BOISE STATE UNIVERSITY

Boise State is Idaho's metropolitan university, located in the state's population center and capital city, a hub of government, business, the arts, health care, industry and technology. The university offers a variety of undergraduate, graduate and technical programs to serve the diverse needs of the area.

The university offers courses in eight colleges: Applied Technology, Arts and Sciences, Business and Economics, Education, Engineering, Graduate Studies, Health Sciences, and Social Sciences and Public Affairs.

In addition to its main campus located less than one mile from downtown Boise, the university operates education centers in Canyon County, McCall, Mountain Home Air Force Base, Gowen Field and Twin Falls. A new satellite campus — Boise State West in Canyon County — is in the planning stages.

The university delivers classes via the Internet, compressed video, microwave, wireless cable, computer conferencing and radio. The university has an extensive evening program at both the undergraduate and graduate levels, and the summer session is the state's largest.

Boise State is accredited by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges. Several individual programs are accredited by professional accrediting associations.

Through all of its programs, Boise State University is fulfilling its commitment to the citizens of Idaho by providing quality teaching, research and public service.

UNIVERSITY HISTORY

1932 — Boise Junior College founded by Episcopal Church.

1934 — BJC governed by board of directors after Episcopal Church ends affiliation.

1940 — Campus moved from original location at St. Margaret's Hall to present site.

1965 — BJC initiated baccalaureate degrees and became Boise College.

1969 — School moved to state system of higher education and named Boise State College.

1974 — BSC named Boise State University.

FACILITIES

The university is located on a 110-acre campus that includes 60 buildings. Boise State facilities include the Special Events Center (capacity 435), the Grace Jordan Grand Ballroom in the Student Union (1,000), Bronco Stadium (30,000), Pavilion (12,000), Morrison Center (2,000) and Centennial Amphitheatre (800).

Boise State also has a satellite campus at 2407 Caldwell Boulevard in Nampa, where a variety of applied technology programs and academic and non-credit courses are offered.

BROADCAST SERVICES

The BSU Radio Network includes two FM stations that reach southwest and south central Idaho and an AM station that reaches southwest Idaho.

Through the Simplot/Micron Instructional Technology Center, Boise State delivers courses via cable and microwave systems. The Distance Learning Network connects 11 southwest Idaho school districts via microwave.

INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS

Studies abroad sites include France, Great Britain, Spain, Germany, Italy, Mexico, Chile, Costa Rica, Thailand, Australia, Quebec, Norway, Scotland, Malta, Denmark, Israel, Ireland, and China. Boise State is a partner in the Campus in Spain program and offers an MBA program in Hanoi, Vietnam. Students from around the world attend the Spirit of the West intensive English language program as well as the university's academic programs.
