College Opens as Four-Year School

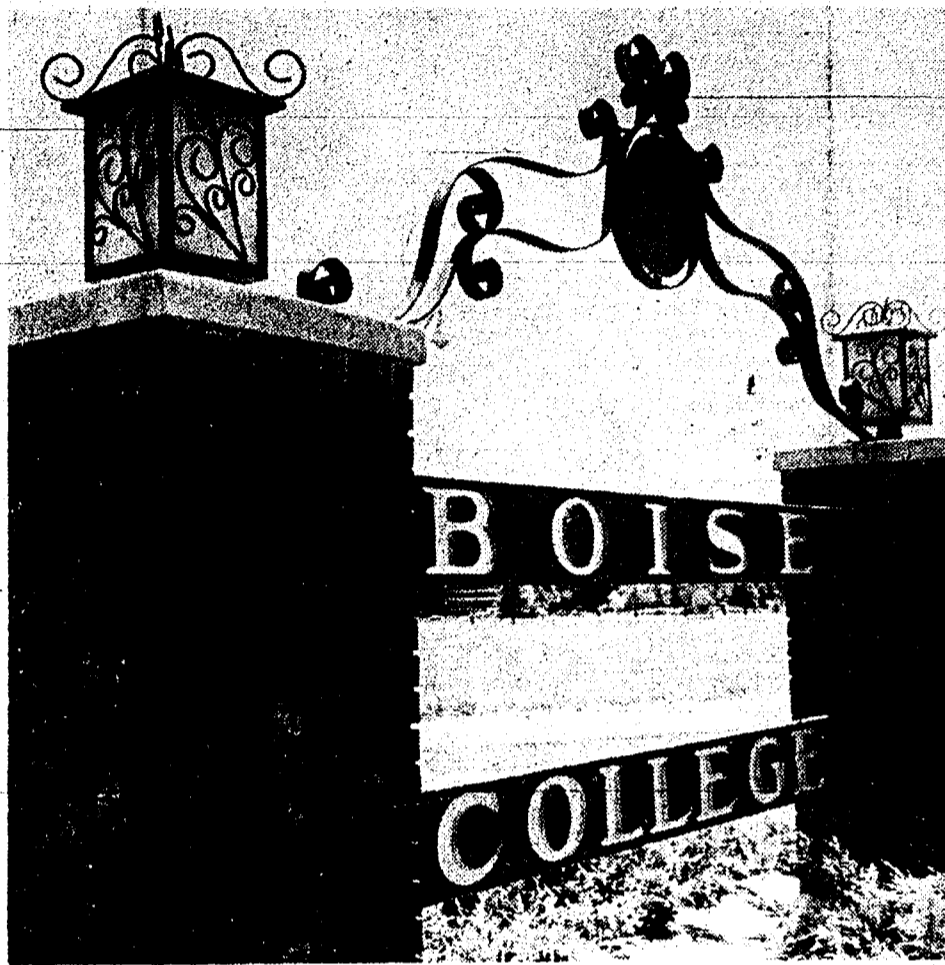
Convocation Marks Start of New Era

Students were advised to "approach their education with a self-fish attitude and to rob everything possible from their instructors, the college and the textbooks—in terms of knowledge," by college trustee Marcel Learned at the all-school convocation.

The assembly held on the second day of school was called by President Eugene B. Chaffee to celebrate the opening of the college as a four-year institution. As the students and faculty were joined by townspeople in the gymnasium they were treated to a jazz session by a musical group headed by BJC grad Gib Hochstrasser.

President Chaffee recalled that this is the first such convocation since the return of the World War II veterans to the campus. He introduced James McClary, another alumnus, who is now executive vice president of Morrison-Knudsen.

Dr. Chaffee also reviewed the growth of the college from the depression year 1932 to the present. He also showed a copy of the original catalog which contained 11 pages. He said, "Registration then was somewhat faster than today—offerings were limited and there was no choice!"

Semester Begins With Record Entry; 36 New Instructors

Boise College begins its 33rd year with a record registration of over 2,300 students, according to the registrar's office. In this, the first year as a four-year school, there are 36 new faculty members.

The new staff includes two husband-and-wife teams, Mr. and Mrs. Richard K. Hart, teaching Economics and English, respectively, and Dr. and Mrs. J. Alfred McCauslin of Bloomsburg, Pa., Counselor and English.

Other new faculty members include: History department—Dr. John A. Caylor, Nevada, Mo.; Dr. Hugh T. Lovin, Kearney, Nev.; Dr. William Hall, McCall; Dr. Merle Wells, Boise, and Canfield Smith, U. of Puget Sound.

New psychology department faculty members are Dr. Ruth Hill, St. Paul, Minn., and Dr. Marjorie Palmquist, Ross, Calif.

Teaching chemistry is Dr. Robert Hibbs of Boise; General Biology and Genetics, Dr. Gilbert Wylie of Canyon, Texas.; Biology, Julia Mae Davis of Berkeley, Calif.

New Spanish instructor is Dr. Luis J. Valverde of San German, Puerto Rico. English teachers include John Beckwith, Boise; Alan Crooks, Boise; and Mrs. Mary Alice Crooks, Boise. Dr. H. Welton Rotz of Seattle is teaching Sociology.

Miss Doris Hoyer of Boise is an Education instructor; Howard Huff of Boise teaches Art. Vocational Counselor from Fallon, Nev., is Charles F. Williamson.

Other faculty members include William Heazle, Boise, Accounting; Wayne E. White, Safford, Ariz., Economics; Leo J. Knowlton, Eugene, Ore., Mid-management; Carl Tipton, Boise, Business; Avery Peterson, former State department official, Political Science; Roger Walters, Los Angeles, Calif., Mathematics.

Nursing teachers are Kathryn Goodwin, Boise, and Kathleen Lonsdale, Seattle. New Administrative Assistant to the vice president is Robert Baker of Boise; Assistant Registrar, Samuel Righter, Las Vegas; Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, Tom Hazzard.

Murray Satterfield and William Jones of Boise are new coaches. Albert Fuehrer of Boise is in Auto Mechanics; Lois Ormsby, Ocean-side, N. Y., will be Assistant librarian.

Health Services Listed for College Students, Faculty

Health Center services are available to Boise College students and faculty on school days only, Mrs. Jerine Brown, school nurse at the Center, reports. Nurses are on duty at the Center, 209 Sherwood street, from 8:30 a.m. to noon Monday through Friday.

Students wishing to see the college physician, Dr. Bruce Budge, must be at the Center before 9:00 a.m. Excuse slips are furnished to those students who must miss class or who are tardy because of a Health Center visit, Mrs. Brown explained.

Flu shots will be given again this fall to faculty and students at a nominal fee. Two injections of vaccine are given, except for those who took them last year, in which case a booster shot only will be necessary. Health authorities throughout the country recommend this preventive measure.

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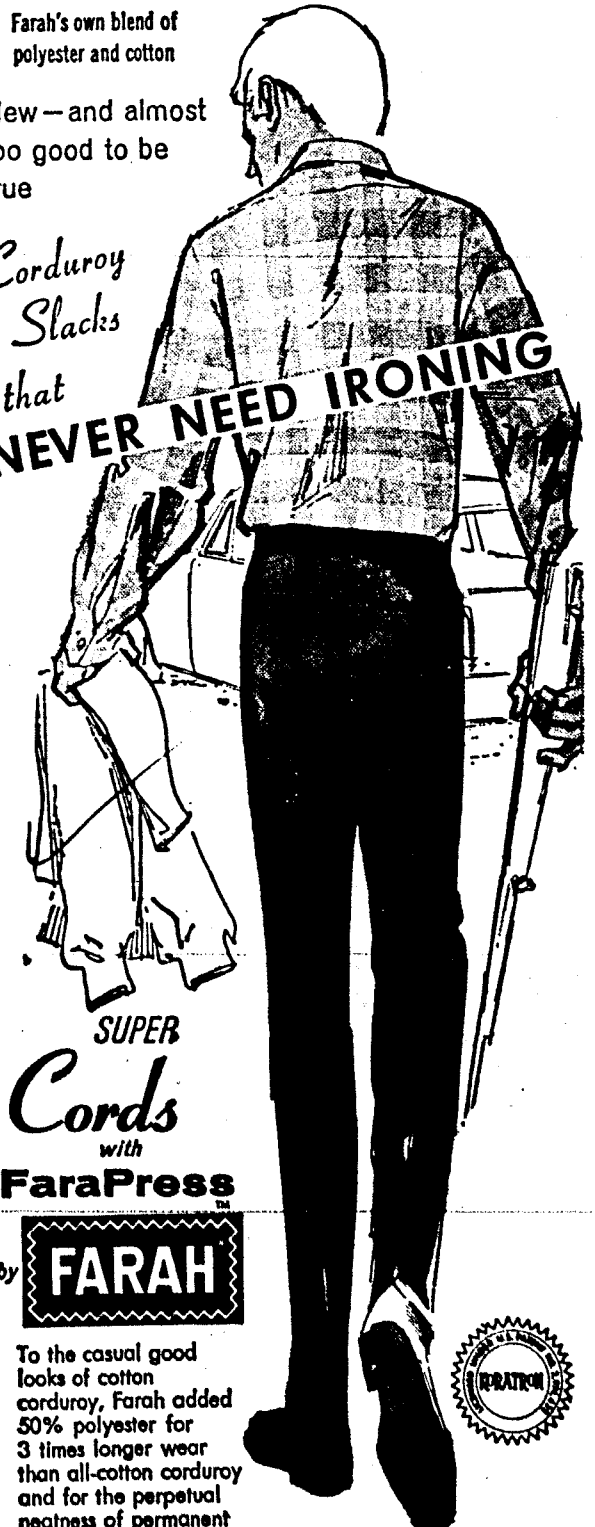
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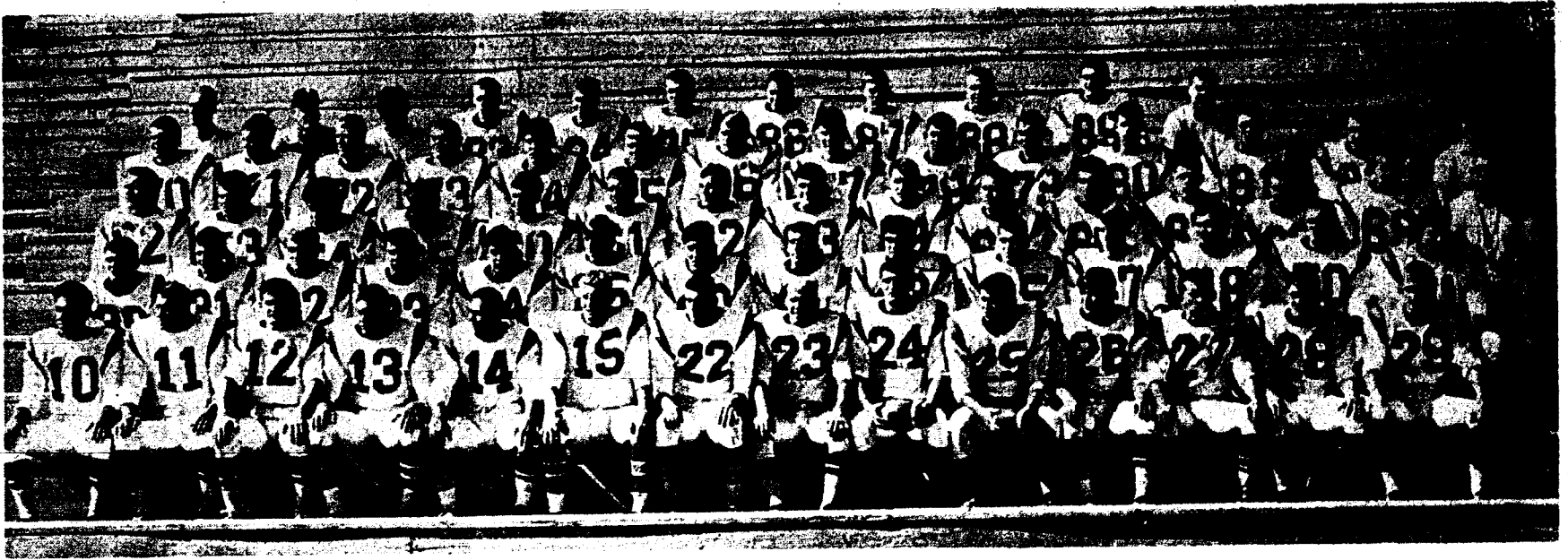
