Medical Schools Accept Four B.J.C. Members

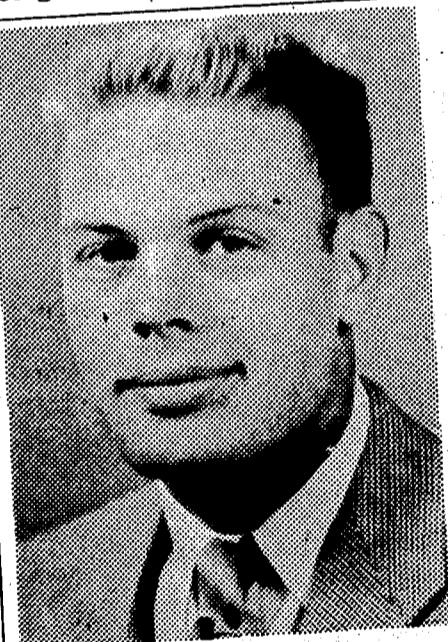

Steve Werneth—People who skip rope at 2 o'clock in the morning.

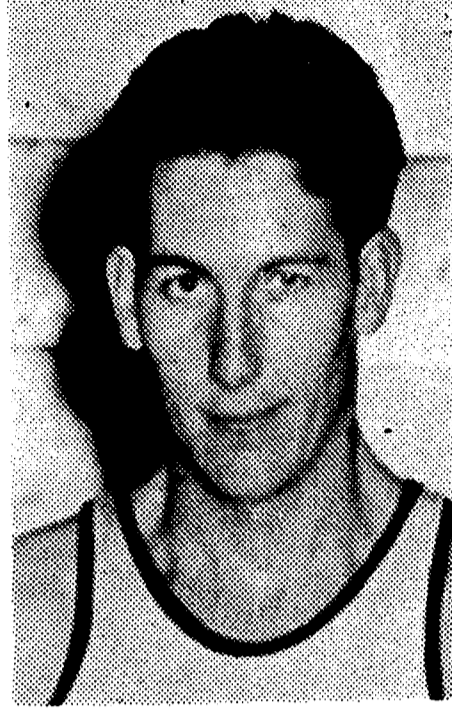
Frank Gillenbeck—Large assignments with not enough time to do them in.
