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ACID TEST OCT. 31ST FOR B. J. C.

Coach Lyle Smith is expecting the worst and hoping for the best come Oct. 31st. That may seem like a long time from now, but that's the day that the Bronco hall club must face Oregon Tech in what will be the acid test for B.J.C.

Reports from the Oregon Tech campus are that the Owls have some 25 experienced players this year, most of whom are two and

three year lettermen. Due to these lettermen last year's score was a close 14-13 game and this year's may be just as close—if the Broncs are lucky.

The Broncs still have some four games left in which to iron out their offense and prepare for the Oregon Tech Owls.

As Coach Smith put it, "it looks as if we'll have quite an afternoon of it."

Broncs Win Tough Opener 19-13

The football forces of Coach Lyle Smith serve notice upon the junior college football world that Boise Junior College is not just a football whistle stop and that the pre-season third place position was well earned.

Playing before some 7,000 fans the Broncs topped a 7-point favorite Everett Junior College of Washington, 19-13.

Everett, which came into the game with a 35-point offense and a 10 pounds heavier line, showed the crowd that it could move the porkhides up and down the field and had they not been playing BJC they would have shown their full 35-point offense. However, they were playing BJC and its superior weight in the line was not enough. For when the chips were down and it was time to ice the game it was Coach Smith's men who had what it takes to do the trick.

The Broncs drew first blood when they marched some 79 yards after Everett was forced to punt. Merle Eden capped the march by powering over from the one-yard line on a quarter-back sneak. The conversion was missed and it was 6-0.

Everett drove 80 yards in the second period to tie the score at 6-6. The conversion failed and the score at half was still 6-6.

In the third period the Broncs went ahead when they marched 74 yards to score. Lodge went the last four yards over guard, the conversion was good and the Broncs led 13-6.

A fumble in the fourth quarter gave Everett a golden chance on the Bronco 6-yard line and in one play the score was tied up 13-13.

Then midway in the fourth period the Broncs had a first down on the Everett 40-yard line. On the first play the ball was snapped to Dick Newby who failed to pass Nick Budge, left end, raced down the field and behind the defense half to catch Newby's pass on the run and the Broncs were ahead to stay 19-13.

Everett tried to score and had a march going to the Bronco 44-yard line when they fumbled the ball and with it all chances of winning.

This week the Broncs travel to play Olympic Junior College at Bremerton, Wash. Although this club was beaten by Everett J.C. 44-12, it could prove to be a dangerous foe and give Boise quite a bit of trouble.

B. J. C. Band To Travel

Traveling to Bremerton, Wash., for the October 10 game with Olympic College will be the BJC band and cheerleaders.

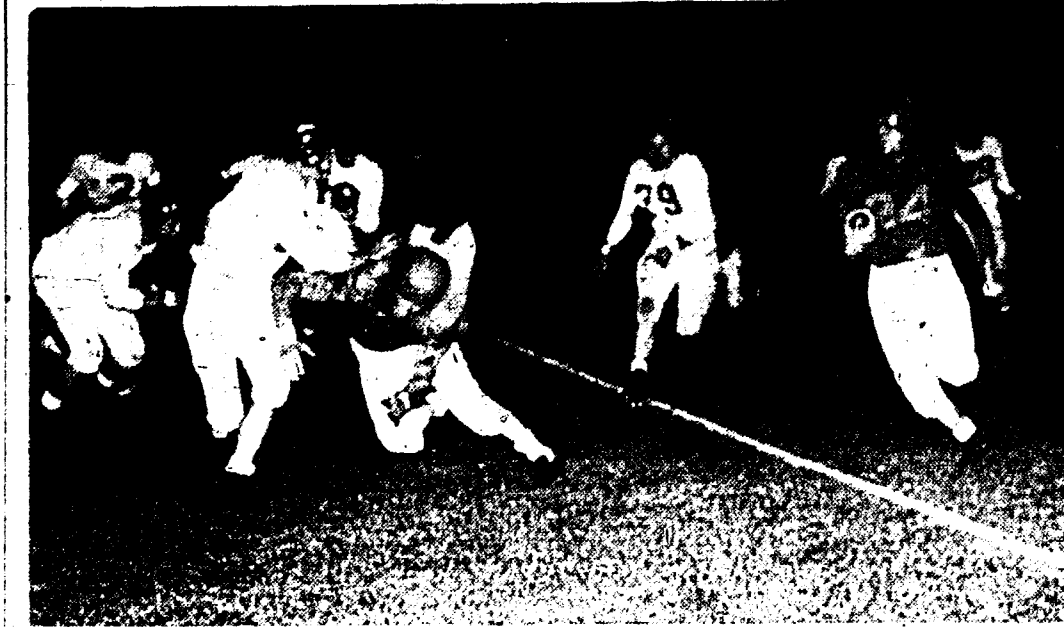
This trip will be the first this year for the band, which is composed of 40 members, the largest membership in several years, according to John Best, director.
