### Freshman Election To Be Held

Petitions for the elections of freshman class officers may be obtained in Mr. Gottenberg's office beginning October 9.

All petitions must be returned by the following Friday, October 16, at 4:00. The campaign assembly and final election will be held during the following week.

### Enrollment Greatest Since 1947

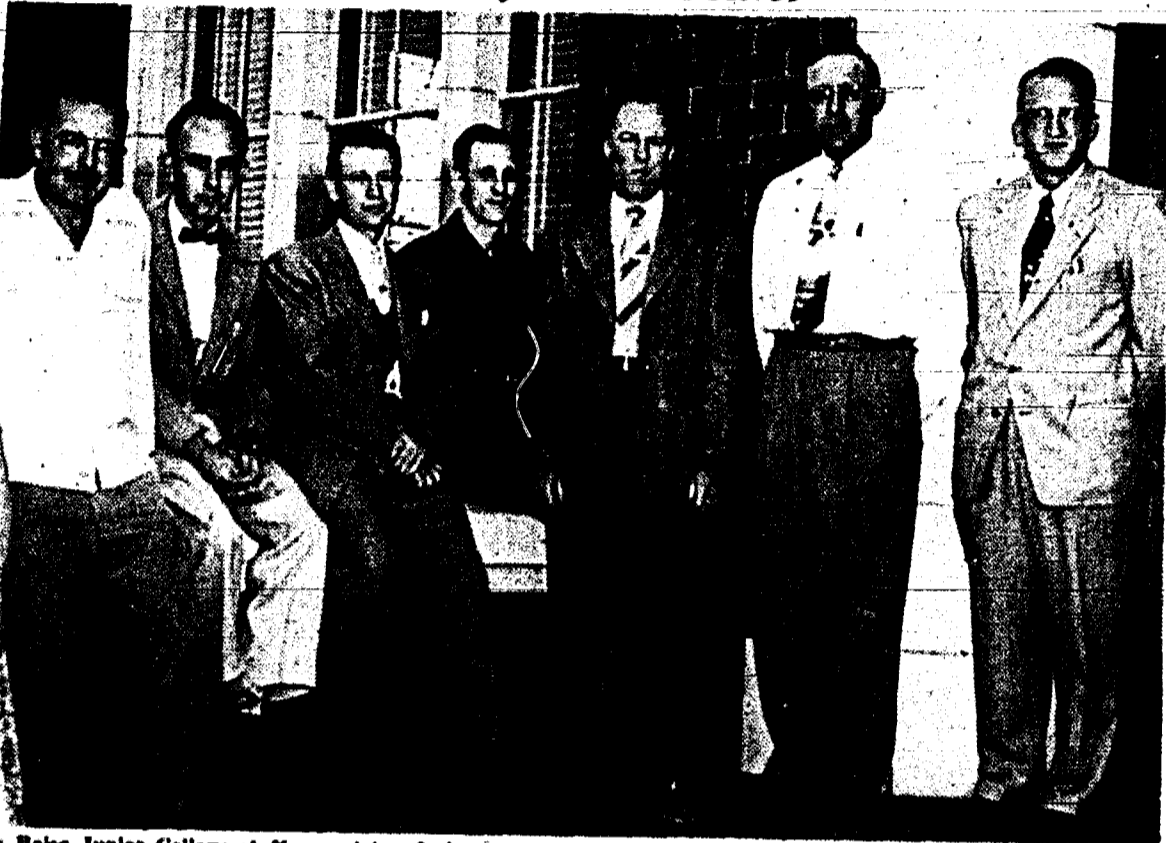
Registration this year at Boise Junior College has reached a total of 730 students, a record number since 1947, according to Dean Conan Mathews. With enrollment still going on, Dean Mathews expects the student body to reach between

an even greater total.

Entering freshmen number approximately 440 so far, an increase of 64% over last year's class. There are 215 sophomores now registered and 73 student nurses. Of the total, 70% are men students. Included in this 70% are 97 veterans, 88 of whom are veterans of the Korean war.

The increase in registration is mainly in the freshman class, which is 60% larger than that of last year. In 1947 the enrollment at this time was higher, with 600 enrolled in the freshman class alone.

Others on the council are Bill Wardle, vice-president; Josephine Lizaso, secretary; Elsie Seevers, treasurer, and Miles Gibson, sophomore representative. The position of freshman representative will be filled by an election to be held in October.

Among business transacted was adopting the budget for the ensuing term and making plans for the sale of beanies. The proceeds from the sale of the caps will go to the general student body fund.

It was also voted to allow student nurses from St. Alphonsus and St. Luke's to attend Union night dances. The members also appointed Leone Sweeney and Kristin Mathews to serve as social chairman and stadium manager, respectively.

Commenting on the work accomplished by the group, Jerry said, "I feel there is an excellent student council this year. They seem to have the spirit of getting things done quickly and efficiently."

### Faculty To Help

Bronco stadium requires plenty of workers and this year the clubs will again have the opportunity to assist and thereby add to their own treasuries in proportion to the number of workers each supplies.

Student Body President Gerald Crandall, said faculty members helped on the first game by taking tickets since the students were not organized, but from now on they will have to carry the load themselves. The Desert club, an I.D.S. (Moment) study group, will meet Thursday, October 1, to organize for this year's activities.

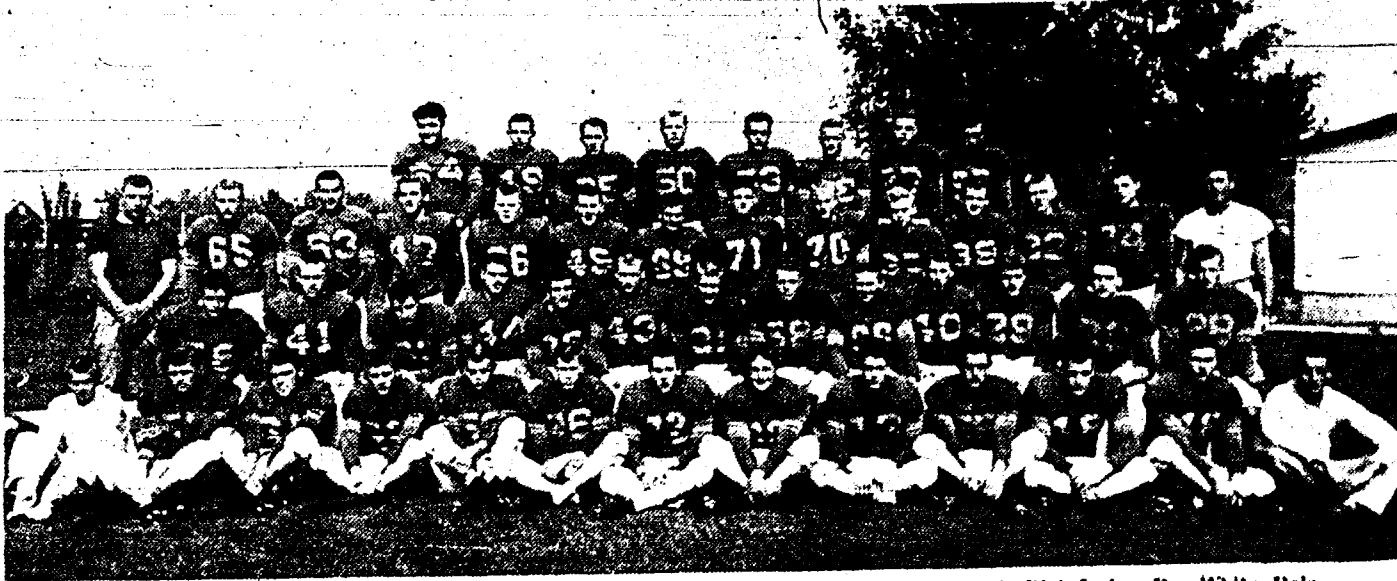
