High-flying Forsey selected by Bears

Boise State star running back Brock Forsey was selected by the Chicago Bears in the sixth round of the 2003 National Football League draft in April.

Forsey was named the WAC Offensive Player of the Year this past season after leading the nation in scoring with 32 touchdowns (26 rushing and six receiving). He also earned first-team All-WAC honors as he rushed for 1,642 yards, caught 36 passes for 282 yards and returned nine kickoffs for 234 yards. He finished his senior season with 2,217 all-purpose yards.

During his career at Boise State, Forsey rushed for 4,045 yards, caught 101 passes for

1,175 yards, returned 63 kickoffs for 1,450 yards, totaling 6,670 all-purpose yards.

Three other players from the 2002 WAC championship team signed free agent contracts and were still on active rosters at press time. They are guard Rob Vian with Detroit, defensive back Quintin Mikell with Philadelphia and wide receiver Billy Wingfield with Chicago.

H-Bowl rescheduled

The 2003 Humanitarian Bowl has been rescheduled for Saturday, Jan. 3, 2004, at 10 a.m. MST. The game was originally scheduled for Dec. 29, but was changed to the Saturday date to make it easier for fans to attend and to attract better TV ratings.

The game will be televised nationally by the ESPN network.

Broncos to play on ESPN 3 times in fall '03 season

Three of Boise State's football games will be broadcast on the ESPN network this fall.

Bronco games to be nationally televised on either ESPN or ESPN2 are all on the road and start on Friday, Oct. 31, at Brigham Young.

The other two games are Nov. 21, also a Friday, at Fresno State and Dec. 6 at Hawaii.

Boise State, the defending Western Athletic Conference champion, is undefeated in football games broadcast by ESPN or ESPN2 with a 5-0 record.

The Broncos will kick off their 2003 schedule on Sept. 6 by hosting Idaho State at Bronco Stadium.

SPRING SPORTS ROUNDUP

Minnitti All-American two straight years

Javelin throwers Rob Minnitti and Trina Rogers and triple jumper Kenny Johnson earned All-America honors at the 2003 NCAA National **TRACK AND FIELD** Championships. Minnitti finished second in the men's division to earn All-America honors for the second year in a row with a throw of 75.07 meters, and Rogers placed sixth in the women's javelin with a throw of 48.62. Johnson placed seventh with a leap of 52-6. Shot-putter Abbey Elsberry was selected as an academic All-American. She has a 4.0 cumulative GPA in physical education and health.

With Greg Patton returning as coach of the Boise State **TENNIS** team in mid-season, the Bronco men captured the 2003 Western Athletic Conference championship. Boise State surprised SMU 4-2 for the program's first WAC title in its sec-

ond year in the conference. Marcus Berntson earned All-WAC honors and advanced to the NCAA national singles tournament before losing in an early round.

All-Americans Boe Rushton (third in the heavyweight division), Ben VomBaur (sixth at 125 pounds) and Collin Robertson (sixth at 149) led the Bronco **WRESTLING** team to a 12th-place finish at the NCAA National Championships. Greg Randall was named the 2003 Rookie Coach of the Year by *Amateur Wrestling News*. Boise State finished second at the Pac-10 Conference Tournament.

In **GOLF** Graham DeLaet and Marie Beasley earned second-team All-WAC honors. Graham and Beasley also posted the best men's and women's season stroke average in school history at 72.4 and 77.4 strokes per 18 holes, respectively.
