Boise Junior College offers the first two years of college work in art, preparation for the bachelor of arts and science degrees, general business, secretarial science, education, engineering, forestry, home economics, music, pre-law, pre-medic, pre-nursing and physical education. Complete courses are also given in cabinet making, millwork, machine shop and auto body and fender repair.

The college is a member of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools and is fully accredited by this association, by the Idaho State Board of Education and by the University of Idaho.

Four major educational needs are met by this college. First, it offers the first two years of college to those who desire to continue toward a degree. Second, it prepares those students interested in immediate entrance into the field of general business and some of the professions. Third, it meets the needs of those individuals desiring two years of general or cultural education beyond high school. And, finally, it provides facilities for adult education either through the regular or special evening classes.

The College is proud of its Department of Music. Few colleges of comparable size offer as wide a curriculum. Besides having two excellent instructors in piano, and two in voice, the college provides instruction in applied music in the full fields of strings, organ, woodwinds, double reed and brass.

All faculty members of the Department of Music possess artist's ratings on their instruments. Annually the Department presents a series of Sunday Vespers concerts the second Sunday afternoon of each month. All the instructors active in the music department appear in concert at least once during the year.

The Music Department has its quota of student organizations. The Boise Junior College Community Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of John H. Best, meets the orchestral needs of students of music. Supplemented by talented townspeople, the group gives students experience in fine symphonic work which enables them to participate in similar activities when they transfer to other colleges and universities.

The Pep Band, also under the direction of Mr. Best, is outstanding in its work. It is this group that acquired new laurels for itself when it appeared at the Shrine Potato Bowl Game in Bakersfield last fall with the college's nationally known Broncos. A new outgrowth from the Pep Band this year has been the college swing band which in one short year has made a place for itself in the social life of the college. The Associated Student Body with the cooperation of the College hopes next year to boast a marching band of at least 40 member.

Another student organization is the Girls' Ensemble directed by Lucille T. Forter. This group is in constant demand in Boise by the various civic groups. The String Trio appears several times during the academic year as does the Woodwind Quintet.

The A Cappella Choir, has for a number of years been a traveling choir, spreading the name of Boise Junior College throughout the west. In 1948 it appeared in Portland and toured southern Idaho. In 1949, besides touring southern Idaho again, it gave a concert in Ogden, Utah and toured Eastern Oregon. Each year, since 1930 it has grown in importance until today it is recognized as one of the important choirs in the northwest.




