She is Marilyn McKean, a senior, 1967, majoring in social science. Candidates were judged on their record of scholastic achievement, their leadership in campus activities, their community service work, and based on essays which they wrote.

If the candidate from this college reaches the National Finals, she will be seen on a coast-to-coast television spectacular. The entire National College Queen Pageant will be televised, in color, on the NBC network on Friday, June 16th.

For 10 days preceding the telecast, the 50 state winners will participate in a series of forums and seminars. They will be tested and graded in 10 competitive events. The candidates will discuss education, campus life, current events, literature, fashion, career goals, and many other topics. Panels of national judges will award points for the best opinions and comments.

It is during these events that our State Finalists will be able to demonstrate the training and educational background which she acquired at this college. She will be in competition with some of the finest scholars from colleges and universities in the other 49 states.

It is up to us—the students and faculty on this campus—to help decide which of the four young women shall represent our state in the National Finals. For the first time in the history of any major pageant, the selection of the State Finalist will be determined by the ballot boxes. Ballot boxes are now being set up and voting will take place throughout the state. Our votes will count in determining which of four young women will become the "Idaho College Queen."

The four finalists are: Marilyn S. McKean, Boise College, Boise, Idaho; Michelle Annette Dumas, University of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho; Catherine Mary Connor, University of Idaho, Boise, Idaho, and Margie Felton, University of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho.




