Rumor has it that Tommy James and the Shondells played in concert at the BSC Gym Saturday night, March 15. Yeh, that's about all it is, too.

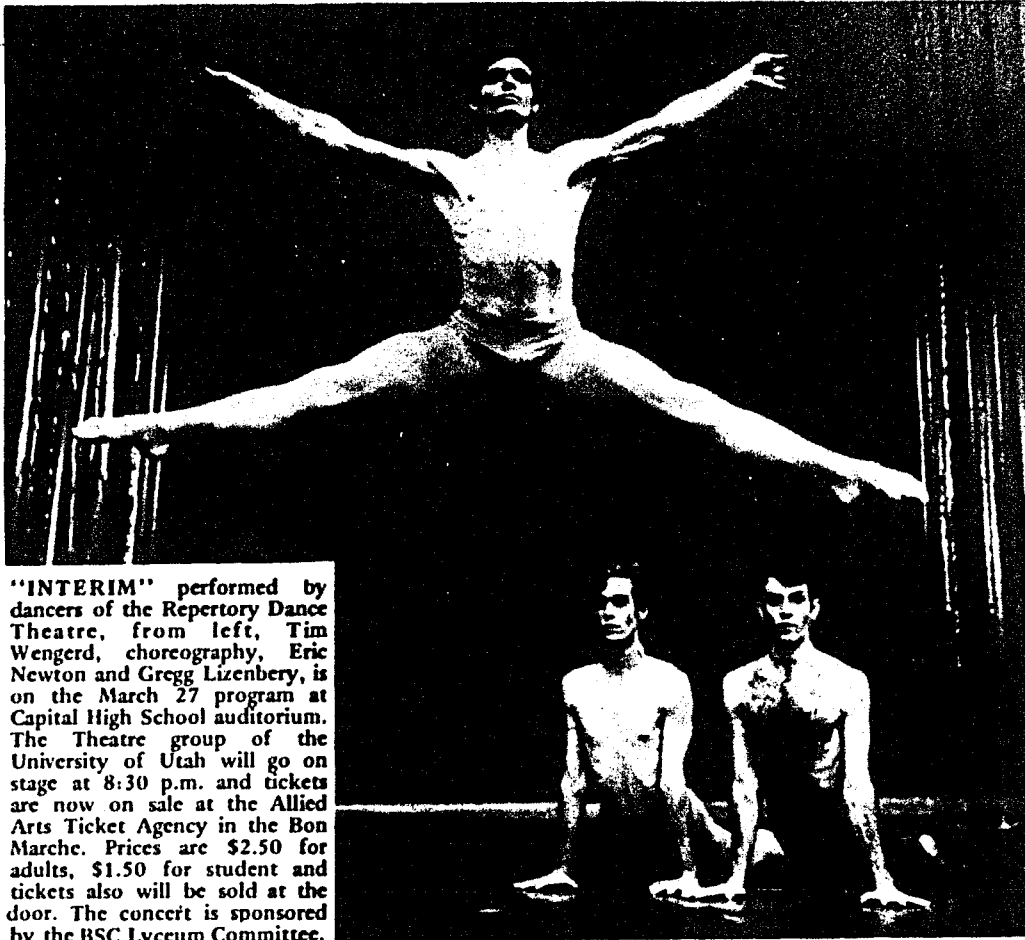

NSA Fights CAB On Student Fares

Washington, D.C. —The United States National Student Association (NSA) will fight the recommendations of a Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB) examiner calling for the abolition of youth fares as "unjustly discriminatory," and has retained legal counsel to prepare briefs and oral arguments for presentation before the CAB.

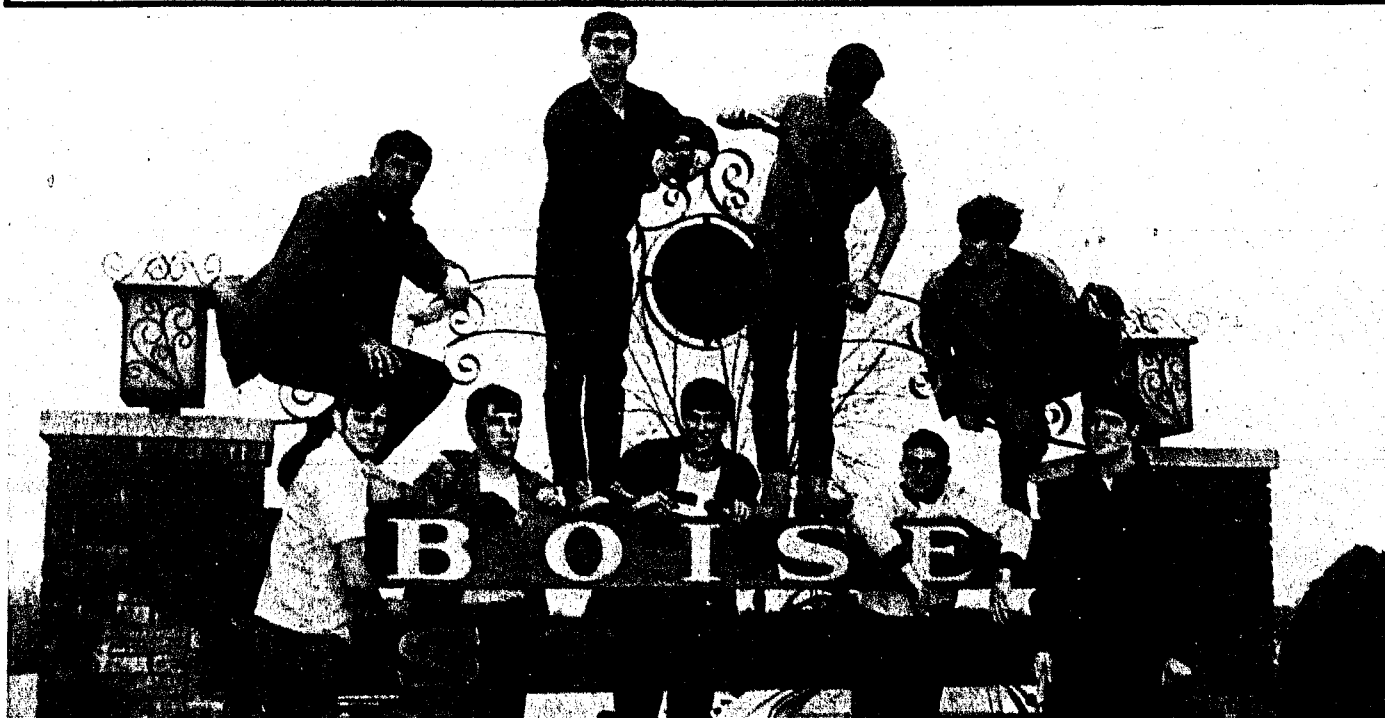
The announcement of NSA's action came from Services Division director Alan C. Handell, who noted that at present the association is the only group representing student users of the airline youth fare which will make arguments before the Federal board.

Abolition of youth fares is being sought by a number of bus companies. NSA will argue that in view of the educational, social, economic, and cultural benefits afforded by the youth fares and young adult fares, the fares should not be cancelled.

Written arguments were presented to the CAB Feb. 26. Oral arguments will be made at a later date. NSA is being represented by the Washington law firm of Koteen and Burt, who are experts in air fares matters.

Those who are interested in ardent discourse while in the library are urged to meet in the SUB until you are ready to hand a list of acceptable criteria to the head librarian.

Those who patrons of silence in study are asked to convene when able in the library in order to meditate on the subject until you can find a table of criteria acceptable to the library staff.

Until the matter is decided, those members of the student body who are not concerned with the direct arbitration of these disputes will be expected to respect the views of the library staff while using the school facilities.

Sen. Church Slates Airline Rate Bill

WASHINGTON. Senator Frank Church is co-sponsoring legislation which would give airlines statutory authority to offer half-price fares to students.

The legislation grew out of a proposed decision issued by a Civil Aeronautics Board hearing examiner on January 21 to do away with the half-price fare now offered by many airlines to young people between the ages of 12 and 21.

In addition to students, Church explained, the legislation would also assure statutory authority for airlines to continue offering half-price fares to military personnel and, for the first time, to offer such fares to the elderly and the handicapped.

The legislation does not compel airlines to offer the reduced fares, Church noted. "Rather, it gives the airlines the legislative authority to do so without CAB interference."

"Students visiting their families, elderly persons seeking to visit their relatives, military personnel on leave, and the handicapped—all often must live on reduced incomes which make air travel too costly," Church said.

The announcement was made by athletic director Lyle Smith. Smith said Polychronis will join the staff this week.

The Idaho state legislature is currently under fire for its involvement with the Sex Education picture in Idaho public schools. The bill, as written, will allow sex education to be taught on a prescription basis, i.e., each school district can elect to use the program or not.

Even though world-wide planned-parenthood and sex education is needed in the light of the rise in population and the feared decrease of food production, there are those die-hards that seem to feel that "whatever is good" enough for the nation, ain't necessarily so here.


Sex education as proposed could diminish the number of illegitimate births in the state, but the ultra-right wing conservatives are working as hard or harder than the proponents of the bill to see that sex education is kept from the student curriculum.

In addition to minimizing illegitimate births, sex education would also be an asset to persons entering into marital situations in which sex plays an important role. It has long been recognized that a mature, accurate view of sex makes for a mature attitude in marriage as far as sexual relationships go. The result would be fewer separations, divorces, and broken families.

Letters appearing in the Idaho Statesman have continually spoken of seeing material that will be in sex education courses. The authors have been furious that such material will be given to students in lecture, and many will probably get our wonderful gov to throw that down the tube along with educational funding and the fluoridation bill.

I am under the assumption that the state legislature must have legitimate reasons for attempting a measure such as

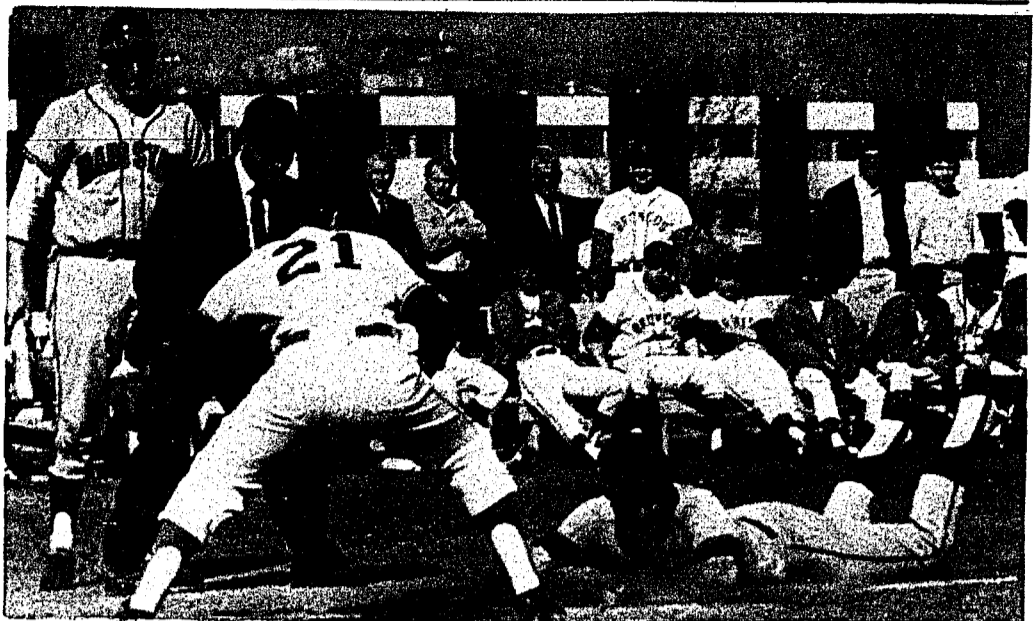

BSC Splits Baseball Opener With the Idaho State Bengals

BOISE'S BILL SCHUETZ (21) beats ISU's Tom Klingforth to the plate in the first game of the season for the BSC Broncos. The Bengals won the first contest 15-6, but the Broncos came back in the nightcap 4-1.

The BSC Broncos opened their season March 15 when they split a double header with the ISU Bengals. The Bengals ripped the Broncos in the opener 15-6 and the Broncos turned the tables on the Bengals in the nightcap, 4-1.

In the first game, the ISU bats bombed the Broncos with 12 hits, including five extra-base hits. Bengal Ralph Gonzales hit his second homer of the season in the top of the seventh inning. Big blows for ISU also came from the bats of Boyd Gailey, Tom Klingforth, Dick Clute and Jim Wilson.

Boise was paced by Ken Kushlan with a double and a triple and by Bob Peterson with a pair of doubles in the first game.

In the second game, BSC's Dan Smith muzzled the Bengal guns with a four-hitter. All four of Boise's runs came in the third when Hal Takahasi and Jim Bianchi walked with one down and Peterson was given an intentional walk loading the bases. Hurler Smith was hit by a pitched ball bringing home one run and Kushlan then laced a double to deep center, scoring the other three runs.

The Broncos are now 1-1 for the season, while the Bengals have a 4-1 mark on the slate. Boise plays all of its slate until April 9 in Boise. NNC is scheduled March 25, College of Southern Idaho (two games) March 29, C of I April 1, and the College Classic is slated April 4-5 in several Boise locations.

The TVCC Chukars are slated April 8 and the Broncos travel to the College of Idaho April 9.
