BC BEGINS THIRD YEAR OF FOUR-YEAR CURRICULUM

Boise College begins its third year as a full 4-year college. Pre-registration figures indicate there will be about 3,700 students enrolled on a full time basis. The freshman class last year was larger than either the University of Idaho or Idaho State University, and this situation is expected to continue in the years ahead. The Staff and Faculty of the College have been increased in order to serve the large student body the college is attracting. dent body the college is attracting.

Boise College began as a private church-supported junior college in 1932. In 1939, the Legislature allowed it to form a taxing district in Ada County, and it became a public institution. In 1965, the Legislature granted the college permission to become a four-year school, and the enrollment took a 40% jump in the fall of 1965, and another 22% leap in the fall of 1966. Boise College now has nearly double the full time students of three years ago. time students of three years ago.


