New Grade School To Be Completed By Next December

The new \$350,000.00 campus elementary school is to be completely finished by next December. However, six of the twelve classrooms will be ready for use next September. Students from the surrounding area will attend the first through sixth grades, with the average attendance number of about 350 to 500 pupils.

Different from other schools because of its intended purpose, each classroom will have an adjoining teacher's office which will be joined by a one-way vision glass. This will enable groups of college students of the educational and sociology classes to observe class activities without being seen by those being observed. The classrooms will have more equipment than other grade schools. This includes a visual aid in each class. The building is designed to have the appearance of the other buildings on campus. One of the interior features, unlike other schools will be the library which will be on the stage. Bleacher type steps will lead up to the stage making it possible to approach it from any angle.

The school will be under the direction of the Boise school system. Mr. Hicks, a graduate of the first class from BJC will become the principal when the school opens.

Junior College to Dedicate Organ

Boise Junior college will dedicate its new \$35,000 Austin pipe organ during Boise's 35th annual observance of Music week and C. Griffith Bratt, organist and head of the college music department, will play the dedicatory concert at 4 o'clock the afternoon of May 10.

The organ has been installed in the college chapel, located in the music building, and since the seating capacity of the chapel is limited to approximately 700 persons tickets will be issued and admittance will be by ticket only.

Tickets can be obtained by mailing a request to the chairman of the organ dedication, Boise Junior college, mailing to be in the order in which the requests have been received and starting about May 1. No charge will be made for the tickets, but only two will be issued to each person. No orders will be accepted over the telephone, officials said.

The \$35,000 Austin pipe organ, gift of an anonymous donor, is a rare instrument since all schools of classic music can be played authentically on it, according to the BJC music department. This is the instrument that has attracted national attention among organ people, and it is an instrument peculiarly fitted to college use, they said.

A quiz program, M.C.'d by Maggie B., enabled the audience to participate. Valuable prizes were given to the more intelligent.

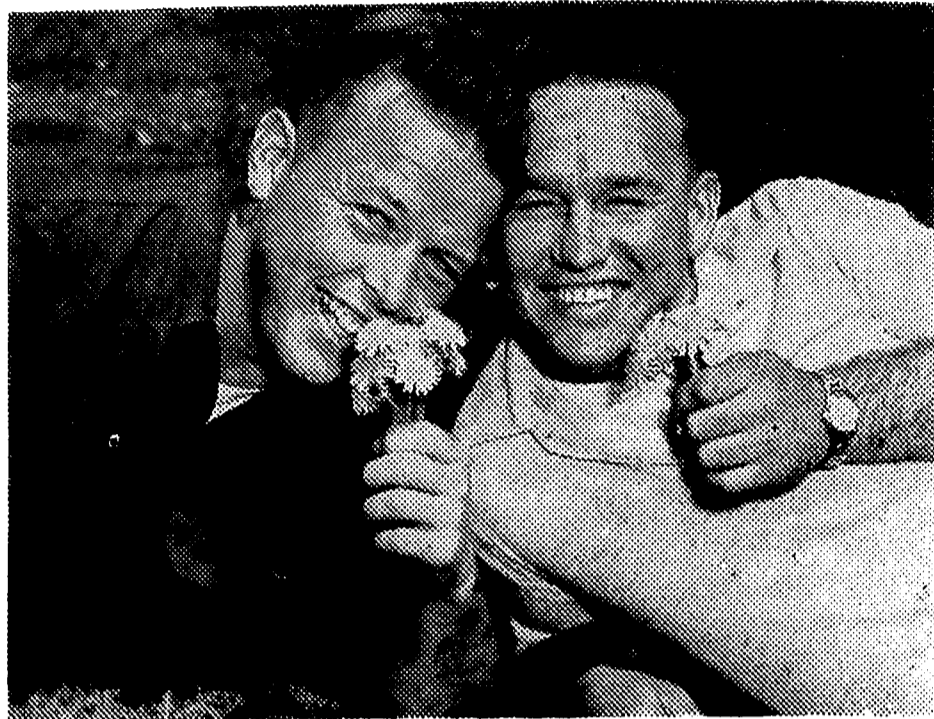
"How Could You Believe Me When I Said I Loved You" is the title of the pantomime presented by Joanne Waddell and Delores Hanson.
