### Polio Campaign Sets Goal of \$120

A booth was set up in the main hall, and posters showing a picture of Idaho's poster child, Debby. This work was done by the general chairmen, Roberta Wilson and Larry Smythe.

The goal for BJC this year is \$120, or approximately 20c per student. Roberta expressed the hope that all students would support this drive, and thanked those who did contribute.

This year emphasis will be placed on research to determine how effective Gamma Globulin is as a protective measure against polio.

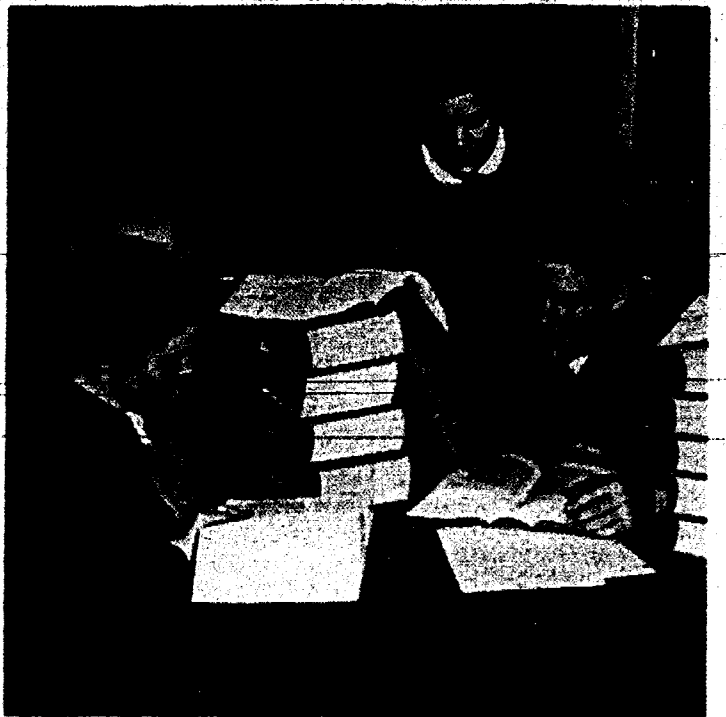
John Murdock, sale fund chairman, and Dick Ennis, IK duke, will be the chairmen for the sale of the tags.

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### Football Money Divided Up for BJC Clubs

The student executive board at its regular meeting last Thursday evening apportioned the concession money to those clubs who had helped to operate the stadium during the football season.

A total of \$16110 was divided among eight clubs. The eight clubs supplied a total of 287 workers for the season with the B-Cubes supplying 28.57% of the total. The I.K.'s supplied 27.18% of the workers, the Pi Sigs 22.63%, Valkyries 14.68%, IRC 4.14%, FTA 1.46%, Desert Club .68%, and the Newman Club .68%.

On the basis of these percentages the following clubs will receive checks for the following amounts: B-Cubes \$4676, I.K.'s \$1448, Pi Sigs \$4714, Valkyries \$2409, IRC \$679, FTA \$240, Desert club and Newman club each \$122.

ASB President Jerry Crandall pointed out that clubs were paid in the same proportion as to the number of workers from their organizations who turned out to help operate the stadium. This information should be passed on to the membership of the various clubs for next fall so they will know there is the opportunity to make money if they get their members out to work.

### Ski Club Opens Season at Bogus

With the full momentum of winter setting in, the Boise Junior College ski enthusiasts opened the year with a gigantic invitational ski slalom last Sunday at Bogus Basin.

Invited to the contest were Weber Junior College, Westminster College, Idaho State College, College of Idaho and Eastern Oregon College of Education. Weber was last year's champion of the Intermountain conference.

The Broncos managed to take a 9-0 lead early in the first period but it was melted away by the hot Vikings 25-20 at the end of the first period and the Broncos were never in the game after that.

In the first game, the Broncos put on a fourth period rally but again to no avail as the hot Vikings posted a 68-60 win. The Vikings led all the way but were being hard pressed by the Broncos in the fourth quarter.

Jim Hill and Max Going shared honors as each put 17 points through the hoop. Ricks' sharpshooter, Bryant Squibb, managed only one field goal but dunked 12 free throws.

This week the Broncos return home for a two game series with Westminster Parsons at the high school gym. The first game will be Friday night and the second a Saturday night affair. Following that the Broncos will travel to Utah for the regional basketball tourney.
