Taking two first places and several thirds and fourths, the Bronco Track squad took second place in a triangular meet against the College of Idaho and Northwest Nazarene Friday, April 23, at Caldwell. The 440 yd. dash was the thrill of the day with Max Heyde taking first and Eagles and Nalley finishing third and fourth.

Harley Sullivan, half-miler, took his event in good time with O'Neil running fourth. In the 220 yd. dash Bill Moats came in second, and Everett O'Neil took second in the Discus throw. Ralph Bennett and Moats garnered second and third in the Broad Jump, and Bennett and Talbot took third and fourth in the High Jump. Carence Weber and Bill Piedmont placed third and fourth in the Shot Put.

The College of Idaho tallied 69 points to take the meet, BJC had 31, and The Nazarenes finished with 20.

At the triangular tennis meet held at the same time, Bush, Bronco No. 1, lost to Huitz of the C. of I. by scores of 6-3, 11-9. The doubles team of E. Olson and B. Williams lost to a College of Idaho team by 6-3, 6-2.
