The program will consist of two one-act plays, presented by members of the German Club. Starting off the program will be a play written by Hans Sachs, DER FAHRENDE SCHULER IM PARADIES, (The Traveling Student in Paradise). The cast stars Linda Edwards, Garland Fout, Bill Tietjen, Mike Hulet and Bill Stener.

The second play is entitled DER BESUCH IM KARZER (The Visit in the School Jail), which is adapted from a story by Ernst Eckstein. In 19th century Germany, it was a custom to have a jail in the schools in order to discipline students for bad behavior. George Benson stars as the director, with Gary Wickberg as the student and Brian Thorne as the janitor.

The production staff includes: Linda Eichelburger, Elsa Pacheco, Gail Gustafson, Linda Kibble, Sandy Lacy, Bud Smilnich, Arthur Vetter, Myles Dewey, Ron Meyes and Nancy Barrett as assistant director. Are Kings Out-dated?

Last week the women students of Boise College voted for the King of Hearts, who will reign at the annual Sweethearts Ball. The King is to depict the epitome of masculinity.

After going through 291 names of prospective heartthrobs, the coed voters underlined 13 familiar names and shoved their ballots into the ballot box. Voters are expected to vote again this Friday for the final tallying.

The idea of a Sweethearts Ball and the King of Hearts isn't exclusive to BC. A majority of high schools in the state holds this event, as well as several colleges.

A change of the name of the dance and its royalty, a more effective system of voting and a new aspect of entertainment is needed to separate the college activities from the high school get-togethers.

To eliminate the popularity poll type of election, which gets the same people elected year after year, why not stage a drawing at the dance from the names of all attending and take your royalty from the audience? This added aspect of mystery will help with the problem of attendance and eliminate hours of "busy" work.

Rated or Berated

How many times have you heard people rank Boise College as a "glorified high school?" Has anyone ever asked you if your credits are transferable to a four year college or a university? What's your answer to these questions?

Why don't you tell them that you can transfer credits to all colleges, and Ds are transferable if you have a 2.0 or over. Furthermore, Boise College has excellent science, art and education departments. As a junior college, our school has been rated among the top colleges in the nation scholastically.

Before long, Boise College will be officially a four-year institution. We are expanding in every way, and have much to be proud of . . . excellent faculty members and high scholastic standards.

Where Do We Go From Here?

Have you ever been bored on a Friday or Saturday night, and perhaps wanted to go to the SUB for a coke, or to the library to find a book? With the beginning of the six week pledging period for Boise College coed service clubs, many would-be pledges have chosen not to join because of the past pledges, whose grades dropped severely. The Valkyries, a service club, has taken this problem and come up with the idea of having a study table placed in the library for the pledges, where they will be required to study for a specific amount of time set by the officers.

If the idea is taken to heart and strict rules enforced, hopes are that pledges' grades will remain stable and those who were reluctant to join will be interested once again. Congratulations, Valkyries—this is the right kind of thinking for a college.

BC Instructor Attends Foreign Policy Meet

Boise College was represented by Mr. Avery Peterson at the Regional Foreign Policy Conference held in Salt Lake City, Utah last week. This conference was part of Challenge Week 1966. It was organized by undergraduates of the University of Utah in cooperation with the Utah League of Women Voters.

Featured speakers were six representatives from the State Department, including Undersecretary of State for Economic Affairs Thomas C. Mann and Ambassador Robert McClintock, State Department Advisor to the Naval War College. Others were David Popper who spoke on the United Nations, Richard Reuther of the Food for Peace program, Robert Barnett, an authority on Southeast Asia, and Mrs. Charlotte M. Hubbard, who filled the position of conference monitor.

The meeting, which was open to the general public, commanded 550 pre-registrations. In addition, the speakers met with high school students in the area and held discussions with the university undergraduates.

Mr. Peterson commented: "This kind of a carefully organized conference on small dimensions could be a stimulation to both Boise College and the community."

Dr. Howard said the biggest reason for the existence of more extremist groups in our nation than at any other time is our open-class society. Another reason, he said, is because people gain a certain status that they didn't have before. This is why the "white trash" of the South join with the KKK—because their only status is that they are white.

Dr. and Mrs. Eugene B. Chaffee traveled to Eugene, Ore., on Friday to attend the funeral of Mrs. Chaffee's mother, Mrs. Guy Barton, at the First Christian church. Mrs. Barton was a frequent visitor to Boise and was acquainted with many of the college faculty. She was 81 years old.

Former Boise College psychology instructor, Mr. Adam Margoshes, passed away February 2 in the Chambersburg Hospital. Mr. Margoshes was assistant professor of psychology at Shippensburg State College in Shippensburg, Pa. at the time of his death.

Mr. Margoshes taught at Boise College in 1964-65, and was the author of a book on the life and work of Freud as well as numerous other articles published in professional journals. He was a member of the American Psychological Association and the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the Interscience Research Institute.

Mr. Margoshes is survived by his wife and four children.

Bronc Matmen Meet Ricks Here Friday

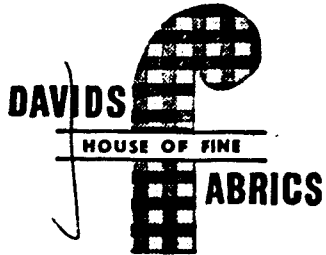
