## 'Sock It To 'Em' Theme Spread Afar

"SOCK IT TO 'EM, BRONCOS!", the theme of Boise State College's seven day Homecoming celebration, is being spread over the northwestern states on posters, news-releases, buttons and T-shirts as preparations are finalized for the Oct. 27 through Nov. 2 festivities.

Dick Hamm, homecoming general chairman, said the week-long celebration was deemed "The largest college homecoming ever held in the Northwest" by students from Washington, Oregon and Idaho, who attended a student

leadership conference earlier this month.

Beginning Sunday, Oct. 27, Homecoming Week "kicked off" with the traditional "Toilet Bowl" and "Powder Puff" football games. Members of the Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity and Intercollegiate Knights honorary fraternity did battle on the field with winner receiving a hand-painted toilet bowl to display until next year. Following the men, two groups of women, representing the TEKEs and IKs, carried the pigskin in the "Powder Puff" bowl.

## 'Spanky and Tops Homeco

Getting top billing in the homecoming celebration is the live concert with "Spanky and Our Gang", one of the top ten musical groups of the United States. Concert time is 8 p.m. in the BSC gymnasium on Wednesday, Oct. 30.

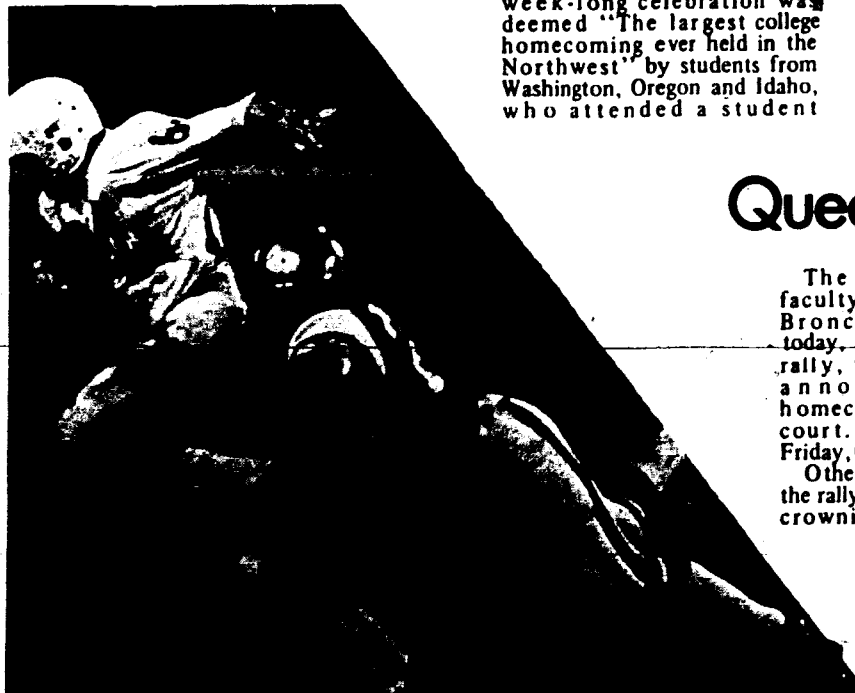

Mrs. Jean MacInnis, instructor in charge of the Dental Assisting program, has been notified of her appointment to the National Certification Board of the American Dental Assistants Association.

Also, as a delegate from Idaho, she is to attend a combined meeting of the Board and the American Dental Assistants Association Oct. 25 to Nov. 2 in Miami Beach, Fla.

During the meeting, Mrs. MacInnis and the four other members of the board will draft standards and define policies relating to the accreditation procedures of the Association.

## Ada Theatre To Feature Classic Play

"Othello," starring Laurence Olivier in the Warner Bros.-Seven Arts Technicolor motion picture presentation of the most widely acclaimed production of Shakespeare's drama in recent times, will be shown for two days only at the Ada Theatre on November 13 and 14 at 2 and 8 p.m.

William Shakespeare's "Othello" is deemed by many authorities to be not only the Bard's finest tragedy, but also his most perfectly structured play.

Shakespeare freely adapted the plot of "The Tragedy of Othello, The Moor of Venice" from a French translation of an Italian tale. The story came originally from the "Hecatommithi" of Giovanni Battista Giraldi written in 1565. Under its original title, "The Moor of Venice," the play was first performed at Court at Banqueting House, Whitehall, London on Nov. 1, 1604.

The filming of Othello is the first time a British stage production has been transplanted to a motion picture studio and shot without any structural changes. The cast is exactly the same, and film director Burge has remained faithful to stage director John Dexter's original National Theatre production.

Olivier, who is Director of the National Theatre and one of its leading performers, describes the filmed "Othello" thus:

"It is not a photographed stage performance. It is the film of a performance shot against no film sets, not stage sets, but backgrounds to the situations, offering as little visual distraction as possible from Shakespeare's intentions or our interpretation of them. Yet, the sets do represent, in simplified form the places in which the scenes are played."

Frank Finlay, in the role of Iago, has had a career of acting interspersed with being a jack-of-all trades. His first appearance with the National Theatre company was as First Gravedigger in Olivier's production of Benjamin Britten's "Let's Make an Opera." Between 1955 and 1961, he directed more than 40 plays for BBC television. He also directed the feature film "There Was a Crooked Man." Twice before, he staged "Othello," first with Brewster Mason and then for the Yugoslav National Theatre.



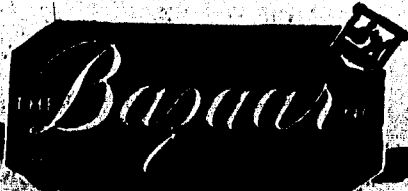

p.m., October 29. A local businessman will speak and refreshments will be served. Anyone interested is asked to call chapter President Stan Olsen, 343-1688.

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
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
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# Utah State Captures Boise State Rodeo

Sandra Curlock, a student from Logan, Utah, won the All-Around for the girls with a total of 220 points. Sandra won the same honor only a year earlier at Ricks College, Rexburg.

Utah State's girls amassed 285 points to take first place while Ricks was second with 190 and Dixie College third with 105.

It was a real duel for All-Around honors for the boys. Vern Bastain of Ricks narrowly nudged out Duane Sorenson of USU 210 to 208.

Team standings were won by Ricks with 467 points. USU took second on 442 points and were followed by Brigham Young University, College of Southern Idaho, and Weber State College of Ogden.

Yo Marts of Boise State finished third in barrel racing with a two-go-around time of 38.1. Dave Morrison of Boise State was the only other finisher for the Broncos. Dave scored a 33 in the saddle bronc riding to finish second.

Miss Ronda Reid was crowned queen at the rodeo by Rex Reagan a Circle K Club member. Ronda is a member of Tri-Delta Sorority.

Stock for the show was furnished by the Cross Triangle Rodeo Co. of Ovid, Idaho, and Bill Vickers of Pocatello was rodeo announcer. Judges for the contest representing the Rodeo Cowboys' Association were Bob Coon of Nampa and Dick McCall of Boise. Mrs. Charlotte Holmes of Caldwell served as arena secretary.

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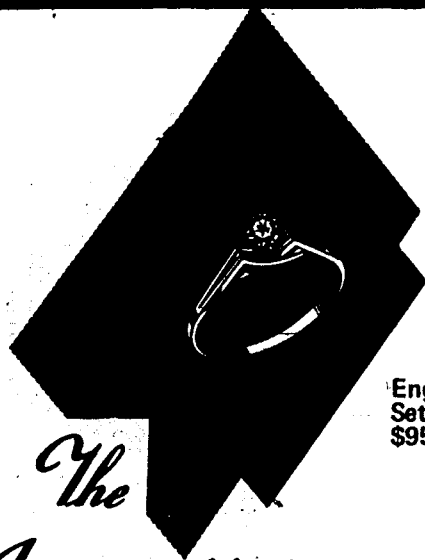
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## Debaters Travel To Portland

## College Executives Meet For Title III Seminar

Presidents of four western colleges and executives from five other schools are on campus today and tomorrow to participate in a discussion called "Developing Institutions Seminar Number One."

It is one of three seminars planned to study the roles, functions and objectives of a "developing" state senior college, according to BSC President John Barnes. The meet is funded by the U. S. Office of Education Title III Grant to the College.

Attending the conference are presidents of Northern Montana College, Southern

Colorado State College, College of Southern Utah and Sacramento State College. Discussion leaders will be Dr. Don S. Patterson, president of the Independent Colleges of Washington, and Dr. A. J. Brumbaugh, Atlanta, Georgia, a member of the Southern Regional Educational Board.

Also represented are Fresno State College, Weber State, Arizona State University, Northern Arizona University and the University of Oregon.

Though it was evident that the Seeger concert would not be what its opponents feared it would be, Nally still did not go as far as to say anything detrimental to School-Community relations.

However, Nally blundered when he, along with the student body presidents of ISU and the University of Idaho, endorsed the proposed spending plans of the Idaho Board of Education in a letter to Governor Samuelson.

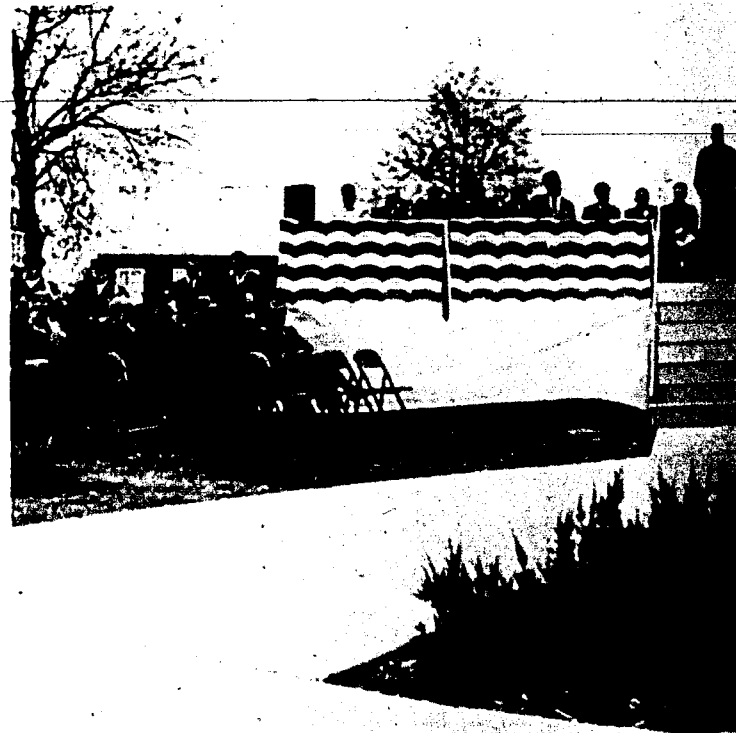
The plans of the Board placed Boise State below the other two state schools in educational spending, and Nally, in "his" letter, seemed to reflect the administration of Boise State College by endorsing the figures of the Board. But the entire story shows that perhaps Nally was not completely at fault but fell victim to the schemings of his "buddy-buddy" fellow presidents.

During the recent Student Leadership Conference, Mike King, ISU student body president, and Larry Craig, U of I ASB president, asked Dyke to sign a letter in order to endorse "friendly" relations among the three schools.

At that time, Nally was hesitant, saying that, though he did not think the figures entirely fair, he would not have it said that he or Boise State College did not favor a "community" relationship with fellow students at ISU or U of I.

And Nally signed a letter that he knew was going to Governor Samuelson's desk. Yet he signed that letter to show that he, Dyke Nally, was for fraternal feeling among state institutions and not necessarily the plans of the state board.

Arguments are strong against the fledgling school, but perhaps the strongest of all arguments can be directed against all three schools.

Idaho has long been regarded as a conservative state. So conservative, in fact, that easterners still imagine Idahoans fighting renegade Indians and living in sod-shanties.

Until Idaho becomes a leader or among the leaders in the American system of state government, it will remain a conservative state, not only in thinking, but in actuality.

The three state schools of Idaho are not fostering liberal growth in this state when they constantly argue about the apportionment of education funds.

ISU and U of I, universities for years, should pause to help BSC grow into university status as fast as possible in order that Idaho take that step toward liberalization.

None of the state schools should be made to gain by the accelerated growth of Boise State. The system of higher education should be revamped to place emphasis on all three schools by utilizing the offerings of their separate environments.

The schools of law and business should be where business and law is and plenty of it. The colleges of science and architecture should be where adequate facilities are such as in Arco and Boise. The departments of nature sciences should be where there is an abundance of forest, range, and farm lands.

Dyke Nally cannot be excused easily for his blunder, nor can his fellow presidents be easily excused for their actions.

Yet students should be understood for what they represent, and that is a devotion to what they deem theirs and the systems which they cherish most.

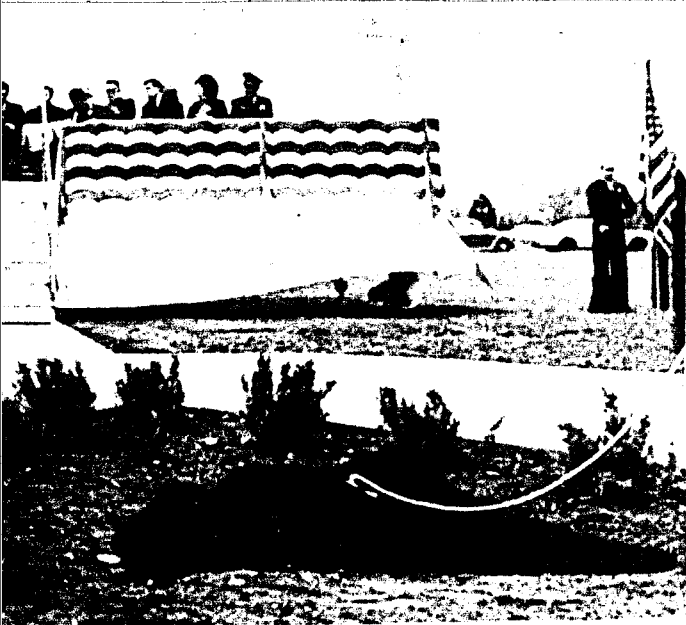

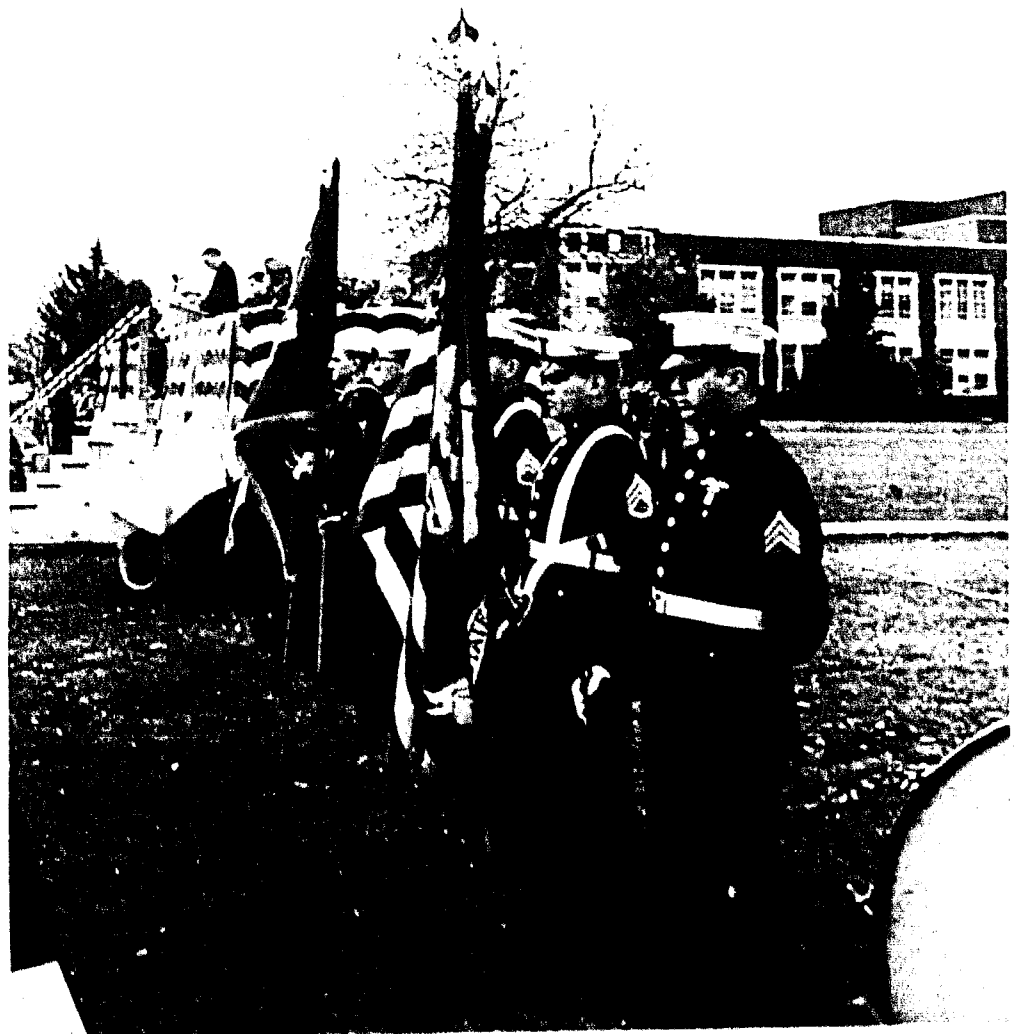

An Athletic First

Lyle Smith Faces New Task

Campus clubs are collecting wood in competition for the first annual Smoky Bear Award to be awarded at the event in the gym parking lot.

On January 1, 1968, Lyle Smith stepped down from his position of head football coach after 22 years to become Boise State College's first full-time athletic director. With him went what must have been one of the finest, if not the finest records in NJCAA football.

In his reign Smith compiled 162 wins, 26 losses, and six ties. His teams have continually won their own Intermountain Collegiate Athletic Conference championships, numerous bowl appearances and was consistently atop the Junior College rankings throughout the years. In 1966 his team was rated best in the nation.

He was at the helm of the Broncos from 1946 to 1967 with the exception of a hitch in the navy during the early 1950's.

His unquestionable record during this time included five appearances in the Potato Bowl in Bakersfield, California and one trip to the Little Rose Bowl. His 1958 squad won the National Junior College Athletic Association Championship.

During his period at BJC he molded some 20 All-Americans, some of which are still in the pro-ranks, and shaped the lives of many men through competitive athletics at the college.

Smith played center on the University of Idaho football team during 1936-37-38. He was also a member of the basketball team during the same years.

Football, and athletics in general, is not just another word around the Smith family but a way of life. In 1964, under his father's tutorship, Bill Smith was selected to the first team All-American squad, in the junior college ranks. Like father, like son, Bill played center and went on to star for the University of Oregon. Upon completion of his senior year he was drafted into the world of professional football.

With the job of full-time athletic director comes added responsibilities and problems. Smith's duties will include

recruiting, and scheduling of games, to name just a couple. Perhaps he has set one of his largest goals in pursuing an entrance to the Big Sky Conference. This would certainly mark another milestone for Boise State College and Lyle Smith. His efforts are unending in working with President John Barnes and Big Sky officials toward attaining this goal.

Smith said recently that if our application is turned down it would certainly be a blow but not the end of the world. "We could find opponents but we couldn't wait around forever. There are many problems being an independent—difficulty in getting schedules and the necessity of traveling long

distances for games" being one example.

If his records and accomplishments on the field are any indication of the kind of job Lyle Smith will do Boise State College athletics are resting in the hands of one of the finest and most competent men in the nation.

BSC Broncos Sink Pirates As Brown Amazes Crowd

Fullback Abe Brown, filling in for the injured Pat Williams, scored three touchdowns in leading the Broncos of Boise State to a convincing 49-0 win over Whitworth College at Spokane, Washington.

The victory lifts the Boise squad to a 3-2 season while the Pirates are now 1-4.

The Broncos amassed a total of 372 yards in one of their

finest offensive efforts yet this fall. Boise also rolled up 19 first downs while allowing only four to Whitworth.

Boise's defense did its usual outstanding job in limiting the Pirates to a minus 16 yards passing, and swiped five passes. Steve Forrey was phenomenal as he grabbed all five of the interceptions for the Broncos.

Flanker Dennis Baird got the Broncos off and running in the first period by handling in a Hal Zimmerman pass for 55 yards and a touchdown. Gary Stivers kicked his first of seven consecutive conversions. Zimmerman fired another scoring strike to Dennis Pooley in the second period that covered 22 yards.

Heading into the final period the Broncos held a 28-0 lead but still the scoring was far from over. Tony Maher scampered 22 yards on a reverse only to be followed minutes later by Eric Guthrie from the two yard line.

Brown, a former Boise High prepster, scored on runs of 14, one, and one again.

# Chancellor Relates Story Of First Homecoming

The advent of homecoming 1933 for Boise Junior College marked the first year of interschool football play for the Broncos who played St. Joseph's High School and Albion Teacher's College using equipment which was largely castoffs from Boise High School according to Dr. Eugene Chaffee.

Dr. Chaffee, who was a member of the original faculty in 1932 and was president of the college from 1936 through 1967 recalled a contest where the original name of "Broncos" was given to the college team.

"Elmer" was the traditional wooden horse of the school. The first pep band was directed by Jan Yamamoto. Kenneth Robertson was the first captain of the football team in 1933. Dusty Klein was the first Bronco coach.

Some of the college's homecoming traditions originated in 1934. According to the annual of that year: "The night before the homecoming game the freshman class had charge of the bonfire. For weeks before this event all the spare trash in Boise was collected and put in the back yard of the college campus. After a rousing serpentine through town everyone went to the bonfire on one of the hills north of Boise.

"Here everyone let his school spirit run riot, so it was no wonder that the BJC team took the U of I freshman team for a cleaning the next day . . ."

The first slate of competitors for the Broncos included Eastern Oregon College, Ricks College, Gooding College, U of I Frosh, Albion Normal, and U of I southern branch (now ISU). The team had six wins and only one loss.

Similar to the homecoming queen and her court was the "Beauty Squad" In 1935 the football squad chose Margaret Kuroger as football queen on the basis of her "personality, sportsmanship, dignity, school loyalty, spirit and popularity."

Cheerleaders in the early days of the college were referred to as "yell leaders."

The traditional homecoming dance had its origin as the Bronco Roundup Dance.

The 1936 college annual tells the story tis way: "This year's yell team developed much college spirit for all contests. They led

pep assemblies and conducted a 'yell contest' for new yells for BJC. At all the local football games, they led the cheering sections and urged the Broncos to victory.

"During homecoming week, they built the traditional wooden horse 'Elmer,' and directed the parade and bonfire. Each year 'Elmer,' symbol of Bronco prowess, is cremated and from his ashes rises the spirit of new conquests and victories."

1958 BJC was rated the number 1 junior college in the country in football after defeating Tyler College of Texas 22-0 in the National Junior College Contest.

The Broncos have taken the Potato Bowl title three of the five times they competed.

A gigantic wooden potato masher standing 42" high was presented to Dr. Chaffee in 1949 when the Broncos were victorious in their first appearance in the Potato Bowl.

With a profound history of victories and traditions this year's Broncos shall hopefully continue to shape the destiny of the future by soundly defeating the ISU Bengals November 2.

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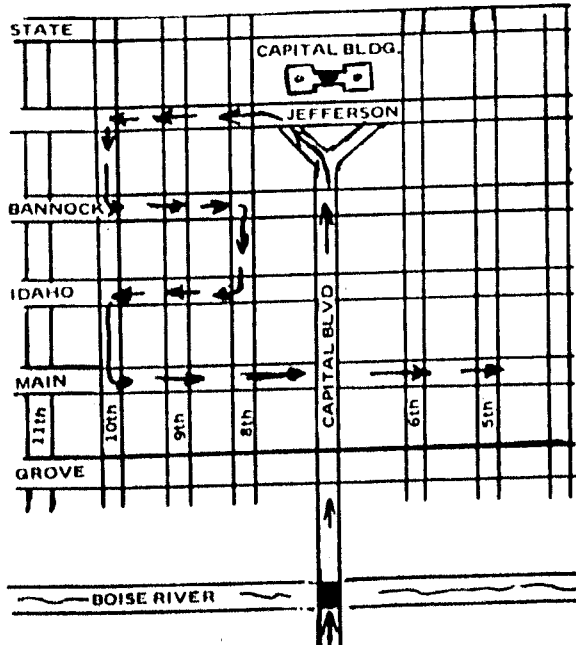



# Broncos Ready For ISU Bengals

When Idaho State and Boise State get together for the first time in their gridiron history Saturday fans may be in for an exciting afternoon of football.

Because of the wide-open brand of football installed by new head coaches at both schools this battle takes on the aspects of a real crowd pleaser, no matter who wins.

There will be the traditional comparisons but they don't really mean much until the ballgame is over.

Under head coach Tony Knap the Broncos will put the ball in the air but says Knap, "we won't let them play us loose and forget to run."

Boise State will probably go with Larry Smith, Dennis Pooley, Hal Zimmerman and Abe Brown, who took over the fullback slot from Pat Williams two weeks ago, in the backfield. Williams injured a knee and is expected to be out of action for three to four weeks and possibly the rest of the season. This may have some bearing on the Broncos in their remaining four encounters.

Gary Stivers, Boise's kicking specialist, is currently riding in fifth place for overall scoring in Idaho Colleges and Universities. He has 15 of 17 conversions and four fieldgoals for 27 points. Two seasons ago Stivers booted a 52 yard field-goal and is considered a scoring threat after crossing the mid-field stripe.

Behind Stivers in the scoring parade for the Broncos are Eric Guthrie, Pat Williams and Abe Brown with 18 points apiece.

As a team the Broncos lead their opponents with a 79-49 first down record while rushing for 593 yards to 462 for five foes. Passing shows the Broncos with an 846 to 479 lead in yardage. Larry Smith is the top ground gainer with 227 yards in 49

carries and Tony Maher leads in pass receiving with 250 yards on 10 catches and a pair of touchdowns.

Boise has been given a boost with the addition of 11 outstanding transfers from junior colleges. Tops among these have been Faddie Tillman, 6-6 and 225 pounds from Western Arizona via Dallas, Texas. Faddie plays a strong defensive end slot. Val Garrison, Ricks College standout is another top name that is included on the transfer list, as well as several California and Canadian prospects.

The punting chores have been split between Dennis Baird and Garrison. Baird is a strong and consistent booter.

Zimmerman and Rocky Lima co-captains leads the Orange and Blue on the field this season. Both are juniors and played for the Broncos last season in the Jaycee Ranks.

## IDAHO STATE

Idaho State has an exceptionally quick backfield in Rick Hulbert, Joe Clark and Carlis Harris.

Jerry Dunne former Boise High quarterback, has taken over signal-calling duties from the injured Larry Kerychuck. Kerychuck threw for 649 yards before a recurring back injury forced him to the sidelines. Dunne came on and has since proven himself as a capable leader. Two weeks ago Dunne started and led the Bengals to a 23-13 upset win over University of Montana.

Other returning starters are Billy Satterfield, who has set records at the Pocatello School for pass interceptions this year, and Bill Brown at halfback. Defensive backs include Leroy Harris, Stan and Steve Millard, Larry Thomas and Jim Gallagher.

Veteran Ed "The Flea" Bell is another important figure to keep an eye on. Ed is a 9.6 sprinter and is currently leading the Bengals in scoring with 36 points. The little guy is also tops in receiving with 34 catches for 483 yards.

Idaho State has one thing that Boise must look at very closely. That's a fellow named Joe Petrone, or more commonly known around Bengal-land as "Joe the Toe." It took him only one varsity game to equal the Big Sky Conference record with a 59 yard field-goal against Portland State. Only a Sophomore and already rated as Canada's number one amateur soccer player, Petrone is more than likely to wipe out every conference and national kicking record before he's through. More important he also is a major scoring threat after the Bengals advance the ball across the fifty-yard line. Petrone is currently in ninth place in Idaho scoring with 10 PATS and four field-goals for 22 points.

Two weeks ago against Montana Petrone kicked field goals of 54, 51, 43 and 31 yards.

The Broncos will operate from a strictly professional defense with four linemen, three linebackers and a four man deep system.

Both teams have individual defensive standouts. Steve Forrey, Chuck Wilson and Steve Svitak carry a brunt of the load for Boise while Harris and Satterfield supports the weight for Idaho State.

Forrey leads in pass interceptions with five for 80 yards and one TD for Bose. Svitak at middlelinebacker leads the pack with 21 tackles. Wilson and Alan Ellert are close behind with 17 apiece.

Clayton Vann, a 256 pound Army transfer from Ft. Scott J. C. in Kansas and 250 pound Dennis Rea team with Mickey

Wommack and Ron Shaw to form a strong middle of the line for the Bengals. Transfer Ambrose Costa is the middlelinebacker.

Football experts picked Idaho State to finish in the cellar of the Big Sky Conference this year but after upsetting Montana two weeks ago they may have already outlived this forecast. Montana would now need a major upset over a remaining Big Sky opponent to climb from the bottom.

Boise State College wants in the Big Sky Athletic Conference and the outcome of the game may go a long way in deciding where the Broncos will go after the current season.

Tony Knap, beginning his first year at the helm of the Broncos, has already made his presence felt, not only on the BSC campus, but also in the Boise area. With the initiation of spring practice, and his "winner" philosophy, the personable Knap has made it clear that his Bronco teams will be fighting units.

Knap's coaching career covers many years and he is no stranger to Idahoans. Seven years coaching football in North Idaho High School was followed by ten years as football and baseball coach and athletic director at Pittsburg, California, High School.

He was assistant football coach at Utah State University for four years, and when John Ralston went to Stanford, Knap spent the next four years as head coach of USU. In 1967, Knap was Dave Skrien's assistant with the Canadian Pro Football Vancouver, B.C., Lions, where he handled the defense.

As a player, Knap attended the University of Idaho, winning three letters in football, two in baseball, and on the gridiron he was named All-Coast First Team and Honorable Mention All-American in his senior year, at his end position. He received his bachelor and master's degrees from the University of Idaho.

In his search for excellence, Knap defines a winner as "a fighter who thrives on hard work and accepts discipline with eagerness."

Tony's philosophy is that "a group of men who play together as a unit, never giving up the fight, will never lose badly. If, in addition, they are blessed with enough natural ability upon which to build the individual execution of their assignments, THEY WILL NEVER LOSE, PERIOD."

## Bus Connor

D. L. (Bus) Connor, the Broncos' Assistant Defensive Football Coach, is starting his third season at Boise State College. Along with his Football duties Connor also serves as head tennis coach. Last season, his tennis squad has a sparkling 15-1 dual meet record.

## Dave Nickel

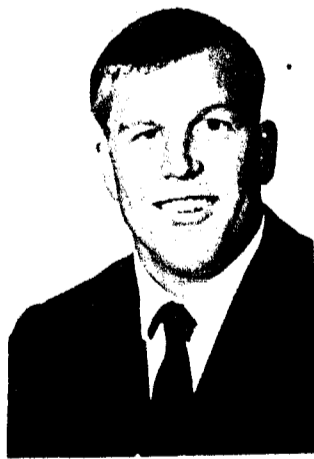

## Knap Points Out Success

"With half the season gone, certain things and events come to mind, as the picture develops the 1968 Boise State College football team." So spoke Bronco head football coach Tony Knap, when asked to comment on his squad.

"First, there are no pushovers in College football," Knap commented. "Every game is most certainly one that will see hard hitting, tricky defense, and skillful execution of offensive and kicking games. True, we've won a couple by lopsided scores, and have lost one the same way. In each case, the hitting was crisp and hard, by determined young warriors," he stated. "It was only superior skill or greater endowments that made the difference in the score."

When asked for some successful keys to victory, Coach Knap said: "A team must be able to pass effectively, in order to win games. The BSC-Weber State game, in addition to our win over Westminster and especially Whitworth, serve to underline this fact. I'm glad to report that we are much more this important sphere, than we were three weeks ago. Commendations are due to people like Jake Hoopai, Doug Woolsey, Brent McIver, and others... for providing greatly improved protection for the passers-co-captain Hal Zimmerman and Eric Guthrie. These two have greatly increased their accuracy, and our receivers... particularly Tony Maher, Dennis Baird, and Dennis Pooley-have become adept at getting open and catching the ball. The running game," Knap reflected, "has not been consistent, but did 'come through' in the critical game against Eastern Washington, which BSC won, 20-2."

"It is also obvious to me," coach Knap continued, "that no team in college football can be a consistent winner without a fine defense. The Broncos have a good defense. Overwhelmed one time, at Ogden, this group - led by star performers Steve Forrey, Gordon Olsen, Steve Svitak, Faddie Tillman, and Alan Ellert - has choked off every other team on our schedule thus far. The effectiveness of this group, I am sure, is due to the fact that they play together very well, have a lot of natural quickness and strength, and thoroughly enjoy hitting people."

When asked to look toward the remaining portion of the season, Coach Knap proudly said, "Looking forward to the second half of the season, I feel some confidence in predicting an excellent performance against each of the opponents on our schedule. I feel great trepidation over our meeting with Big Sky Homecoming opponent Idaho State University, and great respect for Central Washington State College and Western State College of Colorado. "We also know," Knap continued, "that our rivals, College of Idaho at Caldwell, will battle tooth and nail to try and beat the Broncos."

In response to a request to 'get at the real meat of it', Boise State College Head Football coach Tony Knap concluded: "As to a guess about our prospects of winning this second half of our schedule, I can say that we have grown some claws on offense, and we have at least a chance of winning every game."

At the game this weekend, watch for 'Jonesie', he's the one with the band of managers at his heels.



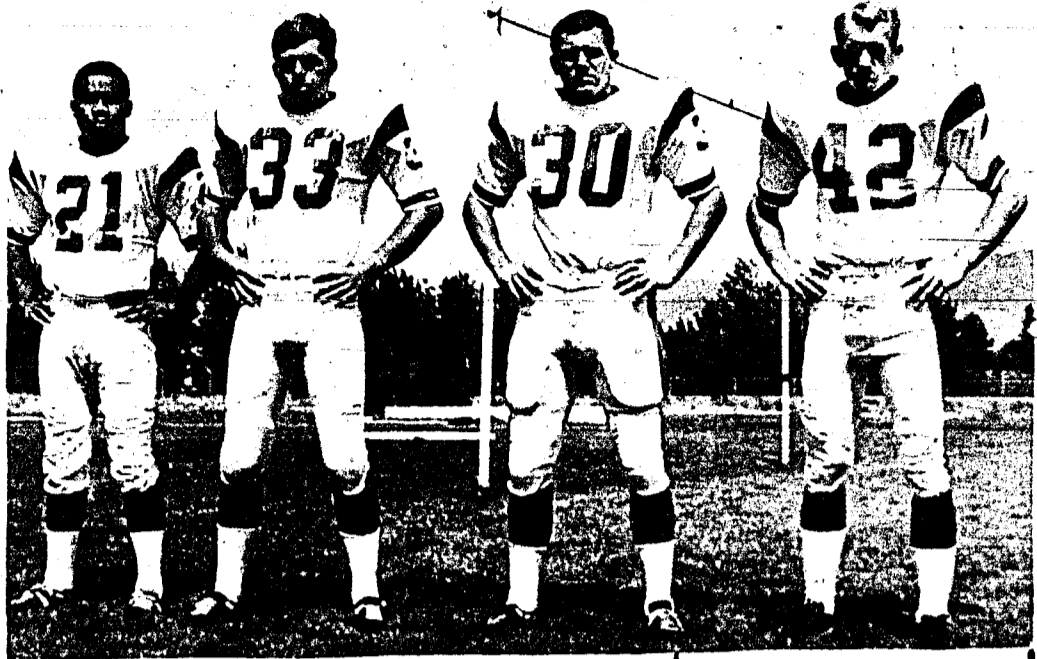

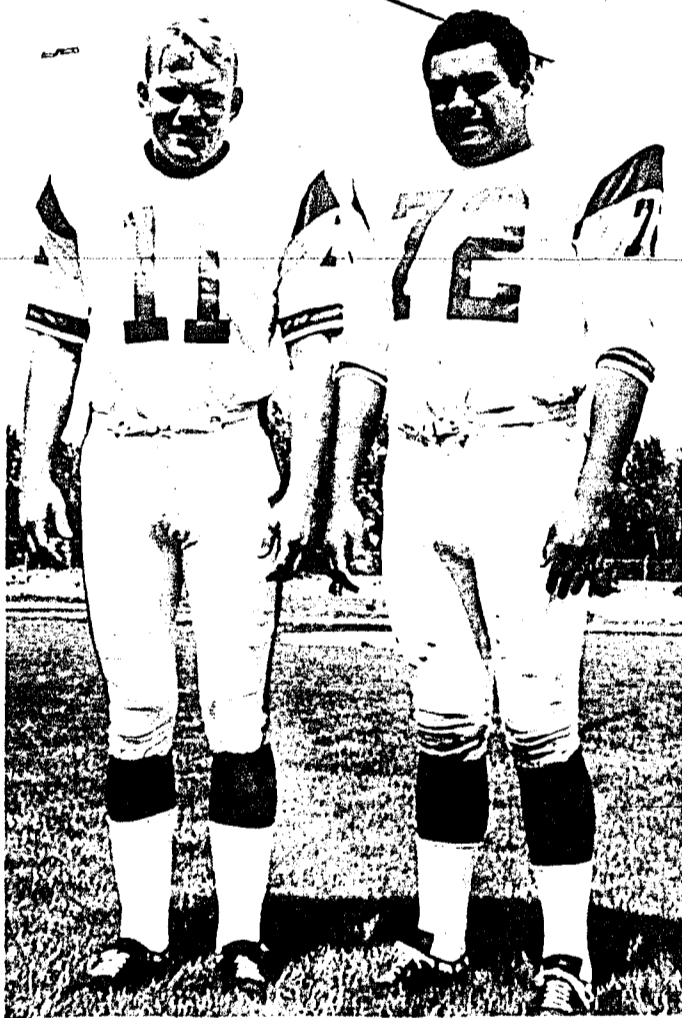
