E. Power Biggs Concert Success

Wednesday evening, the Associated student body of Boise Junior College presented E. Power Biggs, noted organist, in concert in the auditorium.

Mr. Biggs presented numbers by George Frederick Handel, Franz Joseph Haydn, Antonio Soler, Johann Sebastian Bach, Robert Schumann, Jehan Alain and Marcel Dupre. All numbers on his program have been recorded by Mr. Biggs on Columbia records.

Several of the numbers presented have been played by Griffith Bratt of the BJC faculty on the weekly organ concert over KDSH. These were "Suite for a Musical Clock," by Haydn; "Fantasia and Fugue in G Minor," by Bach, and "Sketch in D flat" and "Canon in B minor," by Schumann. Mr. Bratt has also played other pieces by every other composer on the program with the exception of Alain.

Mr. Biggs has been called the most popular organist in his class of music in the United States today.
