

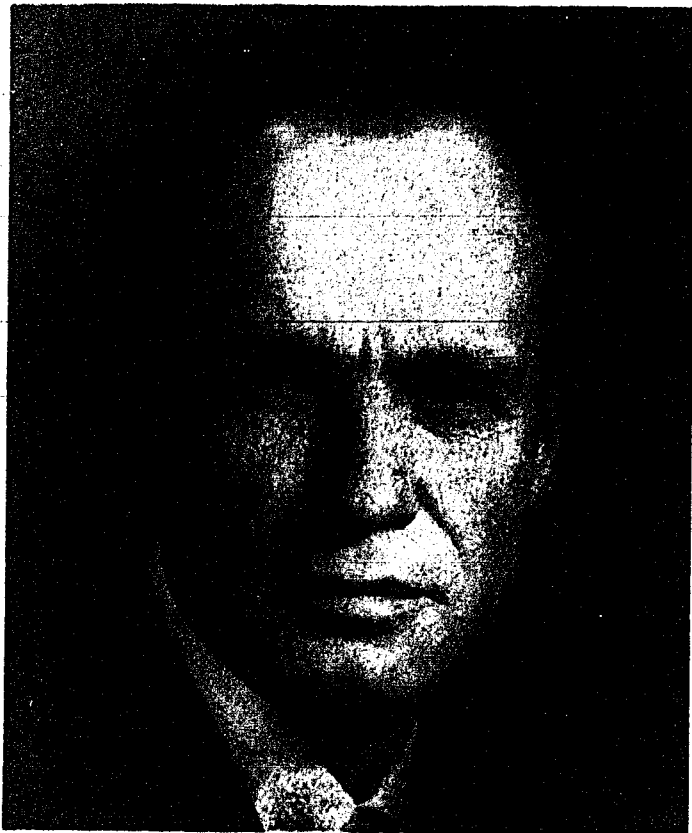

Satterfield Faces Columbia Basin As Third Season BC Basketball Mentor

Friday, Dec. 1, the Bronco field-house will erupt with the cheering and excitement of the first cage clash of the season. As last year, the first tilt will be with the Columbia Basin Hawks from Pasco, Wash. Last year in double contests, the Hawks and the Broncos split both pairs of contests by nearly equal margins.

On the following night, the Boise crew will meet Spokane Community College. Last year the Broncos also split the series with Spokane.

"Both Columbia Basin and Spokane are probably the toughest

teams we will meet this year," Coach Murray Satterfield commented. "Last year Columbia Basin and Spokane battled to a one-point difference in the regional championship. In fact, for the last six years, the Washington Junior College Conference has been fought out between Spokane and Columbia Basin."

Three returning sophomores — Bill Otey, Wendell Hart and Keith Burke, who started last year—will form the nucleus of this year's Broncos. Otey, a rugged 6'4½" forward from Washington, D. C., is a master with the ball and will add a lot of scoring, as well as fine defensive play to the squad.

Burke, a 6'7" center from Roseburg, Ore., has good range from close in and is also a very capable rebounder on the boards. Hart, also a native of Washington, D. C., is a fine shot from outside as well as from inside. Hart, 6'1", could play either in a forward or a guard spot on the floor.

Also on the starting lineup will be Ronnie Austin, a 6'2" freshman from Paterson, N. J., who will probably be in a forward position. For the fifth starter, sophomores Rodell Hill, Dan Bofenkamp and Phil Choules, along with freshman Don Cox are in hot contention for a starting bid. Bofenkamp and Hill return from last year's squad and Choules returns to BC from the Bronco squad of '64-65. Cox is a graduate of Emmett High School, where he played varsity basketball since he was a sophomore.

Freshman Joe Gillespie, a 6'7" center from Cleveland, Ohio, could also work into a starting slot. Joe is a fine rebounder and shot from inside, and will be valuable if one of the big men up front gets into personal foul trouble.

Last year the Broncos compiled a 26-10 overall record, won their second ICAC championship, and finished ninth in the National Junior College championship meet. With three returning starters, Satterfield is confident about good prospects for his squad this season, as he begins his third year.

ATHLETES' FEATS

The 1967 football season gave the BC gridiron battlers their fair share of the laurels in and around the state and nation. Although the season was a "poor" one (6-4 as opposed to 9-1 in 1966), the team still gave a proper showing.

The offense completed 41% of their attempted passes as compared to a close 39% for the opposing elevens. And while the Broncos elected to pass only 119 times, their opponents threw the ball in half again as many attempts. These figures indicate an alert secondary on the part of BC which intercepted 18 passes and pressured receivers and passers to give up 91 tries.

The Boise offense lost nearly twice as many fumbles as the de-

fense recovered and the defense forced the other side into more fourth-down putting situations than the offense was exposed to.

All in all, the Broncos played a pretty clean game. Although they were penalized nearly as many times as their opponents, their actions netted only 65% of the error yards their opposition gained.

One can not get over confident looking at statistics. We started the season tromping over opponents and nearly finished up being tromped. But it is possible to make note of those events that proved to be either Boise College's making or undoing.

Three presentations were made to those members of the squad whom their fellows had deemed the valuable players of the year. Line Coach Ray Lewis handed Steve Svltak a trophy representative of his achievements as the team's Best Lineman. Pat Williams received his award from Backfield Coach Bus Connor for his position as Best Back. Giving the annual Sixty's award of a fine watch to the Most Inspirational Player was Coach Smith. He gave the prize to big Jacob Hoopai who had kept the desire to win foremost in the minds of all the players whether it was on the practice field or the playing field.

Boosters Laud Players To Finalize 1967 Season

The Bronco Boosters gathered Nov. 21 in the West Ballroom of the SUB to close out the 1967 football season with their yearly banquet and to honor the players of the year.

After Booster President Ray Giffin had introduced the celebrities at the head table and had singled out a few in the audience, Jim Rogers, Bronco offensive end, presented retiring Head Coach Lyle Smith with the last football he would use in his gridiron career. Rogers, first at a loss for words, summed up the appreciation of the entire team as he handed Smith the ball: "We just want to say, 'Thank You.'"

Gift certificates from the Boosters were given to each of the coaches, and Giffin, on behalf of the Sportscasters and writers of the area, presented Smith with an ornate clipboard for 21 years of good copy.

WINTER ENSEMBLE PLAYS THURSDAY

A unique program of modern jazz will be presented by The Paul Winter Ensemble, Columbia recording artists, Thursday, Nov. 30 at 8:15 p.m. in the Boise College Student Union Ballroom. The entertainment is sponsored by the Social Committee and tickets are now being sold in the booth in the SUB foyer.

The ensemble, comprised of saxophone, classical guitar, flute, bass and drums, will present a highly varied program of modern music, part original, and part influenced by their travels in 25 countries.

Hailed as one of the most unusual and interesting groups in modern music today, the Paul Winter Ensemble originated at Northwestern University in Evanston, Ill., under the name of the Paul Winter sextet.

In 1962, the ensemble, selected for both their musical ability and their academic excellence, was chosen to begin an experiment in cultural exchange as the first student jazz group to go on a State Department tour.

The experiment included a six-month tour of Latin America, playing 160 concerts in 61 cities and conducting seminars in every major university.

Earlier that year, the group competed in the Intercollegiate Jazz Festival in Washington, D.C., and won first place and the title of "The Number One College Jazz Group in the U.S.A."

An official tribute to the success of the tour came from the late President J. F. Kennedy, with an invitation to perform at the White House. In 1962, the group became the first jazz group ever to play in the White House and their concert was hailed by Encyclopedia Britannica as one of the important cultural events of the year.

All members of the group attended Northwestern and all majored in subjects other than music.

DRAMA DEPARTMENT TO PRESENT ONE-ACT PLAYS, NOV. 30, DEC. 1-2

The Boise College drama department will present two one-act plays by Eugene Ionesco Thursday, Nov. 30, Dec. 1 and 2. Curtain time on all three nights will be 8:15 p.m., in the old Student Union Ballroom.

The first play, "The Lesson," is a satire on the academic process and on the language used by professors and students alike. "The Bald Soprano," which is also a satire but with a touch of comedy is a comment on the middle class parlor conversation. The language style is that of a first grade primer, Dick and Jane, which heightens the comedy.

Directed by John Warwick, "The Lesson" cast includes Nathan Davis as the Professor, Janet Vetter as the Pupil and Kathy Brown as the Maid.

"The Bald Soprano," directed by Robert Dewey, is composed of Randy Kitzing as Mr. Smith, Lynda Callin as Mrs. Smith, John Charchalls as Mr. Martin, Opal Cooper as Mrs. Martin, John Poulson as the Fire Chief, and Jan Perkins as the maid.

Lighting will be by Bill McCracken and Jack Pederson. The set was built by John Poulson and publicity and concessions are being handled by Alpha Psi Omega.

Tickets may be purchased at the door and Boise College students will be admitted with their activity ticket.

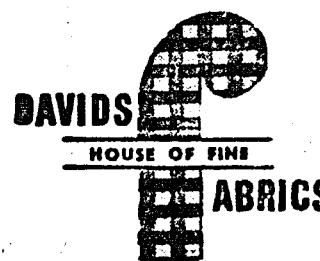

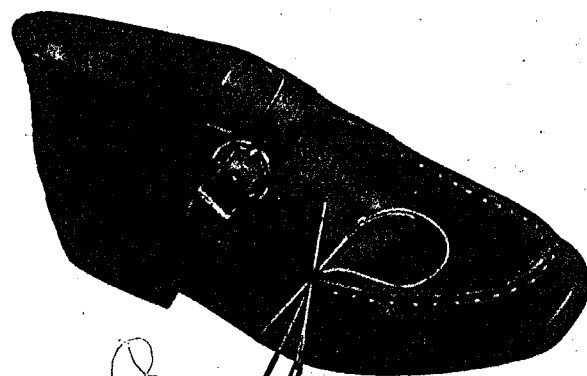
