GEN. MAXWELL DAVENPORT TAYLOR TO SPEAK ON 'WHY VIETNAM?'

General Maxwell Davenport Taylor will speak at 8:15 p.m., Friday at the Boise College gymnasium on "Why Vietnam?" The general, an accomplished speaker and writer, is former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Ambassador to South Vietnam, and special advisor to both Presidents Kennedy and Johnson.

But unlike many generals and politicians, Maxwell Taylor is tempered toward humanity in general through his intellectual as well as practical experience.

He readily quotes the classics and, while superintendent at West Point, he urged the cadets to study the opinions of Oliver Wendell Holmes and T. S. Eliot's poem, "The Love Song of J. Alfred Prufrock."

As a matter of fact, General Taylor himself graduated from high school when he was fifteen and was fourth in his West Point class, where he was dubbed "most learned." His knowledge includes proficient use of Japanese, Chinese, French, Spanish, German and Italian languages that have and will be of tremendous value to him.

The former ambassador's knowledge of Italian came in good use in 1943 when he slipped into Rome to determine whether a paratroop drop would be feasible. Although he favored the plan, the information he received led him to advise cancellation.

led the 101st Airborne Division on D-Day and again at the Battle of the Bulge. His right to the nickname "Mr. Attack" was again proven when, in Korea, he drove the Eighth Army far north of the 38th Parallel just before the armistice.

It was General Taylor's book, "The Uncertain Trumpet," in which he expressed his belief in "limited war strategy" as opposed to "massive retaliation," that brought him his first appointment by President Kennedy. Since then he has been a principal contributor to the policy in Vietnam, where his belief in "flexible response" geared toward the regnant situation is readily felt.

Today, the general is president of the Institute for Defense Analysis in Arlington, Va., where he can put his beliefs and experience to work.

'The Sandpipers' To Appear In Concert

Talent abounds as the Sandpipers visit Boise College. The trio, composed of Michael Piano, Jimmy Brady, both guitarists, and Richard Shoff, playing bass, will be in concert during this week of Homecoming activities. The Sandpipers will perform Tuesday, October 24, at 8 p.m., in the Boise College gymnasium.

The three singers all have extensive musical background. Each had sung in the famed Mitchell Boys Choir with Jimmy Brady, being the only Mitchell boy to have made two European tours, and to sing in St. Peter's Cathedral, Rome, for both Pope Pius XII, in 1957, and Pope John XXIII, in 1959.

From the Mitchell Boys Choir, the trio, interested in forming a musical group, jumped at the Harrah's Club call for new rock'n'rollers. Along with a female singer and four female dancers, the trio compounded into "The Grads," and played a seven-week engagement. As The Grads, the trio acquired show business fame with the ultimate, an engagement at the Celebrity Theater of the Sands Hotel, Las Vegas, spurring them to greater heights.

Next step to fame rode on the A&M Records contract with a new name, "The Sandpipers" and new song, "Guantanamera." This July 1966 release blasted the trio to the top as it sold more than 400,000 single copies, and rated sells of 11,000 albums a month.

The Sandpipers then marched on with television, state fairs and college concert appearances.

The Sandpipers sing everything from folk songs to ballads. Combined with each member's vocal ability to interchange from bass to baritone to tenor, with their professional poise, and with their clean-cut, well-groomed appearance, the Sandpipers are the favorites of all ages.

Starting at 8 p.m., the drill team will perform, giving an exhibition of their various field formations. Then King Beard contestants, who have been officially entered, will be measured for the longest beard grown since the official starting date. The winner will receive the title "King Beard" and be crowned by Valkyrie president Janet Priddy.

At 8:30, the Homecoming Queen will be announced and then crowned by Denny Sauers, Homecoming chairman. At the same time the burning of the "B" on the hill below Table Rock by the IK's and the burning of the "B" in the stadium will take place. At the ceremony's end, the audience and all participants will take part in the traditional singing of the alma mater.

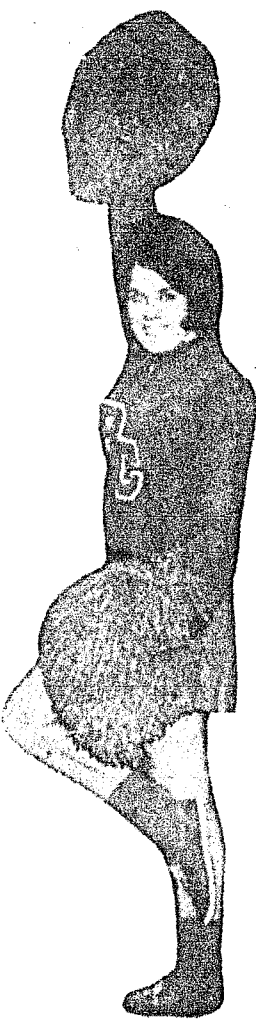
FLOWER POWER

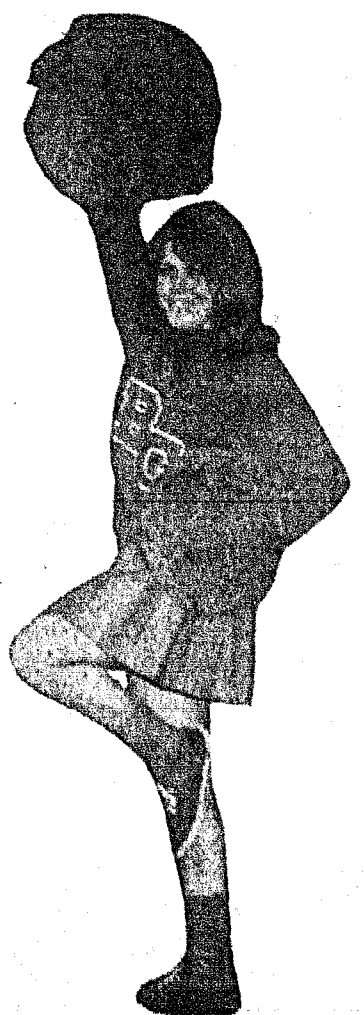
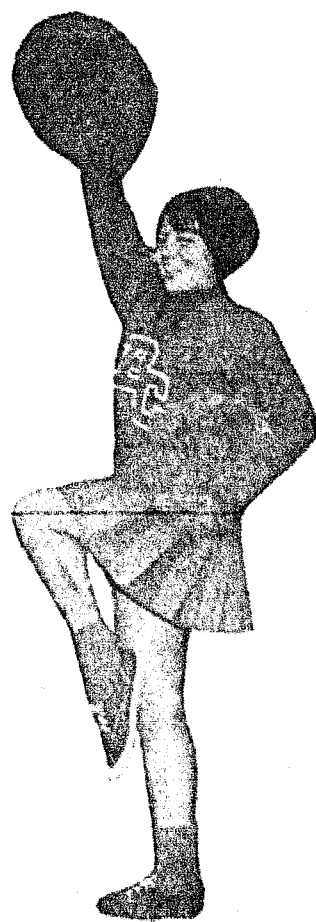
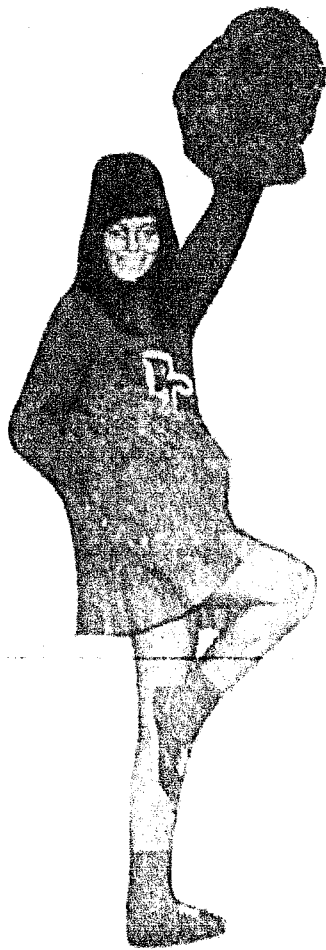

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Car Caravan Slated for Friday Noon

Everyone loves a parade, and the students and faculty of Boise College are no exceptions. In an attempt to add a little more color and spirit to this year's Homecoming, a pep parade has been planned for Friday, Oct. 27.

This parade should not be confused with the Homecoming parade, which will take place on Saturday, Oct. 28. The pep parade is strictly for fun, and will exclude the use of floats and bands. Instead, it will consist of a "car-caravan" made up of enthusiastic students and faculty.

This year's parade chairman, Dave Gardner, stated that the parade vehicles will begin to line up in the "U" in front of the administration building, and that the parade should begin promptly at noon. The route the caravan will follow differs somewhat from last year's trail. It will take the following route instead:

After traveling down River road the cars will swing onto Capitol boulevard and proceed to Main Street where they will turn right and go as far as Third Street. They will then turn left and proceed west down Idaho Street. As the caravan reaches 13th Street it will circle Boise High and travel to 10th Street where it will proceed south until it reaches Main.

Once on Main Street the cars will travel east to Broadway and then to the college campus. The parade should wind up at 1 p.m.

The parade will be accompanied by a police escort and will be led by Dave Gardner and Ron Obendorf. Dave noted that the parade is not limited to cars. "Motorcycles and hot-rods are all acceptable parade vehicles." It was also mentioned that the various cheerleaders would be provided convertibles to ride in.

As for decorations, Dave stated that all cars need not be decorated, but as an added incentive, prizes will be awarded to those individuals who best deck their

vehicles out in the true Bronco tradition. "Decorations may be picked up in the 'U' at about the same time the cars are beginning to gather. We will furnish the various items of decor for anyone who wants them," he stated.

It was learned that the Homecoming committee will pick up the decoration tab. The only limitation placed on decorations is that there should be no material dragging from behind any of the vehicles.

As for the amount of noise the participants are allowed to make, there is no restriction. Denny Sauers, Homecoming official, said that anyone who is interested in participating in the parade should find out from their instructors if it is all right. Any student who is released from class by their instructor can participate.

This year's parade chairman, Dave Gardner, IK Duke, is a senior majoring in chemistry.

Homecoming Floats Meet Requirements

All clubs building a Homecoming float should have their entries turned in and be hammering, stuffing, and painting. The maximum a club can spend on their float is \$50 and each club should have an itemized receipt to be eligible for competition.

This receipt will be turned in to Denny Sauers, Homecoming chairman, or John Poulson, parade chairman, during the lineup on the River Road. Floats will assemble beginning at 9:30 a.m., Saturday, October 30. At 10:45 a.m., the floats will leave the River Road and line up on Jefferson near the Capitol. Any float which is not on the River Road by 10:45 a.m., will be left. The actual parade will begin at 11:30 a.m. in front of the Capitol.

Judging will be done by a group of Boise businessmen and there will be three categories for the floats based on the membership of the club. Each club will be placed in either large, medium or small category. So get your grubbies on and get busy—there are only four days left!!!

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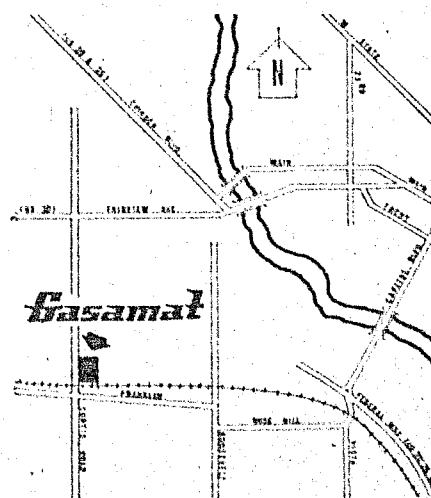

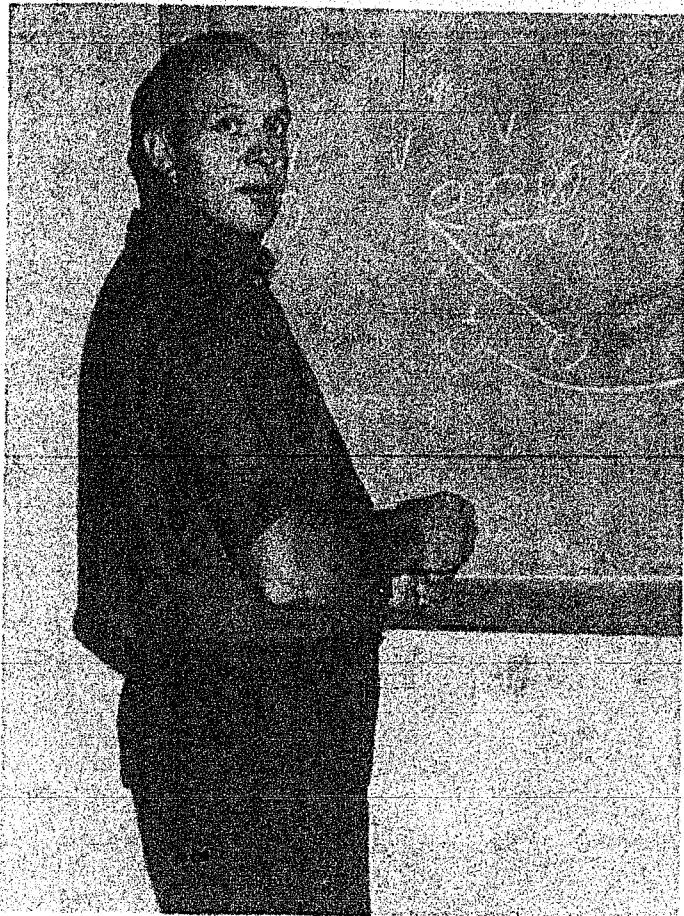

The newest addition to the Bronco coaching staff is backfield coach "Bus" Conner. Before coming to Boise College, Conner coached backfield at Idaho State University. He also coached high school football at Rigby and Idaho Falls.

Conner attended Utah State University at Logan where he received his Master's degree.

Besides being backfield coach, Conner is in charge of the Intramural program and will assist Murray Satterfield in coaching basketball.

Murray Satterfield, head basketball coach for BC, also assists in coaching the Bronco backfield.

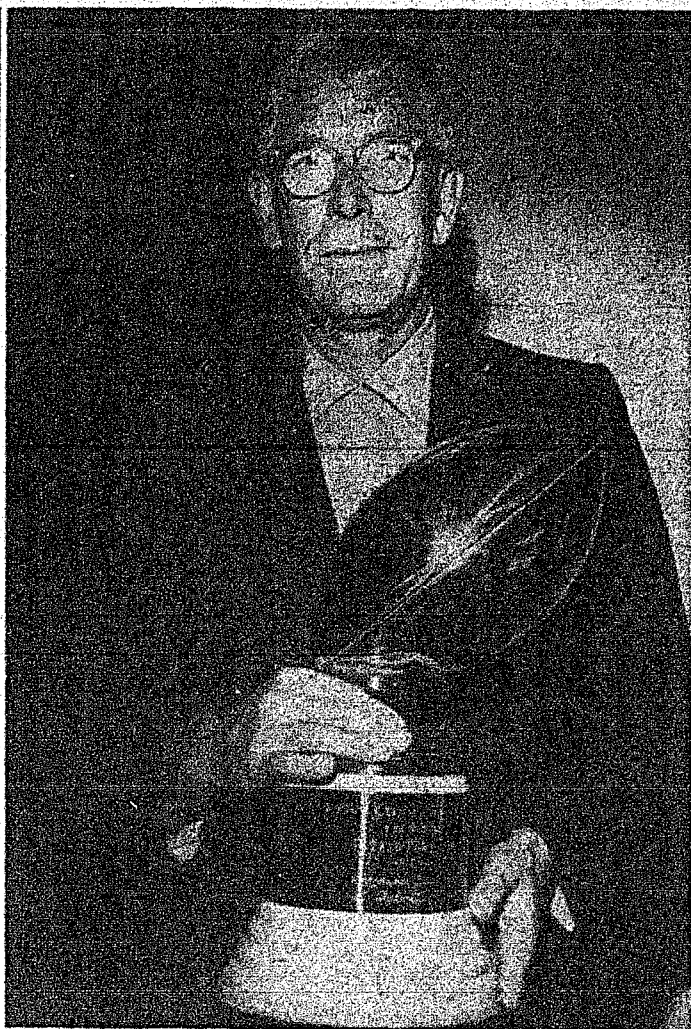
Satterfield attended college at Idaho State College and Utah State at Logan. He now is attending graduate school at the College of Idaho.

Indispensable Man In Sports Is Locker Room Trainer

A man of many talents, Bill Jones is well-equipped for athletic trainer in the Boise College physical education department. Jones started out as a student at BJC ten years ago and earned an associate of arts degree. After a year and a half as an instructor with the police department, he became a first aid and conditioning instructor at the Ada County Sheriff's office and, after four years there, decided to come back to college.

The trainer is subject to all kinds of duties, including treatment of minor athletic injuries. After the doctor has determined the extent of the injury, the trainer's job is to help nurse the victim back to health by treating the injured area with such therapeutic measures as medications, massages, or whirlpool baths. The trainer must, therefore, have a thorough knowledge of physiology, anatomy, first-aid and kinesiology, which is a study of the muscular system and its function. A good trainer must be a combination of baby-sitter, mother, father and friend, says Jones. In addition to performing physical therapy, he must listen patiently to the complaints of the various team members. "To be a good trainer," Jones emphasizes, "you have to be a good listener."

A trainer is in essence a "modified doctor." Whereas the doctor is "second-aid," the trainer is "first aid." Jones, therefore, defines a trainer as a "good first aider." He must learn to know each individual team member. In this way, the trainer finds out how much pain one can endure, since no two people have the same degree of tolerance to pain.

A trainer's job begins at 3 p.m. each day and continues up to the weekend games. Before each practice and game, ankles and shoulders padding have to be bound

with tape for precautionary measures, and the trainer sees that all the necessary equipment fits properly.

Outside of three shoulder separations, there have been no great injuries to the Bronco squad this season. Those which have occurred are just the ordinary bumps and bruises which players have to contend with every day, for football is contact sport and such mishaps are a part of the game. "It hurts when you're out there practicing," Jones adds, "but when you win the championship, you feel good."

The game will wind up a very old series between the two teams as Boise College moves up to a four-year status next year. The series began in 1947 and to date, the Broncos hold a 19 win, 0 loss and 1-tie edge. The Vikings would very much like to gain a win in the final meeting.

Broncos Lose to Mesa in Colorado; BC Offense Sputters Toward Defeat

The Boise College Broncos, lacking their usual scoring momentum, were stopped by a rugged Mesa football team and came out on the losing end of a 25-14 score Saturday night at Grand Junction, Colorado.

Unfortunately it was a case of good defense and no offense for the Broncos, who, despite recovering five fumbles and intercepting two Maverick passes, were hampered on offense by the tough Mesa defensive line.

A Mesa fumble led to the first BC score when Ken Johnson recovered at the Mesa one-yard line. Pat Williams then bolted over for the touchdown and Scott Bowls' conversion gave the Broncos a 7-0 lead.

The Mesa Mavericks came thundering back with quarterback Ron Green completing a long pass to the Bronco four. On the following play the Mavericks ran in for the touchdown but still trailed, 7-6. The Broncos put away another Mesa threat by recovering their second fumble but were unable to get going and surrendered the ball.

Late in the half, Boise sustained a long drive down to the 10, but their luck ran out as Gary Powell's stray pass was picked off by Charley Jenkins, who ran 90 yards for Mesa's second touchdown. Still another Bronco drive ended when Terry Squibb had a pass stolen at Mesa's 15 and returned for 40 yards. The half saw the Mavericks on top, 12-7.

In the second half things got worse for the Broncos. While they were stopped every time they had the ball, the opponents took advantage by rolling up yardage on a long series of plays. Quarterback John Coen's two-yard touchdown terminated the drive and stretched Mesa's lead to 19-7 just before the third quarter ended.

Three fumbles were given up by the sputtering Bronco offense in the final quarter, and Steve Boo-

ras scooped up one of them and raced 30 yards for the fourth Maverick counter. Two other Mesa drives were stopped by the defensive unit of the Broncos, who did not score again until Dennis Baird returned a punt 65 yards for the final score, with four minutes remaining. Baird's interception in the closing seconds stopped Mesa's last threat, but by then it was too late for the Broncos to get back in the game and they had dropped their second straight game. The loss was the first in conference action for Lyle Smith's crew.

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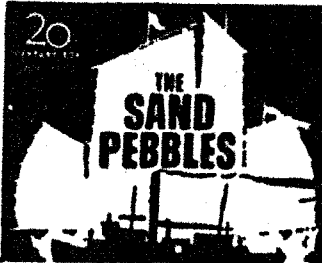
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
