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Macbeth Begins Year With Foam Castle

"Just for you Shakespeare," chants the new Subal Theatre and players of Boise State College with their debut of "Macbeth".

The Subal Theatre, setting created by Technical Director Ronald Krempetz, extends its stage arms of lightweight polyurethane foam stone walls directly into the audiences' mists. The old dirt blackened stone and fishnet portable walls engulf the audience in the ugliness and brutality of medieval castle life. Aiding Krempetz's setting to draw the audience back in time is the Elizabethan style theatre created by John Warwick and staff.

Extending the atmosphere of old Dunsinane are the actor's costumes of rough woolens, animal skins and furs. A total of 86 different costumes will be used, one of which being Duncan's coat weighing 40 pounds.

The play officially opens September 12 with a scholarship benefit night for an invited audience. The public is welcome to all following performances excepting September 16 and 23, Monday nights when the theatre will be dark. The continuous daily performances will begin each night at 8:15 p.m.

Extending the presentation into the longest played by the college, the Subal players will also perform a matinee to invited

guests of the college September 21.

Tickets are .75 for students; \$1.50 for adults. Reservations may be made through the college.

WWII Realism

THE BRIDGE, a motion picture from Germany, will be shown Friday at 8 p.m. in the Liberal Arts auditorium. Admission is free to BSC students with activity tickets, and 50 cents to the general public.

THE BRIDGE is based on true events which occurred in the last days of World War II when the German Army, desperate for more men, began to draft high school boys. The film shows the experience of one group of boys who are assigned to guard a bridge.

It has been highly praised as a realistic picture of war and was nominated for an Academy Award. It will be shown in German, with English sub-titles.

BSCASB Polls Open Friday

Friday, Sept. 13, the Associate Student Body of Boise State College will elect its leaders for the present school year, 1968-69.

The voting qualifications are, by class, all Freshmen, of students with 29 credits or less are to vote for freshman officers. Students with credits from 30 to 59 are to cast their ballots for Sophomores, and all those with 60 credits to 89 credits are to vote for those candidates under the Junior category. Seniors, or those students with 90 or over are to vote for their candidates.

Everyone is eligible to vote for the candidates running in the Forum race. For the four schools of BSC, in the School of Arts and Sciences, Gregory Pilcher, Vicki Simpson, Ed Weber, and Wendy Wilson are the nominees. In the School of Education, Lorn H. Adkins and Terry Mosier are running. Within the School of Business and Public Administration, Mel Alvord, Debran Burges, Doug Crisman, Gary Dance, and Wayne Mittelreider are the candidates. At this time, there are no students running from the area Vocational-Technical School.

As the ballot reads at present, the Senior Class is running Jack Adkins and Martette Schille for President, and the Senior Senator aspirants are Nels Axelsen, Ron

Cottier, and Larry M. Jeppesen. The Junior Class is choosing Jack Arbaugh and David Cunningham for its President, and for Senator, Dennis Carroll and Harold W. Coe are campaigning.

No one is running for Sophomore President, one individual is running for that class's Senator, Gary Johnson. Of the Freshman Class, three people are in the race for the highest office, including David Anneker, Mark Rienhart, and Amy Young.

For Freshman Senator, a number of students are

campaigning, those including Brad Janss, Corey Jensen, Stephen Johnson, Larry Prince, and Richard Burns.

President Asks for Addition To Expand Library Floors

A proposed cost of \$2,616,000 for an addition to the Library Building was put before the State Board of Education by BSC President John B. Barnes, Friday, Sept. 6. The addition will be four stories constructed on the west side of the present building.

\$2 million dollars of the requested money will come from the 1969 Legislature and the remaining \$616,000 will be obtained from federal funds available through the Higher Education Facilities Act.

Dr. William H. Carlson of the Department of Libraries and

Library Planning for the Oregon State system of higher education, a consultant obtained by the Boise State College Board of Trustees, recommended the changes. Carlson recommended that \$500,000 a year be expended in development of the library.

President Barnes stated that the present library is inadequate now that BSC is a full four year school.

Carlson suggested that the college use a more professional library staff instead of student help.
