BJC Impound Station for Mobile Gas Run

Boise Junior college has been chosen as the impound station when the cars arrive in Boise tomorrow afternoon about 4:00 p.m. In the 1953 renewal of the time-honored Mobilgas economy run, America's greatest of motor car performance, will be held over a three-day period beginning April 21.

With Bill Butler acting as foreman, 32 BJC athletes, wearing their sports jackets, will serve as guards for the train of cars.

The Pi Sigma Sigmas will operate two concession booths—one for the Mobilgas crew, which consists of 235 men, and the other will be for the public.

Motion pictures will be taken, showing the cars stationed here at the college.

Completing the events, the band, directed by Mr. Best, will play by the flag pole from 5 to 6 p.m.

Supervised by the American Automobile association contest board, the 1953 run will utilize a new 1206.1 mile course traversing four states. The start will be at Los Angeles, California, with Sun Valley, Idaho, the terminus.

Twenty-six strictly new stock automobiles, taken at random and without warning from dealers' showrooms, factories, and even box cars in transit, will participate in the event. They have been impounded under constant AAA Guard since they were "seized" by the officials, to make sure they are exactly the same, in every respect, as the car the motorist buys for his own use.

The first day of the run, the contestants will go from Los Angeles to Reno, Nevada, via California's San Joaquin Valley, the historic mother lode gold country of the '49ers, and Lake Tahoe, a distance of 548.3 miles which they must complete in 13 hours.

On the second day, they will make a 431.5 mile trip from Reno to Boise with a time limit of 9 hours and 15 minutes.

The final leg from Boise to Sun Valley measures 226.3 miles and must be completed in five hours.

The 1953 Mobilgas economy run will be strictly a test of automobiles under normal driving as employed by the private motorist in his own car.

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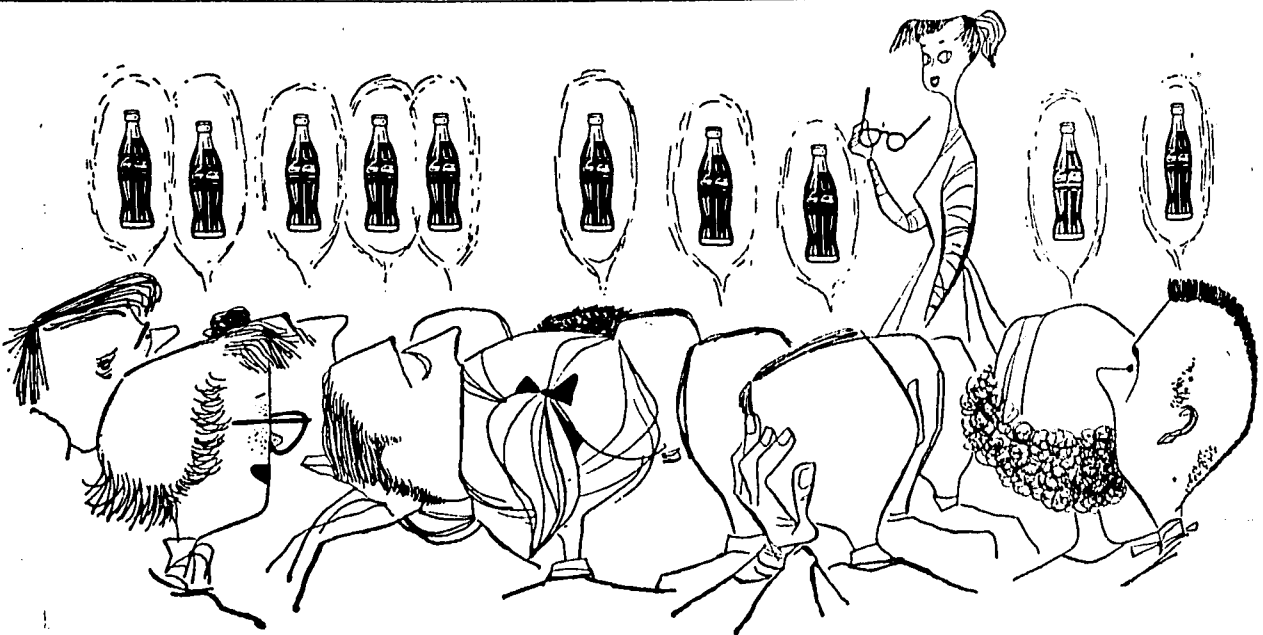
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
