Brotherhood Week To Be Observed

The week of February 18-22 will be observed as Brotherhood week at B.J.C. The week's program, being arranged by the Inter-Faith Council made up of student representatives from the various campus religious groups, will include a fireside gathering at Morrison Hall, religious leaders speaking in various classes during the week, and a concluding student body assembly on Friday.

The fireside gathering at Morrison Hall Monday evening Feb. 18 at 7:30 p.m. is to be the first meeting of Brotherhood week observation. Dr. James Martin of the department of philosophy and religion at the College of Idaho, will speak on Christian Brotherhood. Those present at the fireside are to include representatives from C. of I., Nazarene College at Nampa, Boise City B.J.C. students and residents of the two dormitories. Refreshments will be served.

Leaders representing the four distinct religious groupings, Catholic, Protestant, L.D.S. and Jewish, will speak in various classes, mostly social science classes, during the week. The speakers will be men such as Father Peplinski, Rev. Herbert E. Richards, Z. Reed Millar, and Mr. Robert Hammerley. Brotherhood week observance, which is generally observed throughout the country among religious groups the week of Washington's birthday, will be concluded with an assembly at 9:45 a.m. on Friday. Brotherhood messages will be given by the above mentioned religious leaders.

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
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
