technologies.

The Boise State Radio Network, affiliated with both National Public Radio and Public Radio International. includes 91.5 FM all-news service, 90.3 FM arts and performance service and 730 AM jazz service broadcast through southern, south-central Idaho and parts of Oregon and Nevada on a network of 20 stations and translators. Studios are located at Boise State and the College of Southern Idaho in Twin Falls.

OUTREACH

Boise State serves more than 30,000 people annually through workshops, short courses, apprenticeship training and other non-credit programs.

The Division of Extended Studies offers credit and F O non-credit classes in the evenings and on weekends, during summer school, through distance education and in high schools. The Selland College of Applied Technology provides education for employment through its Center for Workforce Training and Center for Adult Basic Education, Non-credit professional development state.edu opportunities are offered to individuals, corporations, government organizations and civic groups by the Center for Management Development and the Idaho
