In the fall of 2007 Boise State will celebrate its 75th anniversary

During Boise's early stages of growth, it was sufficient for the university to play the role of the traditional comprehensive higher education institution with a strong teaching mission and a limited research role.

But as the Boise economy changed into a dynamic marketplace of ideas and products — especially with its highly sophisticated technology sector — and as the city became a major metropolitan region, it was inevitable that the city's university would need to make the transition to a metropolitan research university.

Taday, the breadth of programs and services Boise State offers and its unique location makes it one of the notion's best places to live and learn. Boise State has academic programs in eight colleges — Applied Technology, Arts and Sciences, Business and Economics, Education, Engineering, Graduate Studies, Health Sciences and Social Sciences and Public Affairs — with a full-time faculty of more than 500.

**Dr. Bob Kustra** took the helm as Boise State's sixth president on July 1, 2003. His administration has been marked by an emphasis on upgrading admissions standards, improving the undergraduate experience and retention of first-year students, expanding and enhancing the university's research agenda, and increasing the number of graduate and doctoral programs.

University milestones during his tenure have included the Capital Scholars program offering scholarships to Idaho's top high school students, opening of new residence halls and apartments, and the expansion of the BSU West campus in Nampa. Dr. Kustra alsa serves as host of his radio program, New Horizons in Education, a weekly interview show aired on NPR News 91, the university's NPR affiliate.

He previously served as president of Eastern Kentucky University. Immediately prior to joining Boise State, Dr. Kustra fulfilled a one-year term as president of the Midwestern Higher Education Commission, the regional compact of 10 Midwestern states responsible for advancing higher education through interstate cooperation.

He served two terms as lieutenant governor of Illinois, which followed a 10-year career in the Illinois Legislature, first in the House and then in the Senate.

President Kustra received his bachelor's degree from Benedictine College in Atchison, Kan., his master's from Southern Illinois University, and his doctorate from the University of Illinois. All of his degrees are in political science. He and his wife, Kathy, have three grown children and two grandsons.

# **FACILITIES**

Situated less than a mile from Boise's bustling downtown, Boise State is located on a 175-acre main campus in the middle of Idaho's largest city and state capital.

On campus, six **residential halls** house more than 1,100 students in shared and single rooms. Near campus, five university-owned apartment complexes have mostly one- and two-bedroom units that affer various amenities.

Main academic facilities include the Engineering Complex, Applied Technology Complex, Albertsons Library, Kinesiology Building and Annex, Liberal Arts Building, Communication Building, Math/Geosciences Building, Business Building, Education Building, Science/Nursing Building, Public Affairs and Arts West Building and the Multipurpose Classroom Building.

Boise State also operates two facilities in **Canyon County**— Boise State West, a 150-acre site in Nampa, and the Canyon County
Center, where a variety of academic, non-credit and applied technology courses are offered. In addition to its two Canyon County sites,
Boise State operates centers at Mountain Home Air Force Base, Gowen
Field and Twin Falls.

Facilities where various **entertainment and athletic** events are held include Bronco Stadium (30,750 capacity), Taco Bell Arena (12,400), Morrison Center Main Hall (2,000) and Centennial

Amphitheatre (800). Two venues in the Student Union are the Grace Jordan Grand Ballroom (1,200) and Special Events Center (435). The Student Union also houses the BSU Bookstore and Bronco Shop.

Facilities that offer **sports and recreation** opportunities include the Caven-Williams Sports Complex, an indoor training facility next to Bronco Stadium; the Student Recreation Center; the auxiliary gymnasium connected to Taco Bell Arena; Bronco Gym; the Appleton Tennis Center; the Boas Tennis and Soccer Camplex; an indoor pool in the Kinesiology Annex building; and a 1.5-acre athletic and intramural field.

The university's current major construction project is the Interactive Learning Center, a four-story, 54,000-square-foot building adjacent to the Multipurpose Classroom Building. The \$14 million facility is scheduled to open in the summer of 2007 and will include a 200-seat lecture hall and 12 standard classrooms in addition to a multi-media lab, multi-purpose/distance learning classroom, visualization classroom, experimental classroom, and numerous study lounges.

In addition to academic functions, the Interactive Learning Center will include a food-services area, a convenience store and a coffee bar featuring a cyber cafe/study lounge. A wi-fi network for **wireless Internet** connectivity will also serve the entire building.

All told, Boise State has a total of 165 owned and leased buildings at its various sites.
