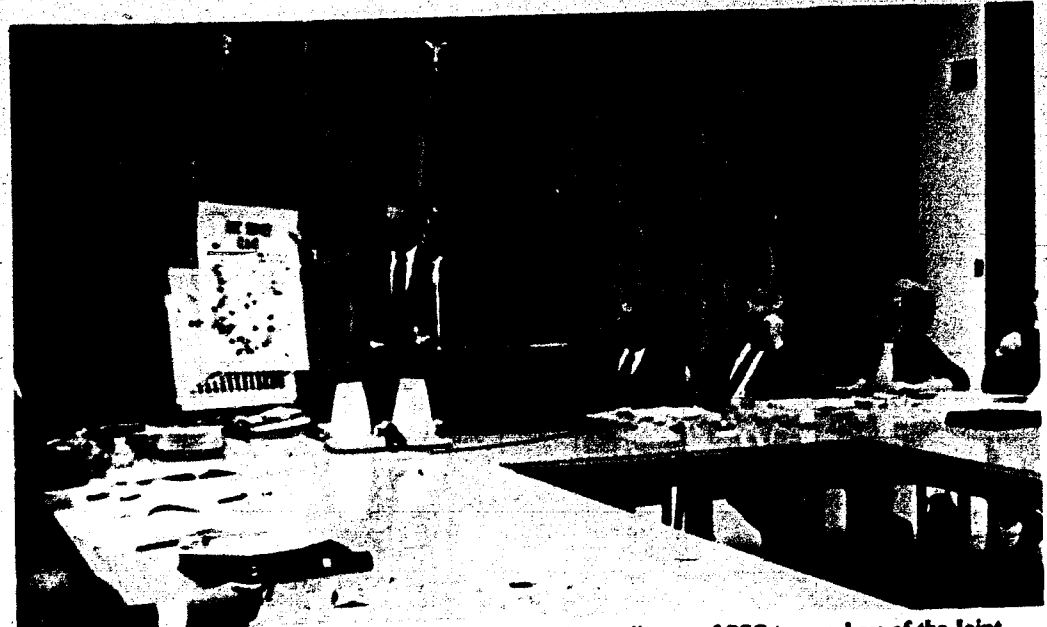

## Cut In Vo-Tec Budget Shakes BSC Prexy

The only state-supported institution of higher learning to survive a budget reduction by Gov. Don Samuelson in his recommendations to the 40th Idaho Legislature, Boise State College is still in "the red".

At a hearing of the Joint Senate Finance and House Appropriations Committee Tuesday, Boise State College President John B. Barnes presented the college's budget and re-introduced a call for \$500,000 in matching funds for

the \$1 million vocational-technical building, which the State Department of Vocational Education had agreed to pay. The funds were included in a \$5.5 million BSC construction program authorized by the State Board of Education, which were to be funded with student fees.

### Committee Requests Budget

The budget Barnes presented to the committee for study was the \$11.5 million budget that was presented to the state board last July and reduced to \$9.2 million.

The final elimination of the matching funds was made by Samuelson in his executive budget announced Monday in his 1969 message to the Idaho legislators.

In talking before the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee, Dr. Barnes urged that the \$500,000 matching funds for Vo-Tec be re-instated in the budget or surplus funds be used to defray the need.

Barnes also told the committee that the vocational education department had requested \$1,628,000 for the college, and that \$720,000 was cut by the governor, including the \$500,000 for the building.

First priority has been given the vocational-technical building, Barnes said. "We can get along without the remaining \$220,000 cut from the vocational education budget, if we can get the building," he stated. Other buildings included in the program include a new stadium, classroom building and library addition.

Another major problem in the reduced budget, Barnes told the group, was the "need to increase the total reading resources in the library."

It was noted in the meeting that BSC alone survived a cut in requested budgets from the State Board; the governor trimmed the budgets of the

other three higher education institutions by \$5.5 million.

### BC Goes State; Brings Assets

Look from a different angle at Boise State College and its effect on the state system of higher education, the Idaho taxpayer also can see assets the college is giving to the state.

Approximately \$20,331,449 in assets are going into the state system from BSC. The valuation of the present buildings on campus is \$9,423,416. Equipment is valued at \$2,588,033 and the land is valued at \$2,420,000.

Also included in assets for which the state does not have to pay are three buildings to be financed through student fees which totals \$5,900,000, including a general classroom office building, vocational-technical building and stadium-swimming pool-physical education building.

#### Changes at BSC

From a junior college to a state-supported four-year college, Boise State now has students attending from 104 gem cities, who are offered baccalaureate degrees in 38 major fields of study.

Now Idaho residents may attend BSC for \$139.00 plus books. This applies to freshmen, sophomores and upper-division students.

## BSC Gets Loan Fund

Boise State College has been awarded \$18,200 by the Department of Justice to Establish a law enforcement student loan and grant program, according to Dr. Gerald R. Reed, special projects director.

The loan and grant program was authorized by the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to encourage and assist persons pursuing or interested in law enforcement careers.

The program will make available 10-year low interest notes up to \$1800 per year to full-time students enrolled in undergraduate programs leading to degrees in areas directly related to law enforcement, Dr. Reed said.

Also included in the program, according to Dr. Reed, are tuition and fees grants for full-time or part-time students in an undergraduate program leading to a degree in an area related to law enforcement. Beneficiaries for the fees and tuition grants must be full-time employees of a publicly-funded law enforcement agency and must agree to remain in the service of the employing agency for a period of two years following completion of any course of study funded by the grant.

# Folk Singers To Appear In Concert Tonight

One of England's finest folk artists, Louis Killen, and a campus favorite, Rosalie Sorrels, will hold their own folksong revival tonight at folk scene enthusiasts listen to as "comparison between his thing and her thing" at 8 p.m. in the liberal arts auditorium.

Killen, who has been in America for one year, is a personal friend of the Boise entertainer and will share his traditional folk songs with her in concert. Rosalie sings contemporary with traditional overtones plus guitar and banjo; Killen is noted for his authentic performance of the true traditional songs and his ability to "really sing satisfactorily unaccompanied."

Having sung all his life, Killen first took serious interest in the folksongs of his native England during his late teens and then became associated with a group of traditional song enthusiasts in Oxford. Later, he helped form "Folksong and Ballad Newcastle", which now is one of the most important clubs in

Britain where traditional song is authentically performed.

Unlike many American folk singers, Killen has developed an unusually subtle and sensitive unaccompanied singing style, to match "a repertoire of the grand and vigorous story songs and love songs from the English countryside."

He also delights most audiences with an introduction of the English concertina into a few of his songs. At the age of 35, this moustached and goateed artist will be a colorful and talented addition to the college's list of '69 entertainers.

The concert, Rosalie explained, will include a series of selections from each artist and a few songs they will sing together. "Our songs are nothing alike in style or delivery but they are similar in how they grew up," Rosalie said.

The concert is included in the college's spring semester schedule of entertainment, sponsored by the Lyceum Committee.

# Reader's Theatre Features Thurber

Keeping with their own "un-tradition" at Boise State, the talented company of the Subal Theatre will try another first Friday, Jan. 24 with a Reader's Theatre presenting Thurber Carnival.

When the curtain opens at 8:15 p.m., drama and speech instructor John Smead will direct a troop of student actors in reading the finest of author James Thurber Selections to be used include "Secret Life of Walter Mitty", "Life and Forget", "Mr. Preble Gets Rid of His Wife", "The Night the Bed Fell", "University Days" and "The Last Flower". Also included are some of Thurber's cartoons and drawings, which will be projected on a screen.

Readers include Dave Emry, Lois Gavens, Don Hawkins, Duane Hood, Carl Larsen, Christine Munson, Michele Morrison, Ben Plummer and Bruce Zimmerman.

Smead, who is introducing the Reader's Theatre on campus and this style of drama can actually present some types of literature more effectively than could a fully acted performance. Humorous incidents, for example, are much funnier when retold than when seen take Jack Benny's old car (which was always funnier on radio than on television) or James Thurber's "The Night the Bed Fell." Smead explained.

He added that in the Reader's Theatre the audience must actually participate. The emphasis is on the writer rather than the performer, and the reader's basic goal is to stimulate the audience's imagination.

The audience may expect some stage action because as Smead stated, "I don't believe in rules for Reader's Theatre, which include the reader may gesture but never move around the stage."

"The aim of this production is to present Thurber, as much as possible, in his own terms," he said.

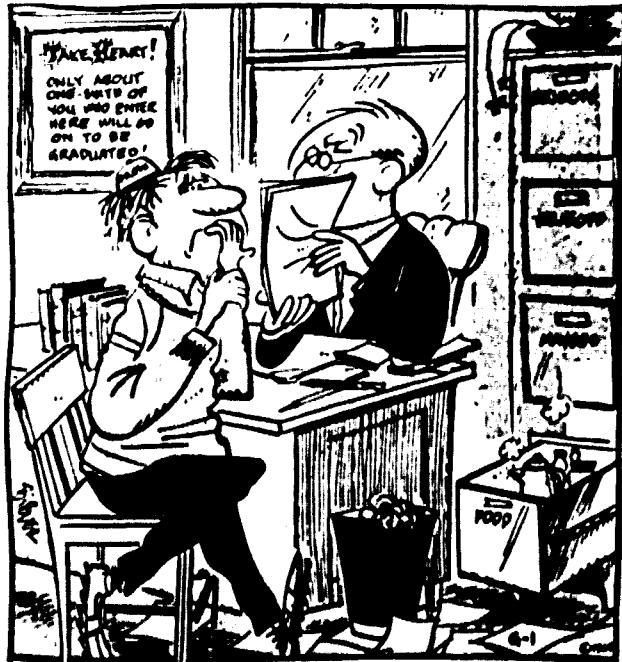

# Broncos Cap 5-6 Record In Christmas Cage Play

Returning from road trips before semester break and during the Christmas holidays, the Boise State Broncos returned with a 5-6 record in the still young season. In a Dec. 12 contest with Whitworth College, the Broncos dropped a close 72-76 game to the Pirates.

The Boise crew then traveled to Carroll College in Helena, Mont. on Dec. 13, and managed a 82-75 overtime thriller. With final exams completed early, the Broncos flew to Portland, and managed a 85-82 victory over the highly touted Portland State team on Dec. 20. A Dec. 21 game with Cascade College also of Portland was cancelled by Cascade officials.

After a much needed Christmas rest, the Broncos made a five-day swing into Utah and Montana, playing four games. Boise State invaded Utah on Jan. 3 and 4. In the first game, the Broncos dropped a 88-89 heartbreaker to the Westminster Parsons. Boise traveled to Weber State the next day, only to lose a lop-sided 90-63 game to the Wildcats of the Big Sky Conference. Last year, the Broncos were able to contain the 'cats big center Willie Sojourner when Wes Willie played freshman ball, but the tall sophomore garnered 27

points and 21 rebounds to lead the Weber crew.

Boise State traveled to Dillon, Mont. and split a pair with the Western Montana College Bulldogs on Jan. 6 and 7. In the first contest, the Broncos stopped the Bulldogs 79-66, and in the second fray, Boise lost a highly contested game to the Bulldogs, 70-76.

When the Boise State squad returned from the road trip, Don Barnes and Rudy Peters were lost due to scholastic ineligibility. After final exams, however, the Broncos were joined by Renee Ruth, a veteran backcourt man from the '65-66 and '66-67 seasons. Ruth, a fine shot from both the charity line and the field averaged 9.8 points per game in the four holiday contests.

After the first 11 games (through Jan. 4), Bill Oley lead Boise in scoring with a 16.1 average. Wendy Hart followed with 14 per game, Don Barnes 11, Ruth 9.8, and Rodell Hill garnered 8.2 points per game. Oley also lead in rebounding with 166 grabs, followed by Keith Burke with 74, Big Don Barnes pulled down 60 rebounds, followed by Austin with 37 and Wendy Hart with 33.

# Broncos Top Mounties, Even Score with ISU

The Boise State Broncos fought off a stubborn Eastern Oregon College Mountie squad, 75-57, in a cage contest played Jan. 14 in LaGrande, Ore.

Boise started off to an early lead, but the stubborn LaGrande defense helped the Mounties stay close to the Broncos. When the buzzer at the half sounded, Boise State lead by a small 33-29 margin. The BSC crew stayed within close range of the Broncos, but with approximately three minutes to go in the contest, Boise started to pull away.

Wendy Hart opened up in the second half and paced the Bronco scoring with 18. Renee Ruth added 14, Keith Burke 13 and Ron Austin had 11. Wyand Hart came off the bench and pumped in 10 more markers. Leading scorer in the season for the Broncos, Bill Otey, shot sparingly and added seven more points to the Bronco effort.

Forward Mike Shields paced the Mounties with 19 and LaGrande's leading scorer Ashley Court added 16.

The win put Boise State above the .500 mark with a 7-6 record, while the Mountie season is at 5-6.

The Boise State College Broncos completely turned the tables on the ISU Bengals in a Jan. 11 contest when the Broncs reared to a 93-75 cage victory in the BSC Pavilion.

The Boise win avenged Nov. 30 loss 63-67 and evened the season series between the clubs at one game apiece. In the opening five minutes of the game the Broncos held the Bengals scoreless while running up a 12-0 lead. The Boise Club was never headed as they led 42-29 at halftime and coasted to a 93-75 victory.

Bill Otey paced the Broncs with 17 rebounds and 24 points. Keith Burke had 17 caroms, Renee Ruth 16 and Wendy Hart and Ron Austin had 14 markers apiece.

ISU's tricky guard O'Neal Simmons lead all scorers and the Bengals with 25.

## Skiers Go to Canada

Boise State College will be represented this Saturday and Sunday in skiing, as the Rebel Stock, British Columbia, Canada Slalom Derby will be held. Attending, according to BSC Ski Coach Mike Hogan, will be four BSC Ski Competitors. Also, one second-semester BSC student will compete unattached.

Leading the contingent will be Cindy Fiske, who was second in the Class A Women's Giant Slalom last Sunday, in the Engen Cup Races at McCall's Brundage Mountain. BSC Ski Team Captain Steve Chandler leads the male participants. Accompanying Miss Fiske and Chandler will be: Jim Cronk, who was second in the Engen Cup's Giant Slalom for Men; and Tab Morgan, who finished fifth in the Giant Slalom at the Engen Cup. A fifth participant, who will compete unattached, will be former Boise College student Brian Smith. Smith recently attended College of Idaho, and will attend BSC during Spring Semester, but will be ineligible for BSC team competition. He was second in the Engen Cup's Slalom Race.

## Bronc To Compete In Bogus Race

Boise State College's top Cross-Country Skier, John Armstrong, will compete in the Bogus Basin-hosted Cross Country race, this Sunday, Jan. 19 at Bogus. Armstrong tied for 13th in last weekend's Giant Slalom at the Engen Cup. Armstrong, a former member of the U. S. Biathlon team when in the service, is Boise State's top contender for the Skimeister award. This award is presented at each college ski meet to the statistically outstanding competitor in four events—slalom, downhill, jumping, and cross-country.

The ticket book contains tickets for next week's home games with Northwest Nazarene Jan. 21, College of Idaho Jan. 23, and a contest Jan. 24 with Portland State.

It will mark the first contest with the cross-Treasure Valley rivals, the NNC Crusaders of Nampa. Coach Orin Hills' Crusaders are led by Steve Sandlin and Gary Lawson in both scoring and rebounding. Coach Dick Carrow's C of I Coyotes will try to avenge an earlier 56-72 loss to the Broncs on the Caldwell court. The Coyotes are paced in scoring by Center Jerome Selby with a 11.9 average, and by Henry Hudgens and Bob Hall with 10 points per game each.

Boise squeaked by Portland State in a close 85-82 contest, Dec. 20 in Portland. The Vikings are led by 6'7" Leon Edmunds who scored 32 points in the Portland fray, and has been averaging over 40 points per game since that time.

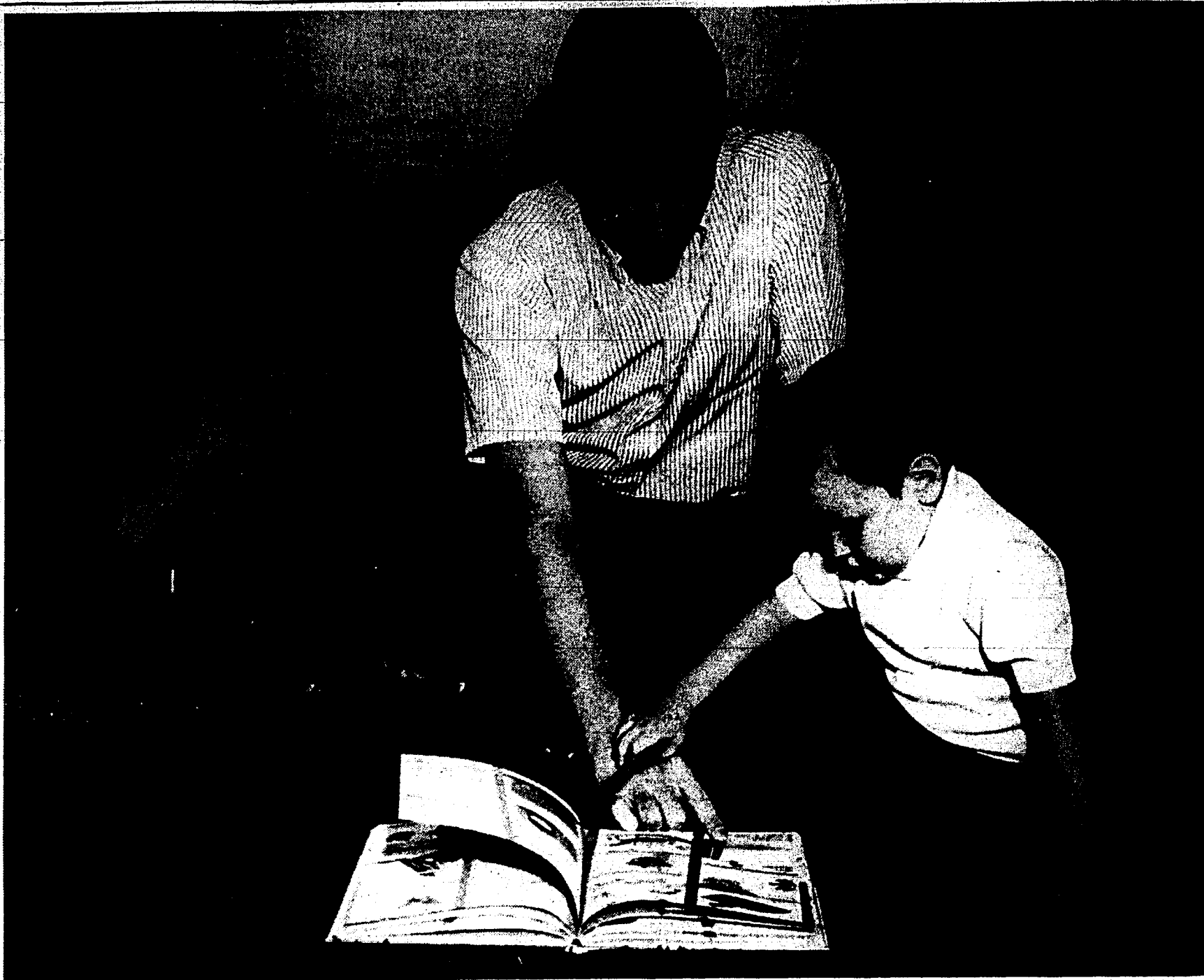
