Deadline Set for Selective Service Application Test

National headquarters of selective service today reminded college students that applications for the April 23, 1953 selective service qualification test must be post-marked not later than midnight, March 9.

Application blanks may be obtained by students from the nearest local board. They do not have to return home to the local board which has jurisdiction over them.

To be eligible to take the selective service qualification test, an applicant, on the testing date (1) must be a selective service registrant who intends to request deferment as a student; (2) must be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time college course—undergraduate or graduate—leading to a degree; (3) must not previously have taken the test.

The present criteria for consideration for deferment as a student are either a score of 70 or better on the selective service qualification test or class standing among the male members in the upper half of the freshman class, and the upper two-thirds of the sophomore class.

The criteria are guides for the local boards. The local boards are under no compulsion to follow them, but any local board classification is subject to appeal. The appeal must be filed in writing with the local board within 10 days of the date the local board mails the notice of classification.

3-Act Comedy Will Be Staged March 23, 24, 25

"January Thaw" is a three-act comedy concerning the Gage family who has moved from the city into a pre-revolutionary Connecticut farm house.

Mr. Gage (Jerry Crandall) is a writer, aspiring to be the author of "The Great American Novel." His wife, Marge (Bernadine Aubert), is an amateur interior decorator who spends more time with sandpapering than with other domestic duties. The Gages have three daughters, Barbara (Rosalie Hartwell) who is the oldest and engaged to be married; Paula (Genevieve Gillett) and Sarah (Reta Rae Williams) both full of quips and capers.

Through an unusual legal mix-up, the previous owners, Jonathan and Mathilda Rockwood, (Wendel Long and Gloria Logan) have returned to their home claiming the right to live there. (A fine print clause in the deed gives the Rockwoods the right to live in the house as long as they live if they wish.)

Conflict arises between the two families of unequal temperament, trying to live in the same crowded house. The return of the Rockwoods' only son, Matt (Bob Kellogg), adds to the over-all confusion and comedy as the lawyer, Loomis (Warren Pepperdine), tries to find some legal loophole by which the Rockwoods can be ejected. Tobacco-chewing Uncle Walter (Kenneth Moore) adds considerable local "Yankee" color, as does the "backwoods" constable (George Avant).

Rosalie Majette and Pap Thompson have charge of props and James Walker has set up the light system and will act as stage electrician.


Spanish and French Clubs To Feature Comedies
