During a wide sphere of knowledge in the commercial field, Mrs. King should be a valuable attribute to the school's business department.

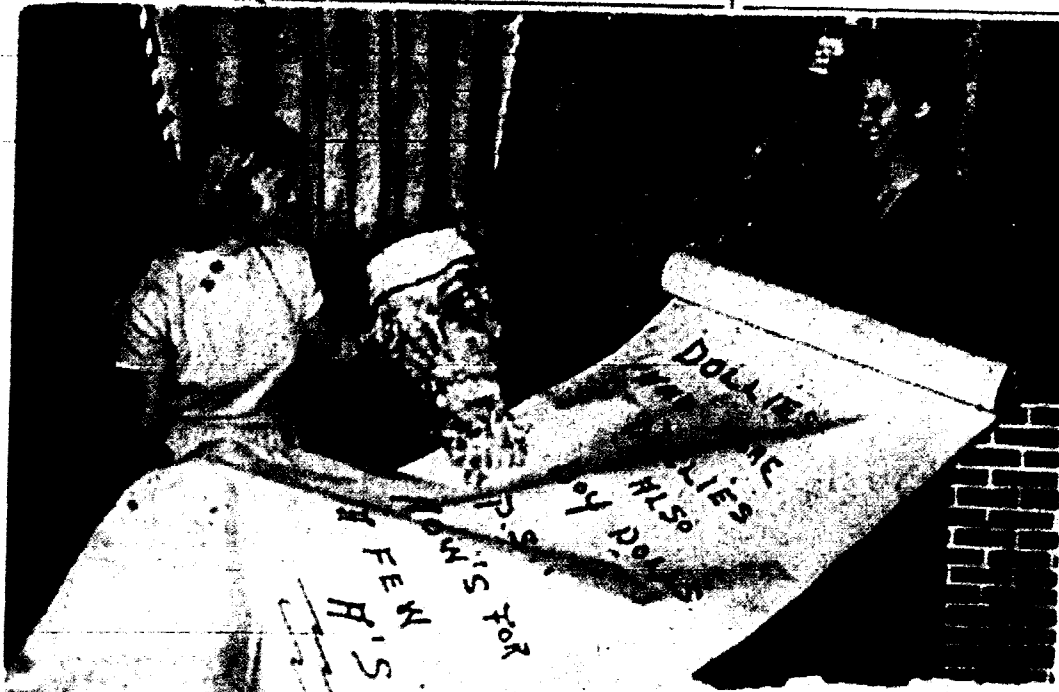

Behind 29-38 at the half the Bronco cagers of George Blankley poured 52 points through the hoop to post a brilliant 81-70 win over Northwest Nazarene college.

Big Jim Hill sparked the offensive drives with 24 points while Don Archer played outstanding ball and added 13 points to the score.

The win was the second for the Broncos. It also avenged an early 69-51 loss to NNC.

Broncs Slaughter Airmen

Coach George Blankley's Broncos opened their home campaign Tuesday night by whipping the Plainsmen from Mountain Home, 73-34.

Sparked by Jerry Hill and Elmer Filer, with 21 and 20 points respectively, the Orange and Blue had very little trouble winning its first game of the current season.

The Bronco hoopsters after slow first quarter which ended 18-18 caught fire to go ahead 30-14 at the half, paced mainly by jump shots of Filer.

Throughout the second half the Broncos continued to maintain a slight advantage over the airmen. The greatest lead until the final minutes of play was 11 points which occurred midway in the third period. However, Mountain Home continued to press the attack and were back only six points at the end of the third period.

It wasn't until the final minutes of the last quarter that the Bronco team finally took the game with a last minute scoring spree.
