Billie Wilson, sophomore, is one of BJC's cadet teachers. To most students, this group of girls is somewhat shrouded in mystery.

Billie, who attended College of Idaho last year, came to BJC to be a cadet teacher. She loves her teaching classes, and says she's found out now that the C. of I. isn't the only school in the world. As for the mystery enshrouding the why, what, and how of cadet teaching, Billie has attempted to explain.

At present, the group spends from 8:30 to 10:30 every morning except Tuesday observing at the campus school. The group moves as a body from room to room, observing the methods of the various instructors. On Tuesday, they meet the supervising teacher for a conference from 4 to 5 p.m.

Their only actual teaching experience came in October when they were asked to substitute for the regular teachers while they attended a meeting. Substituting for a man teacher, Billie found herself with 2 sixth grade boys' football classes. She also taught P.E., science, art, and arithmetic.

One of four girls to arrive here two weeks early for additional

cadet training, Billie was able to see how the teachers began disciplining the pupils from the start of the school year.

This week, assignments will be made, dividing the girls two to a teacher. They will gain more experience in this way since they will spend more time with each grade. They will begin to take over teaching duties little by little, but the supervising teacher will be with them at all times. By second semester, the cadets will have assumed a large share of the teaching responsibility.

Billie hopes to obtain her provisional certificate, which will enable her to teach next year. This certificate specifies 64 credit hours, 12 in teaching.

Billie says she loves her practice-teaching and wouldn't trade it for the world. The "kids" don't pay much attention to the group of observers except to show off occasionally. They greet Miss Wilson with a loud "Hi, Billie!"

Billie prefers sixth to eighth graders because they can understand better. Betcha they'll all like school better next year if they're lucky enough to get Teacher Billie.

The November 3 game was the last game of the season, according to Mrs. Boyles. When cold weather begins the team will again play the College of Idaho in volleyball.

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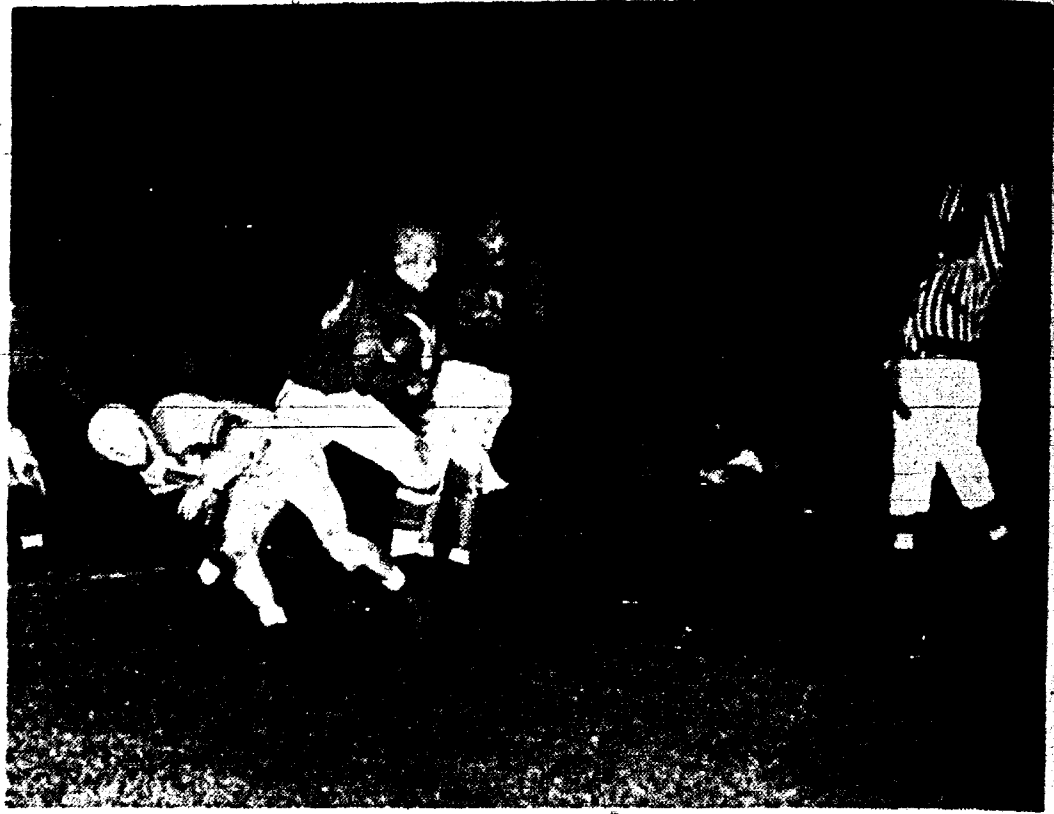

Broncos Blast Tech Owls 22-0

Taking two quarters before gaining their full offensive inertia, the football machine of Coach Lyle Smith scored a quick first period touchdown and then rammed two more touchdowns across in the third period to beat an Oregon Tech eleven 22-0. Some 5,000 fans sat in utter amazement as the Bronco Line lead by Nick Budge, Wally Brown, Bill Butler, Jack Newman, Art Keating, and Bruce Brenn tore into the Oregon Tech Owls like Halloween demons, smashing Tech's plays before they started and tossing the Owl quarterback for so many losses that it looked as if Oregon Tech was marching towards its own goal rather than the Bronco goal.

In the first period Bryant Lemon started the show by returning a Tech punt 15 yards to give a first down on the Tech 38. In eight plays it was fourth down and two to go, and Merle Eden pushed the ball over on a quarterback sneak. The conversion was good and the Broncos lead 7-0. From that point on the Owls were never quite sure what was happening.

In the third period Newman hit a Tech back for a 10-yard loss. The Owls tried a pass to make up the yardage but even their pass receiver was hit for a 14-yard loss and the Owls decided to punt. The pass from center was high and the Tech punter had all he could do in keeping three Broncos from falling on the ball for 6 more points, and the Broncs settled for two points on a safety.

Still in the third period and enter Ed Lodge, who covered 42 yards of a 63-yard march, scoring from the nine-yard line. Once again it was Lodge as he carried the ball over from the three-yard line.

In the fourth period with second and some third stringers in the game, the Owls had their big chance when they blocked a Bronco punt and recovered on the 17-yard line. In a couple of plays they moved to the Bronco eight-yard line only to hold true to their form as they passed the ball into the arms of Bronco line backer Joe Fulwyler who ran the ball all the way down to the Tech 37 yard line.

Tech ended the game with only one first down and a negative 45 yards rushing and a negative one yard passing.

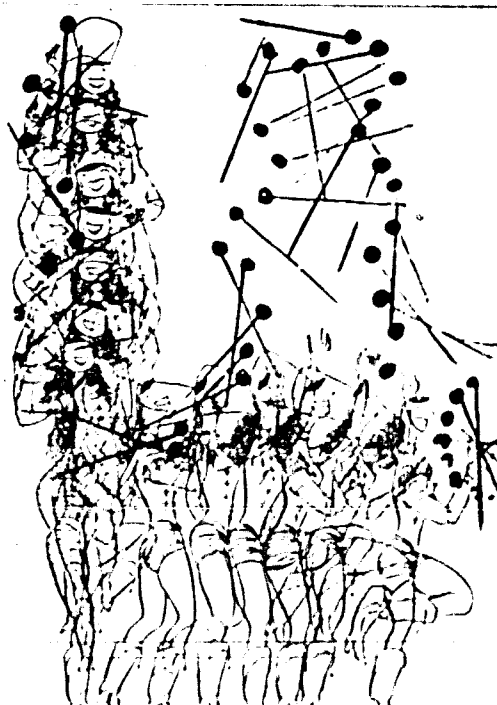
In closing, the rooting section gave it all that they had from the start to the finish of the game. The Drag Net yell was tops.
