May 21 Date for Last Selective Service Test

Major General Lewis B. Hershey, Director of Selective Service, today reminded college students that applications for the May 21 Selective Service college qualification test must be submitted to the Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey, not later than midnight, May 11.

The May 21 Test is primarily for students prevented by illness or other emergencies from taking the test April 23, but General Hershey emphasized that this did not bar any qualified student from taking the test if his application is mailed before the deadline. He also stressed that students who have a certificate of admission for the April 23 test which they failed to use on the assigned date must submit new applications if they wish to take the May 21 test. The old certificates, he pointed out, will not admit a student to the May 21 test.

General Hershey said the May 21 test will be the last test this school year.

The student may obtain a new application from any selective service local board. The application blanks should be submitted as soon as possible to Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey, administrators of the test.

To be eligible to take the Selective Service college qualification test an applicant on the testing date (1) must be a Selective Service registrant who intends to request deferment as a student; (2) must be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time college course, undergraduate or graduate, leading to a degree; (3) must not previously have taken the test.

The criteria for consideration for deferment as a student at the present time are either a score of 70 or better on the Selective Service qualification test or class standing among the male members in the upper half of the freshman class, upper two-thirds of the sophomore class, or upper three-fourths of the junior class. Seniors accepted for admission to a graduate school satisfy the criteria if they are among the upper half of the male members of their senior class or if they make a score of 75 or better.

New Pipe Organ To Be Dedicated Sunday, May 10

Boise Junior college's newly installed pipe organ will be dedicated at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon, May 10, in the auditorium.

The dedicatory program will start with a dedication prayer offered by Reverend Douglas D. Tiffany, followed by an address by BJC President Eugene B. Chaffee.

C. Griffith Bratt, head of the college music department, will then give a brief description of the pipe organ, following which he will present a dedicatory concert on the \$35,000 instrument. This concert will include the following compositions: Rigaudon by J.Lully; Noel by L. D'Aquin; Trumpet Tune by A. Purcell; Bide With Us by J. S. Bach; Tocatta and Fugue in D. Minor by J. S. Bach; Tocatta by W. M. Widor; Adagio by C. M. CV. Mor. and Fantasy on a Mighty Fortress by C. G. Bratt.

Also as part of the program, the Boise Junior college A Cappella choir will sing "The Cherubic Hymn" by Howard Hanson, with organ accompaniment.

The closing number on the pro-

gram will be an improvisation on a given theme. An impromptu composition will be played at the keyboard upon a theme or themes submitted by the audience.

The art of improvisation, a highly specialized accomplishment to Bach's day, is now undergoing a rebirth in the organ world. The French have kept this technique on a higher plane than any other school of organists. In recent years there has been a decided development in improvisation in America.

Students are urged to reserve tickets in Mr. Gottenberg's office early if they plan to attend the program. There will be no charge for admission but since the seating capacity in the auditorium is limited, reservations will be necessary.

Don White Named Outstanding Man
