IRC Convention Here Next Fall

The IRC is making plans and preparations for the Northwest Conference of the International Relations Clubs to be held at Boise Junior College next fall, October 31 through November 1.

The clubs from BJC, the Nazarene College of Nampa, and the College of Idaho at Caldwell are cooperating together in making arrangements to accommodate about 110 student representatives and about a dozen adult advisors from the various clubs in Idaho, Oregon, Washington and Montana. The C. of I. will be responsible for the program; Nazarene College for registration; and BJC, with Helen Hall heading the committee on housing and food, for food and shelter. Some of the visiting representatives will be housed in the dorms, where extra cots will be provided, and some in motels. Food will be supplied at the Student Union.

The program plan is to have three main plenary sessions, each highlighted by an outstanding speaker and authority on international problems; division into discussion groups taking up various phases of those problems, and a banquet to be held on the evening of October 31. All BJC students will be invited to the meetings and will have the privilege of extending a hand of welcome to the guests on the campus.

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
