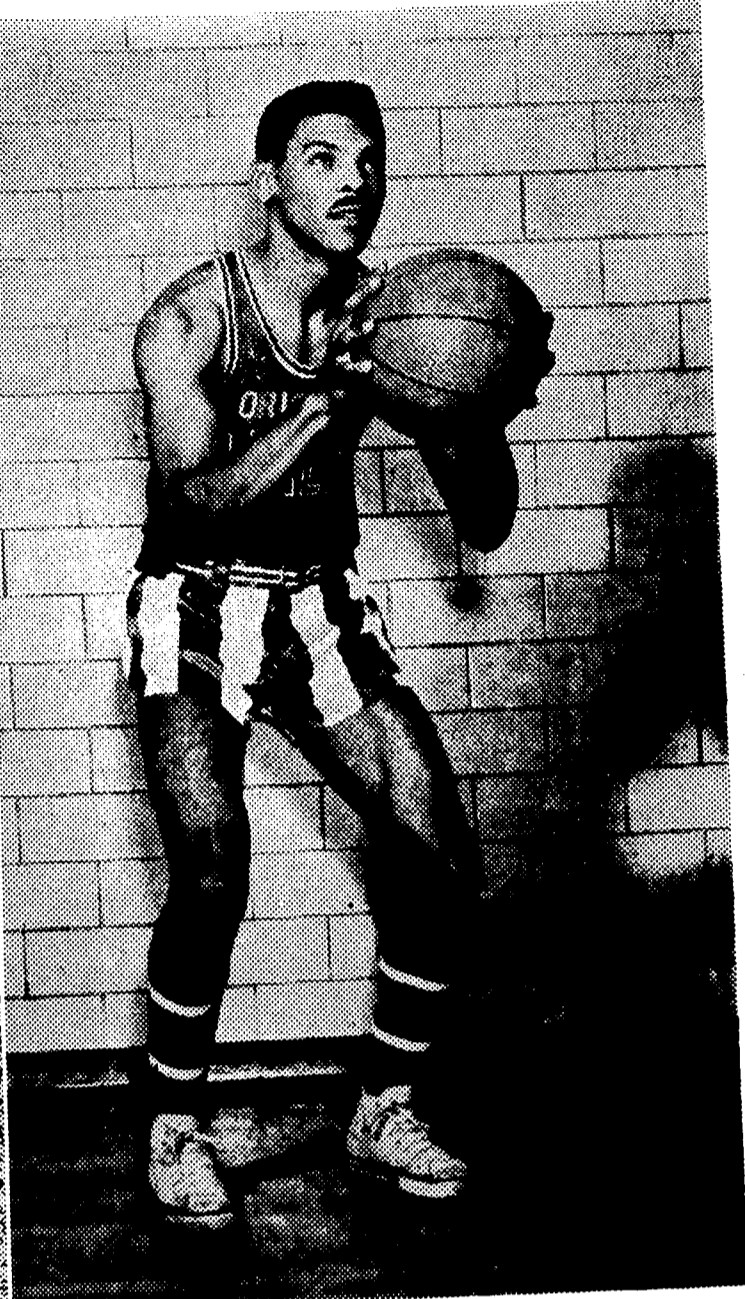
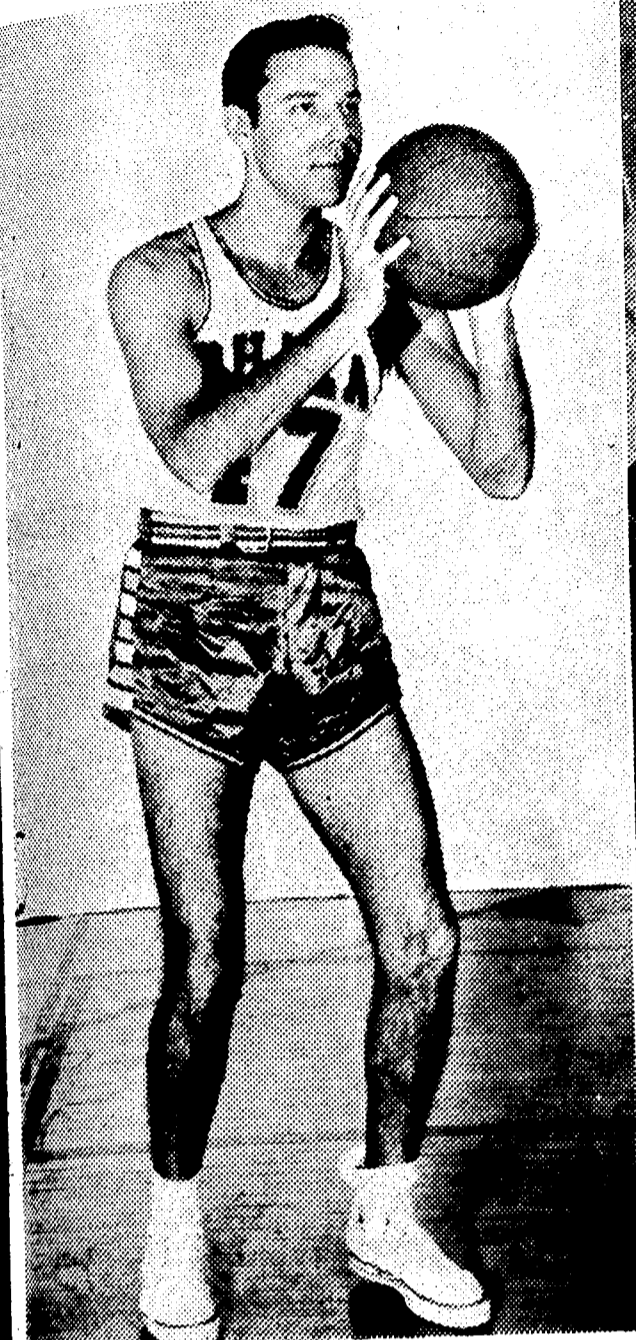

### Registration Set For Next Semester February 2 and 3

Boise Junior College officials said Tuesday that registration for the spring semester will take place February 2 and 3. For new students who have never attended the college, it will be necessary to take entrance examinations in room 110 Monday, February 2, beginning at 8:30 a.m. Any students who entered the first semester too late for these tests will also be required to take them at the same office to be sure they meet the requirements for graduation.

Registration for sophomores will take place in the college library Monday, February 2, and freshmen on the following day. Both groups will report to the library according to the following schedule:

Checking for study load will be done in room 107 by the deans, and final checking will be done in room 108 before payment of fees.

Final examination for this semester's work will start Tuesday, January 27 and will run through the week. Night school registration for the new semester will take place the evenings of February 9 and 10, the hours of 7 to 9 p.m.

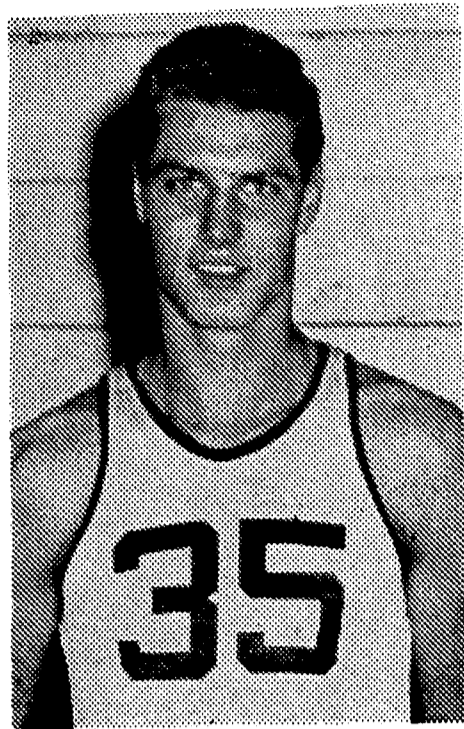

Boise Junior College productions in this style in the past include "George and Margaret" given in the Crystal ballroom in 1943, "Claudia" in 1946, "Aaron Slick of Pumpkin Creek" in 1950, and "The Devil and Daniel Webster" in 1952.

This production technique has the advantage of permitting a more intimate relationship between audience and actor. Instead of concentrating on scenery, the attention of the production staff is focused on the lighting and costumes, also properties and better acting.
