### Summer Term Offers Three Different Sessions

Boise Junior college will offer three sessions of summer school this summer term. The one will extend the entire summer from June 8 to August 14, according to an announcement by Acel Chaburn, director of the summer school. The second term will be from June 8 to July 10 and the third from July 13 to August 14.

Courses scheduled for June 8 to August 14 are: general psychology, general biology, general zoology, freshman composition, survey of world literature, general chemistry and organic chemistry.

Courses from June 8 to July 10 are teaching of reading, social studies in the elementary school, public school are methods workshop, principles of guidance, art appreciation, school and community relations, science for the elementary school, directed teaching, educational psychology.

Among the courses for the period of July 13 to August 14 will be: principles of accounting, fundamentals of speech, psychology of adjustment, child psychology, elementary school library, public school music methods, music appreciation, audio-visual aids.

Private music lessons can also be arranged for the summer.

A special attraction during the summer period will be the coaching clinic scheduled for August 10 to 15. "Wally" Butts of the University of Georgia will conduct this clinic. E. A. Diddle of Western Kentucky State college will conduct the basketball clinic and "Dubby" Holt of Idaho State college, the track clinic.

Besides Mr. Chaburn the faculty will include the following teachers: Dr. Donald E. Pehlke, Dr. Donald J. Obee, Dr. Joseph B. Spulnik, J. Roy Schwartz, Paul Dalzell, Thelma Rea, Conan Matthews, G. W. Underkofler, Mary D. Bedford and John H. Best.

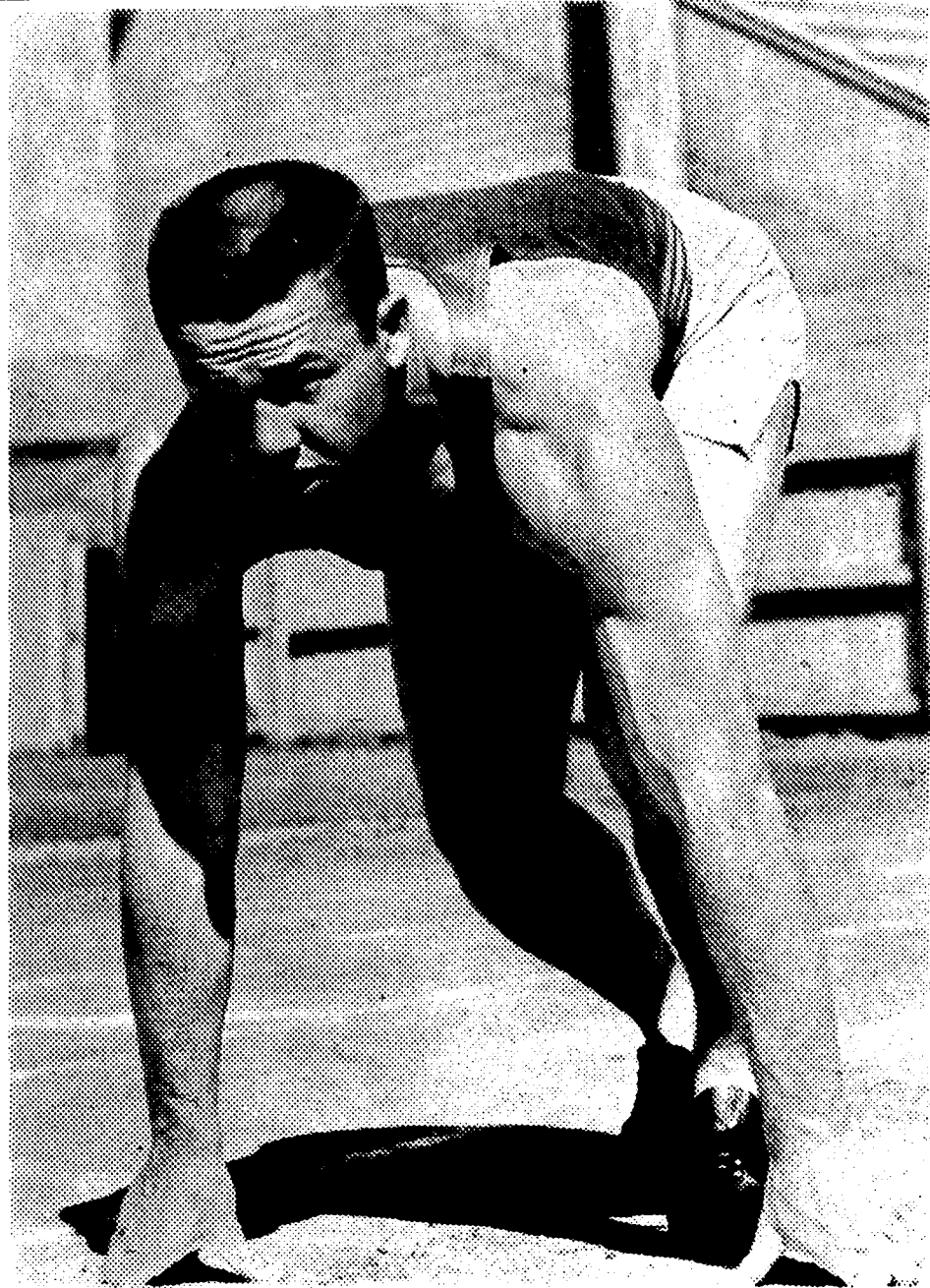
After the points were counted Eastern Oregon College of Education was first, Northwest Nazarene, second; Boise Junior college, third, and College of Idaho, last.

In a game played at Mountain Home Air Force base the Broncs slugged their way to a 10-2 win over the airmen. Pitcher Ray Barnes allowed only 5 hits to post the win.

Before Don's dust had settled, it was discovered that he had covered the 100 yards in 10.1 seconds, a new 100 yard dash record for the EOCE meet.
