Sloof Origin Finally Told

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The origin of the harmless jokes belongs solely to Denmark. Hans Christian Andersen was born in 1805 in that Scandinavian country, and became known the world over as the author of "The Ugly Duckling," "The Fir Tree," and "The Constant Tin Soldier."

It was not until he began to write travel stories, however, during his journeys in Germany and Italy, that people paid any particular attention to him; and not until 1835, when his first volume of Fairy Tales was published, did he really become famous. However, he became famous not for the quality of his writing, but because of what he wrote. People in Denmark called him a "fool," and would have nothing to do with this man who wrote such childish stories.

Andersen's greatness, however, was fully acknowledged before his death, and the king and queen of Denmark were proud to call him their friend.

Thus, Andersen became a national hero after his death in Denmark, and the king proclaimed his birthday, April 1, to be a national holiday. To this day, April 1, or April Fool's Day, is remembered in Denmark, not as a day for playing tricks, but as a day for honoring that "fool" who wrote those childish, but now immortal fairy tales.

Opposition has always promoted mistrust, advocated hate, preached incompatibility, and followed disruption. Continually it has sanctioned discontinuity.

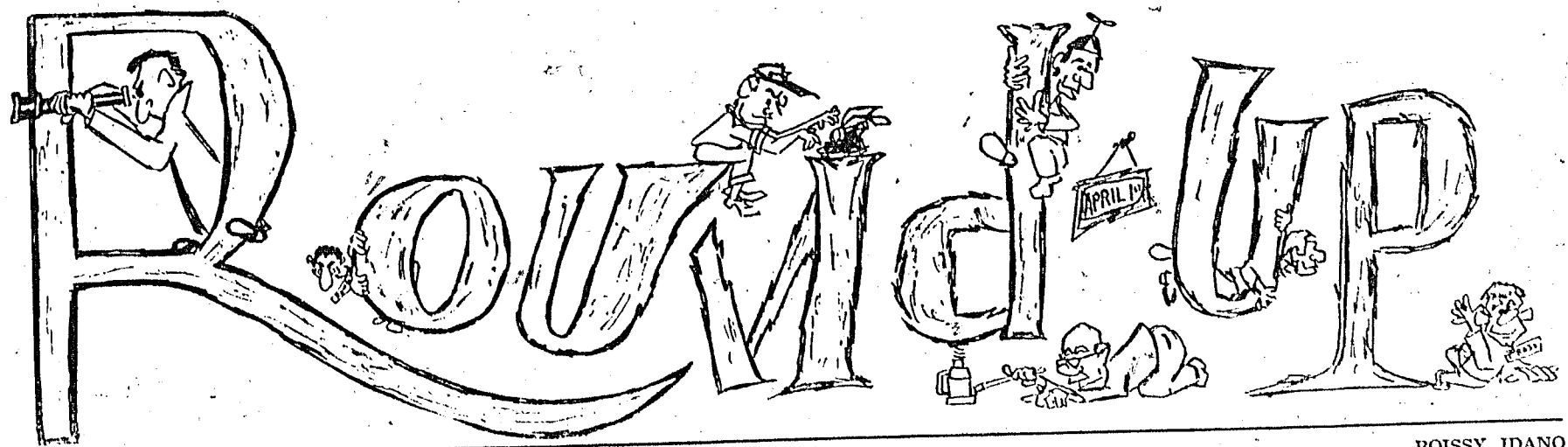
The time has now come to restate the irrevocable policy of this newspaper. The paper seeks to promote trust, advocate love, preach compatibility and follow tranquility.
