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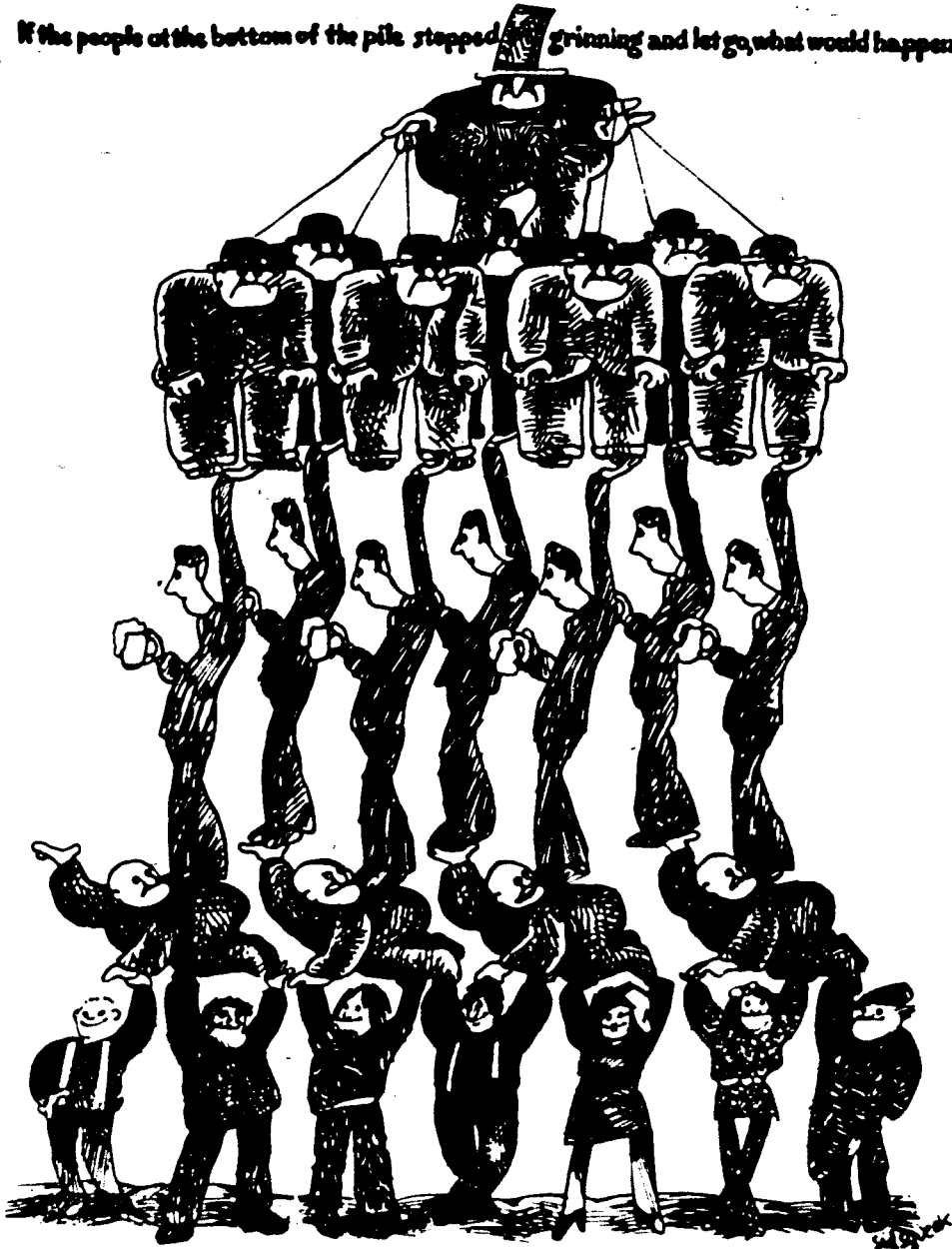

Something happened on the way to the FORUM: ASB proposed Constitution

(Ed Note The following is the Associated Student Body Proposed Constitution, as prepared by the Student Senate. The text will be followed by two amendments, one dealing with cumulative GPA's for election candidates, and one dealing with the impeachment of any ASB officers. Explanations to the amendments are included. The document is up for a school-wide referendum Feb. 26.)

ASB President Wayne Mittlender has outlined these major changes in the new constitution.

Here they are for student inspection:

1. Elections will be conducted in the spring, to let the Senate and ASB officers get more work done during the summer months.
2. There is a division between legislative and executive branches.
3. A Judicial system is set up with faculty and students to provide stability.
4. Candidates for ASB president and vice president will run together in the election.

Other changes in the constitution will be discussed during the forum next Wednesday in the SUB, 11:30a.m.-1:30 p.m.

The following Amendments recommended by the On-campus policy committee for the newly proposed constitution. They have been placed back into committee for clarification, following debate will be brought to the floor of the Senate Tuesday.

Article V Elections and Qualifications

Section II Clause 1 (Amendment)

To read: Students shall have a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA standing at the time of election to office and must maintain minimum college standards throughout their entire tenure of office.

Cumulative GPA proposed in the new document initially requires a 2.25 at the time of election.

Article II Legislative Branch (additional clause)

Section 1 Senate, Clause 3, Duties of the Senate (addition) To Impeach, for good cause, any officer of the ASBSC by two-thirds vote of all voting members. In such cases the ASBSC justices shall preside.

Article IV Judicial Branch

Section 3, Powers of the ASBSC Judiciary (additional clause) To preside over impeachment proceedings in Senate.

ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF BOISE STATE COLLEGE CONSTITUTION

We, the Students of Boise State College, in order to promote and maintain those endeavors germane to student government, do establish this constitution, the purpose of which shall be to provide for the organized conduct of student affairs and to promote the education, social, and cultural activities of the students of Boise State College, to finance student activities, to act as the official voice of the student body, to facilitate student participation in the college community for the betterment of Boise State College, to discharge the authority vested in this association by the State of Idaho and the president of the College and to assume such powers and perform such duties as may arise in acting as the official representatives of the student body, do hereby ordain and establish the following constitution.

Article I Name and Membership Section 1

Name We, the Associated Students under this Constitution, shall be known as the Associated Students of Boise State College hereafter referred to as ASBSC.

Section 2 Membership All full-time enrolled students of the

college shall be members of the ASBSC with all the rights privileges, responsibilities in any activity to which the authority of the Constitution extends.

Article II Legislative Branch Section 1 Senate

Clause 1 Membership—the Senate shall consist of twelve (12) members to be elected proportionally according to the number of full-time enrolled students in each of the schools.

Clause 2 The ASBSC Vice President shall serve as Chairman of the Senate. He will vote only in case of a tie or to make a two-thirds (2/3) majority.

Clause 3 Duties of the Senate

- A. The Senate shall be the supreme policy-making body of the ASBSC.
- B. To initiate and approve by majority vote all by-laws or student regulations. After approval the proposal shall be reviewed by the ASBSC President and approved or vetoed within two (2) school weeks. The veto of the ASBSC President may be overruled by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all voting members of the Senate.
- C. To approve by majority vote of all voting members any presidential appointee.
- D. Grant official recognition

to campus organizations in accordance with the by-laws and policies of the College and the Senate.

- E. To hear and take appropriate action on proposals made by students-at-large.
- F. Meeting, Rules and Absences. The Senate shall meet weekly during the regular school year. A majority of all voting members shall constitute a quorum. The Senate shall operate according to Robert's Rules of Order, unless otherwise provided for. If a Senate member is absent during his term from three (3) regular meetings, without a reason acceptable to two-thirds (2/3) of all members, the position shall be declared vacant and then filled by appointment.
- G. The Senate shall have legislative authority over all ASBSC funds and property subject to the provisions of this constitution and the laws of the State of Idaho.
- H. The Senate shall establish and determine the functions of all ASBSC committees or boards.
- I. The Senate shall enact such other legislation as may be necessary for the general welfare of the ASBSC.

Sentence termed uneven treatment of offenses

A four-year prison sentence imposed on a 21-year-old college student for possession of marijuana is excessive. It is also an example of the uneven treatment of offenses under the law.

Judge Sherman Bellwood of Rupert made the headlines across the state last year when he sentenced six young offenders to the penitentiary on drug charges.

In a speech delivered Friday, and reprinted on this page, he describes the shortcomings of the prison system. The record of penitentiaries is that they reduce the chances that the people confined in them can go on to useful lives.

Aside from that, a four-year prison sentence is hardly justified for possession of marijuana. The person is hurting himself,

not other members of society. As an anti-social act it hardly compares with drunken driving, which endangers innocent lives and probably kills more than 100 people a year in Idaho.

There is a continuing debate about the effects of marijuana. We believe our society would be better off without it. But many young people don't believe it. A recent survey indicated that 40 per cent of college students had tried marijuana.

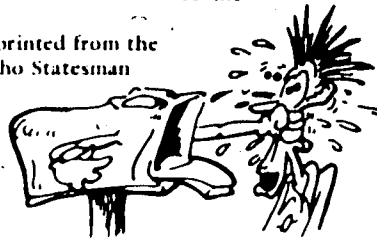
The problem won't be solved by making an example of this young person or that one with a prison sentence. Law enforcement is required to control the drug traffic. But putting people in prison for possession of marijuana does not solve the problem.

Judge Bellwood's comments about the prisons are true. Our practice has been to put people into a penitentiary and tell them to reform — and then impose conditions that lessen the chances that they will.

Usually a judge will conclude, quite reasonably, that the chances of helping a young person arrested for the first time on a drug charge are better with probation than the penitentiary. Confinement, by itself, cures no drug problem. And there are drugs in penitentiaries, too.

While the public may applaud the judge who throws the book at a first-time marijuana user, we are kidding ourselves if we think this is justice or that it solves the drug problem.

I've followed with particular interest the recent controversy concerning the social activities here at Boise State. Mr. Ertter's editorial brought out some not-worthy comments.

I was sorry, however, to see so many attacks on values. Judgment or condemnation of a person's tastes in music is immature and not consistent with the appreciation for all the arts one should obtain from a Liberal Arts education.

The solution to our entertainment problem here at BSC is forthcoming in Senate

Bill No. 8, which proposes a College Union Program Board. It recognizes the inability of any one person to handle all of the social activities. By providing some twelve different committees to carry out every facet of entertainment from pop concerts to art shows, the College Union Program Board will prove far more effective than one person could hope to be.

At this time, I think Mr. Weber (along with all the activities directors in the past) deserve a round of congratulations for a job well

done, considering the budget problems, etc.

Some of the areas the new Program Board should consider are:

1. Are proms, balls, and other dances out of date? Why aren't they attended by a higher percentage of the student body?
2. Does the ASB of Boise State want several pop concerts of just one or two big name bands and pay more for them out of our fees?
3. Why aren't the lectures attended better? Should we have fewer of them and more

prominent speakers?

4. Does the foreign film series and the popular film series need better support and publicity? Why isn't it better attended?

Of course these are just a few of the many ideas that need analysis. With the help of the ARBITER to convey our ideas to the Program Board, I think all of us should support and participate in the formative stages of this new Board. Let's not wait until after a concert to complain. Let's give our ideas and opinions to those in charge

of bringing in outside bands so the success of the concert will be assured.

One thought came to mind when I read the letters in last week's ARBITER (and it probably goes without saying) but I feel that a lot more constructive progress would come about if people would separate an idea from a personality and criticize the idea, not the person. If attacks on people's tastes and character continue, communication will degenerate to the point of name-calling.

dance by Creason Photography for the price of \$3.10, which includes two 5x7 and four wallet size pictures. Payments must be made when the pictures are taken.

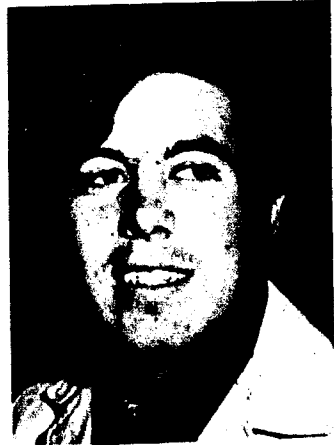
Balloting for the king and queen will be from 8:30 to 2:30 p.m. in the SUB, Business Building and Library.

Qualifications, deadlines announced for summer Outbound Ambassador tour

Administrative Assistant to Dr. John Barnes, Robert Gibb, has announced qualifications and deadlines for the 1971 Outbound Ambassador Program, sponsored by Boise International Club, the Boise State Student Body, alumni, faculty and administration.

Five scholarships ranging from \$600-\$800 each will be given to Bolivia, Greece, Turkey, Uganda, Yugoslavia and France. The six week tour for this summer will include homestay, travel and study.

Gibb says the program is open to full-time freshmen, sophomores, juniors at Boise State under 30 years of age.

Applications for the program can be obtained in Gibb's office, Business Building 307, executive suite

Students can earn from two to eight semester credits in cross-cultural studies from School for International Training, Putney, Vt. or

University of Nevada.

Deadline for completed applications with references is March 1, 1971.

Qualifications are flexibility, initiative, good health, sense of humor, interest in people and other cultures, willingness to share experiences with community on return home.

Gibb stresses a high GPA is not of first priority in selection of students, but it is one factor.

Scholarship committee members are 21 prominent Boise citizens, with Lum Gerner as chairman. John Hunt is president of the Boise International Club.

Last year five awards totaling \$4,140 were given to Mike Cowman, who went to Japan; Julie Lachiondo, Spain; Sandy Savage, Germany; Rich Wade, Mexico and Amy Young, Switzerland.

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Roving Reporter

This week's roving reporter question is:

Do you feel that government, either federal, state or local, has the right to dictate (legislate) matters of personal taste, such as a public ban on smoking, censorship of movies, compulsory use of motorcycle helmets or car seat belts? And why?

Dr. John Caylor, Professor of History: "Yes, I think the federal, state or local I don't say on any particular one, like the use of motorcycle helmets, but I think they have the right to, yes. In certain areas, I think it is necessary for the society, the public, to regulate those things that will have an adverse effect."

Kelly Bickle: "No, I don't think the government should have any say on what you want to do. It's your own life. Like wearing motorcycle helmets, and, as for the ban on smoking, if you want to do it, it's your own initiative, because this is supposed to be the free state. If you want to mess up your life by smoking or not wearing a motorcycle helmet, it doesn't matter."

Colleen Rawlins: "No, I don't feel the government has the right to dictate to the students, because it's up to the student who rides the motorcycle, for instance. It's him who is taking his life in his hands. They can't judge a person's rights. The students should be old enough to decide what they want to do. I just feel it's our own constitutional right."

Scott Lattimer: "Personally, I feel that government has no right in such matters of personal tastes. I think that if you want to wear a motorcycle helmet, it's up to you, and with seat belts it's up to the individual. I think the government should be a little more de-centralized and a little less powerful."

Cheryl Plummer: "I don't feel that they have the right to dictate legislation on personal taste. On seat belts, I think it's necessary. I think that's justified, because of safety, but I don't agree with censorship of movies, because everyone should be able to make up their own mind. I think there is a difference between physical safety and psychological safety. People can decide that they aren't always taking their safety with the physical aspects, but they are pretty careful with their morals. It's up to the people."

Fred Norman, Assistant Professor, Theatre Arts: "Well, I tend to be a little traditional in my thinking. I personally think that all things in life are not relative and someone has to govern. I think that law and order is the necessity in any society, in any facet. I believe in control. I think there is a difference between the wearing of motorcycle helmets and censorship of movies, but I do believe in a control situation where we are guided. There has to be guidance somewhere."

Wayne Mittleider, ASB President: "I would answer no. I believe there are personal choices, harming no one else except yourself. I think these are personal rights, and as long as a person practicing his right does not interfere with the personal rights of others, then the government should not interfere. I believe the government could suggest that a person wear helmets, seat belts and not smoke, but it is not an issue requiring legislation."

18-year-old vote affects Idaho

By its historic 5-4 decision, the U.S. Supreme Court told President Nixon 18-year-olds had the right to vote in federal elections. The decision is having all sorts of affects in Idaho and the result has been a display of pain unequal since back when the days of the smoke filled back rooms began.

Idaho pundits have two choices: use separate ballots in future elections for federal and state officials or revamp existing statutes to come into line with the High Court's ruling. The choice causes no ends of sleepless nights for state

lawmakers and, to make matters worse, a pair of state solons have gone and ruined the whole affair, sponsoring legislation which would give college and university students the right to participate in state assemblies.

The bill provides each institution of higher education with one delegate plus one additional delegate for every 2,000 full time students. Introduced as personal legislation by Sens. Bill Crookham, Caldwell, and Charles Bilyeau, Pocatello, the measure has far reaching affects for party politics and sports

considerable opposition by party regulars as well in both political camps.

This worries the old-time party regular. His long-sought coalitions could break up. Party platforms, usually nothing more than stacks of paper, can have strong emphasis. Candidates will have to start courting student activists, which has not been done in the past.

Another bill introduced in the 41st Session further opens up the nominating process to the younger generation. Rep. Harold Snow, R-Moscow, and Assistant Majority Leader in the House,

sponsors the legislative which would give 18-year-olds the right to hold precinct positions at the county central committee level. This action has a much better chance of success than does Sen. Bill 1078.

Both bills will open the nominating process and they just might give rise to the chance that decision making won't be carried on in back rooms by power-hungry opportunists and we can move to a government of the people, by the people and for the people, not just a few.

Senators consider constitutional amendments, call for forum

Debate and more debate highlighted Tuesday's Senate meeting as ASB officers and senators carefully considered the newly proposed ASB constitution to be presented to the student body Feb. 26.

The newly proposed document was placed in committee again for clarification of the revisions of the on-campus policy committee. The ASB Constitution will be brought out of committee at next Tuesday's Senate meeting. In other action taken by the Senate, the following document was passed:

WHEREAS many important issues are facing the student body via the Student Senate, it is felt that to receive a greater feedback from the student body regarding issues that we will be making throughout the remainder of the year, a bi-weekly open forum be conducted in the College Union with the Senators present to explain the proposed legislation and receive a feedback from our constituency to more professionally represent our school; therefore, be it

RESOLVED that the ASB Senate go on record as favoring this program which will be held on Monday and Friday from 11:30-1:30 tentatively. Also passed by the Senate was the proposal to have an open forum for the BSC students concerning ASB proposed constitution at the SUB Wednesday from 11:30-1:30. BSC students will have the opportunity to discuss the newly proposed document with their senators.

Gary Felt was appointed to the ASB Senate

and received the oath of office Tuesday. Felt filled a recently vacated Arts and Letters position. The Debate team was allocated \$635 for two remaining debate trips. The monies had been cut in their original budget proposal. A Vo-Tech proposal asking for ASB funds to buy furniture for the vocational students lounge remained in committee for further investigation and is expected to come to the floor Tuesday for action.

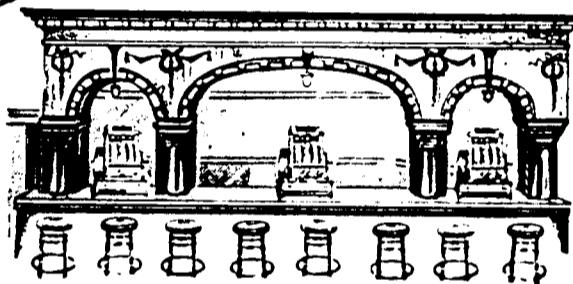

"I'D RATE IT A 95; YOU CAN'T REALLY DANCE TO IT. IT DOESN'T HAVE AN EXCELLENT BEAT, BUT YES, DICK, I'D BUY IT IN A SECOND."

It seems like yesterday, but it's been seven years that the genesis of the San Francisco hip movement introduced Ken Kesey, the Merry Pranksters, LSD and the Grateful Dead. In this time music has gone through stages that perpetually rose and fell.

Many of the original artists have disbanded, including those who erupted from the hippie charisma. These persons have not been able to stand the test of changing modes. The Grateful

Dead is one of the few groups that withstood the test of time and still retained a distinctive identity.

With the release of *Working Man's Dead*, the Grateful Dead introduced the public to what could probably be called country rock at its very best.

And now just released from Warner Brothers is the Dead's *American Beauty* album, perhaps one of the finest examples of musical mastery thus far in the history of rock n'roll.

While still containing a few tunes with their country flair such as *Operator*, *Box of Rain* and *Candyman*, *American Beauty* contains cuts which

establish the Grateful Dead as the miraculous master of contrast with harmonic soft rock melodies. For example, in *Antics of My Life*, a moving, flowing, four-part harmony, they concern themselves with a love worth loving.

Other cuts on the album include *Friend of the Devil*, *Sugar Magnolia*, *Ripple*, *Broken Palace*, *Till the Morning Comes and Truckin'*.

For an excellent listening adventure, the Grateful Dead's *American Beauty* should be played on fine stereo equipment with quiet and dimly lit surroundings. An added suggestion is a bottle of wine and a companion of the opposite

sex. Enhanced within dimensions ranging from big band jazz to a five-man blues band wonder, *Savoy Brown's Raw Sienna* comes on strong from start to finish, with amazing innovation and moving diversity.

Half of the album distinguishes itself with a horn section, comparable to that of *Chicago*, whereas the other half demonstrates the power contained within a well-executed electric sound.

In each cut the lyrics contain, maintain and sustain those listening to total amazement. In a song blatantly titled *Needle and Spoon*, *Savoy Brown* declares:

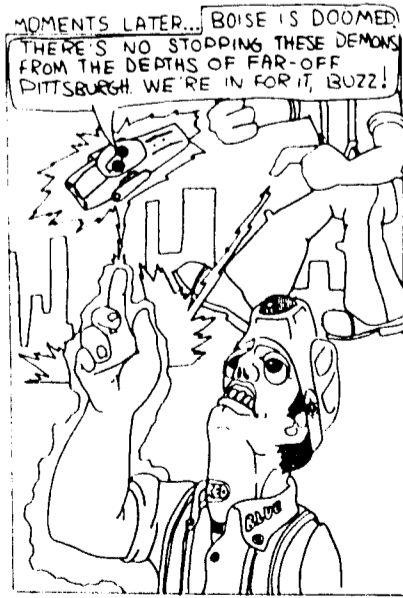
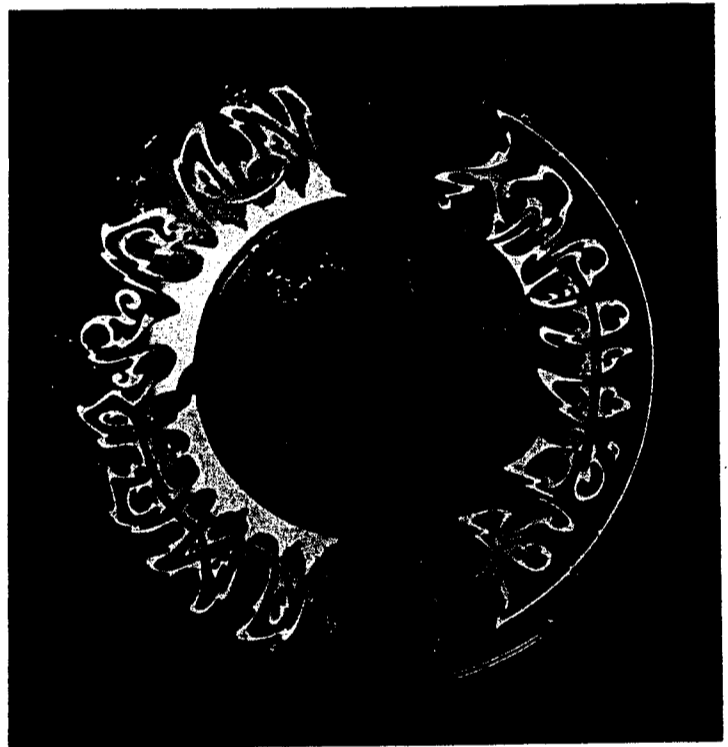
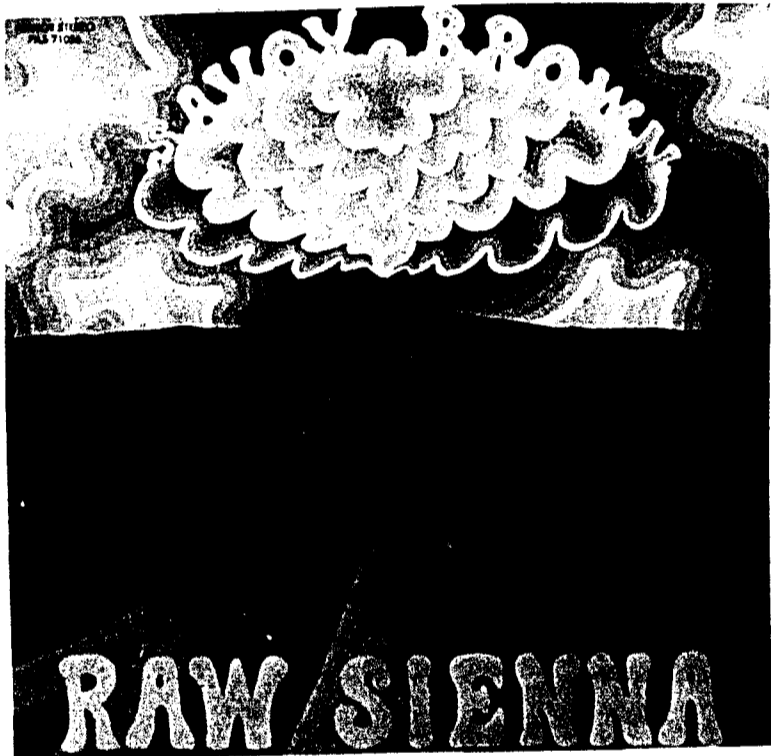

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Dr. Dodson Speaks

Dear Dr. Dodson:

I am a junior and still haven't decided upon an academic major. Or rather I've tried three majors, and still don't know what I'm really interested in. Does the Counseling Center give any tests that would tell me what I should become? By the way, I like school and my G.P.A. is 2.8

Undecided

Dear Un

Probably half of the students who come to the Counseling Center request assistance in academic or vocational planning. Sometimes testing seems appropriate, and at other times it does not.

There are no tests that "tell you what you should become." Ultimately, you will have to make that decision. However, we do often administer an interest

inventory which indicates how compatible your interests are with people actually employed in about 60 different occupations.

Specific aptitude measures and tests of general ability (IQ) are also often used in helping a student determine his educational and vocational objectives.

We sometimes discourage beginning freshmen from completing a battery of tests. Most freshmen are not entirely sure of their occupational objectives, but their interests begin to gel as they progress through the introductory courses. Since the tests cost us money, we sometimes prefer to "let nature take its course" rather than indiscriminately administering tests to every undecided freshman. This obviously doesn't apply to you, however.

I would encourage you to come in and talk with one of the counselors. An appropriate battery of tests will probably be administered, and we might be able to provide some relevant information concerning the current job market.

The Boise State College Women's Basketball team finished second in an invitational tournament held at BSC. Ricks College won the tourney, remaining undefeated through the two-day contest. Other teams included Northwest Nazarene College, Idaho State and the College of Idaho.

BSC rolled over Idaho State University 56-28 for the team's first victory. Penny Gillespy paced the winners with 20 points with Tom Turnbull adding 12 and Barb Eisenbarth hitting for 10. Barb and Tom both hauled down 17 rebounds apiece for honors.

Against NNC, Boise State came from behind in the second half to trounce Northwest 59-32. In that encounter, Eisenbarth finished as high

scorer with 12 points and also as high rebounder with 15. Penny and Carmen Latina collected 10 points each as Tom added nine points and Jayne VanWassenhove threw in eight. Chris Faulk was second in rebounds with 12.

In tie for first place, Boise State played Ricks College for the championship. Ricks clobbered Boise 86-38 behind the shooting and rebounding of a 6-1 forward and a 6-2 center. Turnbull put in 11 points before fouling out of the game and Jayne added 10 points to the total. Rebounds were few and far between as Diane Westbrook and Barb grabbed six each with Tom and Chris pulling down five apiece. BSC now has a 4-1 record.

Colts face Blue Mountain

Boise's Colt hoopsters will face Blue Mountain Junior College in loop action on the Bronco courts Feb. 13.

As of press time no statistics about the Blue Mountain team were available except that Boise State's frosh team fell to Blue Mountain 96-83 Jan. 14.

Some statistics were available on the BSC frosh up to and including Jan. 25.

The Blue Mountain game is the 17th game of Boise's 18 game schedule. BSC's Colts have won and lost games this season. Overall team statistics as of Jan. 25 credit the Colts with a 39.7% hitting average on field goals, 64.7% connection on free throws and 21.6 points per game.

Broncos host final home contests

Boise State College will be invaded by Montana teams this weekend as the University of Montana and Montana State University come to the BSC fieldhouse to reverse losses given to both teams last year at the hands of the Broncos.

UM lost to BSC 89-77 and MSU was defeated by a 69-68 score. Montana will play Saturday and Montana State will battle BSC Monday. Both games will begin at 8:00 p.m.

Lou Rocheleau is the new University of Montana boss. Even though this is Rocheleau's first year at the Grizzly helm, he held other coaching jobs and never had a losing team. Rocheleau, a graduate from UM in 1948, was an outstanding basketball and track athlete.

Likely starters for the Grizzlies will be Lonzo Lewis, 6-7 at center or forward, Ray Howard, 6-8 center or forward, Willie Bascus, 6-5 forward, Mike Vernon, 6-4 guard, and Don Wetzel, 6-1 guard.

Montana is located in Missoula and has an enrollment of 8,700. A renovation project on the Adams Field House is scheduled to begin this year at an estimated \$2.2 million. The new field house will provide 4,000 new seats for basketball and have facilities for wrestling, handball, gymnastics and indoor track. When completed, it will be one of the best in the nation.

Montana State had a dismal season last year with a 4-22 record. It was young Gary Hulst's first season as Bobcat boss. Hulst, 34, coached at Calumet, Iowa, Washington,

Iowa, Central Iowa Junior College and Bowling Green University. His overall record is 157 victories and 70 defeats.

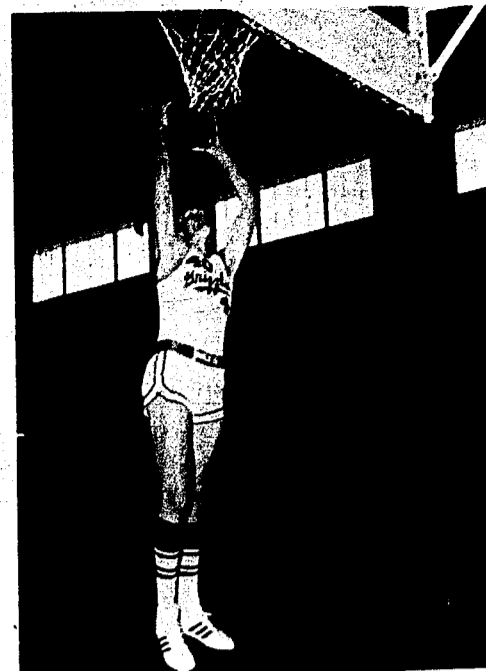
Coming up from last year's frosh team and like starters are Mark Beckwith, 6-8 center, Scott Koelzer, 6-8 forward, and Willie Weeks, 6-4½ forward. They helped lead that frosh five to a 14-4 record in the 1969-70 season.

Hulst picked up additional strength with Frank Hugee, 6-5 forward, Bill Lewis 6-4 forward, and Robert Jackson, 6-10 center. Any of these players could start for the Bobcats. An almost certain starter is Bill Brinkhouse, a 6-2 guard with catlike quickness and an average of 15 points a game last year.

Bronco Coach Murray Satterfield will go with his usual starting five with one possible exception. Ron Austin and Greg Bunn will go at the forwards and Steve Wallace at center. Bill Barnes nails down one guard slot and Ron Maxwell the other. But Maxwell has been hurting and had to be spelled on the recent two-game road trip to Ogden and Flagstaff, Ariz. If Maxwell is not ready, he'll be spelled by Dave Hunt.

Following the Montana clash Saturday, there will be an alumni function at the Rodeway Inn's Shoshone Room. Alumni Director Bob Willcuts said all alumni, friends of the college and students are invited to attend the affair. Willcuts added Satterfield will be the special guest at the festivities.

Atlanta Falcons Grab Faddie Tillman

Faddie Tillman, a 6-6, 230 pound defensive end for head Coach Tony Knap's Boise State Broncos, has been drafted by the Atlanta Falcons of the National Football League.

The veteran defensive standout was named by the NCF club as a tenth round choice and his initial reaction was: "I'm still in a state of shock." Tillman, who hails from Dallas, will complete his studies at Boise State this spring.

This week's wrestling action finds BSC playing host to the Vandal squad from the University of Idaho.

Article III Executive Branch

Section 1 Function

The function of the Executive Branch shall be to administer the affairs of the Associated Students and put into operation all policies adopted by the Legislative Branch. It shall coordinate relations with other student associations and with the college administration.

Section 2 Membership

Clause 1

The Executive Branch shall consist of three (3) elected members, and such other appointed positions as may be designated by the ASBSC President and/or the ASBSC Senate.

- A. President
- B. Vice President
- C. Treasurer

Section 3 Duties of Officers

Clause 1 President

- A. To be chief executive officer of the ASBSC.
- B. To be official representative of the ASBSC.
- C. To be responsible for the execution of all legislation.
- D. To make such appointments as the constitution and legislative acts may require, subject to a majority approval of all voting members of the ASBSC Senate, and to fill all vacancies, unless otherwise provided for in the constitution or legislative acts.
- E. To veto as he sees fit any law, rule, regulation or other action adopted by the ASBSC Senate by written notification to the Senate presented within two (2) school weeks following final passage of the enactment.
- F. To dismiss, with stated cause, any official, board member, or committee member appointed by him. He shall not dismiss any individual appointed by him to fill the vacancy of an elected officer.
- G. To perform such other duties as authorized by the ASBSC Senate.
- H. To submit to the ASBSC Senate for their approval a budget including associated student programs for the subsequent fiscal year. This shall be submitted as soon as possible at the beginning of the spring semester.
- I. To call and preside over the executive cabinet and to call special meetings of the Senate.
- J. To establish executive committees.
- K. To serve on the Student Conduct Board.
- L. To perform such other duties that may be necessary to promote the general welfare of the students.
- M. To serve as ex-officio member of all association committees.

Clause 2 Vice President

- A. He shall preside over the meetings of the ASBSC Senate.
- B. He shall serve as chief administrative officer of the ASBSC Senate.
- C. He shall assume the duties of the President during his absence and shall succeed to the office of the President in the event it becomes vacant.
- D. He shall carry out all proper duties assigned to him by the president or the Senate.

E. He shall serve on the Student Conduct Board.

Clause 3 Treasurer

- A. To be the financial officer of the ASBSC, and to administer the financial affairs of the ASBSC.
- B. The financial records of the ASBSC shall be open to the members of the ASBSC.
- C. To be responsible for the proper execution of all fiscal legislation.
- D. To submit monthly to the ASBSC Senate a report of the general fund of the ASBSC.
- E. To serve as chairman of the Financial Board.
- F. To assist the ASBSC President in the preparation of the budget message as provided in Section III, I.H. of this article.
- G. He shall serve on the Student Conduct Board.

Article V Judicial Branch

Section 1 General Provisions

Clause 1

The supreme judicial power of the Associated Students shall be vested in the ASBSC Judiciary. The authority of the ASBSC Judiciary is derived from the Associated Students and as delegated from the College President.

- A. Its authority from the Associated Students is delineated in this constitution and appropriate legislative acts.
- B. Appeals from decisions or recommendations of the ASBSC Judiciary shall be made to a college judicial appeals board (Student Conduct Board), the structure of which will have been agreed upon by Student Senate and the College President.
- C. If they so desire, individuals charged with college violations, or in need of remedial or rehabilitative services, may submit a written request to the college administration to have their case heard by a committee of faculty and staff personnel appointed by the Dean of Student Personnel Services, instead of the ASBSC Judiciary.

Section 2 Membership of the Judiciary

Clause 1

The ASBSC Judiciary shall consist of six (6) students and three (3) teaching faculty.

Clause 2

Each member shall have equal voting privileges.

Clause 3

Four (4) students and two (2) faculty members shall constitute a quorum.

Clause 4

No member of this Judiciary shall perform other judicial functions or be involved in the implementation of any other Judicial or Appeals procedure.

Clause 5

A Judicial Selection Committee shall interview and recommend applicants for positions on the ASBSC Judiciary.

- A. The voting members of this selection committee shall be: the past Chief Justice, or a past student member of the ASBSC Judiciary designated by the former Chief Justice, ASBSC Personnel Officer, ASBSC Chairman of Student Senate and the Advisor to Student Government or his representative and a past faculty justice designated by the Faculty Senate.
- B. The ASBSC Personnel Officer shall be chairman of the selection committee.

C. Student members of the ASBSC Judiciary recommended by this selection committee shall be appointed upon approval by two-thirds (2/3) majority of the total membership of Student Senate. Faculty members recommended by this selection committee shall be appointed upon approval by the College President.

Clause 6

The Chief Justice shall be a Student. The Chief Justice of the ASBSC Judiciary shall be elected from and by the total membership of the Judiciary. In the last week of April, the ASBSC President will call the first meeting of the ASBSC Judiciary for the purpose of electing a Chief Justice.

Clause 7

Three (3) students and two (2) faculty members shall be appointed in December and three (3) students and two (2) faculty members shall be appointed in April. All members shall be appointed for approximately one year or until the appointment of their successors.

Clause 8

The selection committee shall fill all vacancies as necessary.

Clause 9

Members may serve up to three (3) years on the ASBSC Judiciary.

Section 3 Powers of the ASBSC Judiciary

Clause 1

To determine the constitutionality under the ASBSC Constitution of any ASBSC action.

Clause 2

To interpret the ASBSC Constitution upon request of the ASBSC President or ASBSC Senate.

Clause 3

To have original jurisdiction in cases involving alleged violations of ASBSC regulations or other ASBSC actions.

Clause 4

To have original jurisdiction, where jurisdiction has been delegated by the President of the College, in cases involving alleged violations of all College rules, regulations and policies affecting individuals and groups.

Clause 5

To operate under general procedures as defined in the appropriate legislative acts.

Clause 6

To delegate judicial authority to lower judicial bodies. Such lower judicial bodies shall:

- A. Function consistently with established procedures of the ASBSC Judiciary.
- B. Be part of groups recognized by the ASBSC.
- C. Function primarily to enforce those rules and regulations of their group's own making.

Clause 7

To hear all appeals from decisions of lower judicial bodies which have been delegated their judicial authority from the ASBSC Judiciary.

Clause 8

To enjoin ASBSC Government officials from taking actions contrary to the decisions of the ASBSC Judiciary.

Article V Elections and Qualifications

Section 1 Elections

Clause 1

The ASBSC Senate shall have the power to regulate and supervise all student elections as specified in this constitution. This shall not include recall and initiative elections. It may also call such special elections as may be necessary.

Clause 2

The election of the ASBSC President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Senate members shall be held not later than six (6) weeks and not earlier than ten (10) weeks before the end of the spring semester on dates established by the ASBSC Senate.

Clause 3

Candidates for the offices of ASBSC President and Vice President shall file jointly and shall be listed together on the election ballot. One vote shall designate preference for both candidates.

Clause 4

Newly elected officers shall be installed no later than two (2) weeks before finals of the spring semester. All elective officers shall serve for approximately one (1) year or until successors are duly installed.

Section 2 Qualifications

Clause 1

Students shall have a minimum 2.25 cumulative G.P.A. standing at the time of election to office and must maintain minimum college standards throughout their entire tenure of office.

Clause 2

Each ASBSC Senator shall be a full-time student of the school he represents during his tenure of office.

Clause 3

The President, Vice President and Treasurer shall each be registered students having completed at least 48 credit hours at the time of candidacy and shall have attended this college for at least one semester immediately prior to the time of candidacy.

Clause 4

All elected officers must be full-time students during their tenure of office.

Article VI Recall and Vacancies

Section 1 Recall

Clause 1

Any elected or appointed officer(s) provided for in this constitution shall be removed from office subsequent to an election in which a two-thirds (2/3) majority of those voting vote for recall of the specified officer(s).

Clause 2

A recall election shall be called for by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the total membership of ASBSC Senate.

Clause 3

A recall election shall be called for by petition signed by twenty (20) percent of the members of the Associated Students. Associated Student card numbers must accompany the signatures.

A. The petition shall be submitted to the ASBSC election board and this board shall determine if the petition fulfills the requirements as established above.

B. If the petition fulfills the stated requirements, the recall election shall be held within fifteen (15) school days on receipt of the petition by the ASBSC election board.

Section 2 Vacancies

Clause 1

If the office of the ASBSC President is vacated by other than recall, the Vice President shall succeed to the Presidency.

Clause 2

If the vacancy in any other elective office is created by other than recall, the ASBSC President shall fill the vacancy by appointment with two-thirds (2/3) majority approval of the voting ASBSC Senate.

Clause 3

A vacancy created by recall shall be filled by an ASBSC election held within twenty (20) school days of such vacancy.

Clause 4

To be eligible for appointment to any vacant office, the candidate must meet the same qualifications as set forth in Article V, Section 2 of this constitution.

Clause 5

Elections or appointments to vacated offices shall be effective for the remainder of the current term.

Article VII

Initiative and Referendum

Section 1 Initiatives

Clause 1

The requirements for an initiative petition from the student body shall be identical to those requirements for a recall petition. A majority of votes cast shall be sufficient for passage.

Section 2 Referendums

Clause 1

The ASBSC Senate may, by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the total membership, place a measure before the ASBSC to obtain approval or rejection by the members of the ASBSC.

Clause 2

A majority of the votes cast in a special or general election shall be required for the adoption of a referendum.

Article VIII Amendments

Section 1

The ASBSC Senate may, by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of its membership, propose amendments to this constitution and submit them to the members of the ASBSC for adoption.

Section 2

Upon petition to the ASBSC Senate by five (5) PER CENT OF THE MEMBERS OF THE ASBSC, a proposed amendment shall be placed before the members of the ASBSC for adoption. Associated Student card numbers must accompany signatures.

Section 3

A majority of the votes cast in an election shall be required for the adoption of a proposed amendment.

Article IX Enabling Measures

Section 1

Upon ratification of this constitution by a majority of valid ballots cast in a special election called by the ASBSC Senate, this document shall immediately become effective.

Section 2

All existing constitutions, by laws, rules and regulations that are inconsistent with this constitution are declared null and void.

Section 3

The current officers of the ASBSC shall continue in office until the first installation of officers under this Constitution.
