Facts About Registration

Dean Conan Mathews announced Thursday 1004 individuals are enrolled at Boise Junior College in one manner or another for the fall term. Of this number 567 are day school students divided as follows: 266 freshmen, 155 sophomores, 24 special students, 95 nurses and 1 postgraduate. Of these students 30 are veterans from World War II and 25 from the Korean war.

At the present time 385 students are enrolled for night courses besides the 30 individuals in the CPA special course and 22 in related instruction for apprentices in the buildings trades for electricians and plumbers.

The classes in speech and metal crafts have had to be divided into two sections each because of the number of students. The following is the division of students in night classes: interior decorating 56, drawing and painting 21, gem cutting 16, typing 21 shorthand 21, accounting 20, business law 15, salesmanship 16, office machines 12, masterpieces of literature 17, French 7, political science 9, psychology 35, Spanish 19, blueprint reading 11, auto body and fender repair 11, machine shop 9 and woodworking 29.

Mathews said that this week the instruction in French, speech, psychology and history will be organized at the Mountain Home Air Force Base. Under this plan these courses will be made available as last year for personnel at the base and Boise Junior College instructors will make weekly trips there.

In response to several requests for a course in publicity, plans are being made to offer a special course in organization publicity for a period of six weeks beginning Nov. 1 and running to Dec. 16. The purpose of the course will be to prepare publicity chairmen of organizations throughout the city to write publicity for their clubs in the approved style. Further information can be obtained on this course by calling the college.

Night school class registration is still open for those who did not get the opportunity to enroll.

Broncos Beat Olympics 35 to 12

The Boise Junior College Broncos started their 1952 football season off with a bang by defeating the Olympic College Rangers from Bremerton, Washington, by a score of 35 to 12. The game was played in Boise's new Bronco Stadium, last Friday night, Sept. 26.

The Broncos showed their superiority and strength throughout the entire game. Don White, the Bronco's fullback, scored the first points of the game by breaking through on an off tackle play, and racing 36 yards for the touchdown.

The game was highlighted by the constant passing of Wayne Patrick and the receiving of Frank Teverbaugh and Don White, which resulted in three touchdowns for the Broncos.

Three touchdowns were made by Don White and two by Frank Teverbaugh. Ziel and Wilson scored for the Olympics.

Shortly before the end of the first half, Jom Beathe, quarterback for the Olympics, suffered a broken shoulder. His absence badly weakened the Olympics. The Broncos suffered no casualties.
