Last Thursday night the Broncos took a firm hold on second place in the Intermountain basketball conference by downing the Westminster Parsons 59-57. The BJC quintet trailed throughout the first three periods of play but gained the upper hand in the fourth quarter and put the game on ice by stalling out the last three and a half minutes of play. Mel Pfost, high point man for the Broncos with 15 points, sparked the BJC play. Friday night the Broncos closed

their regular basketball season by dumping the Parsons 67-57. The Westminster crew held the lead during the first few minutes of play but then lost out as the Broncos began to roll behind the shooting of Max Goin and Jim and Jerry Hill.

The win left BJC with a 7-5 conference record and a 13-9 season record. High point men for the Parsons were Ray Buhler and John Prokopis.

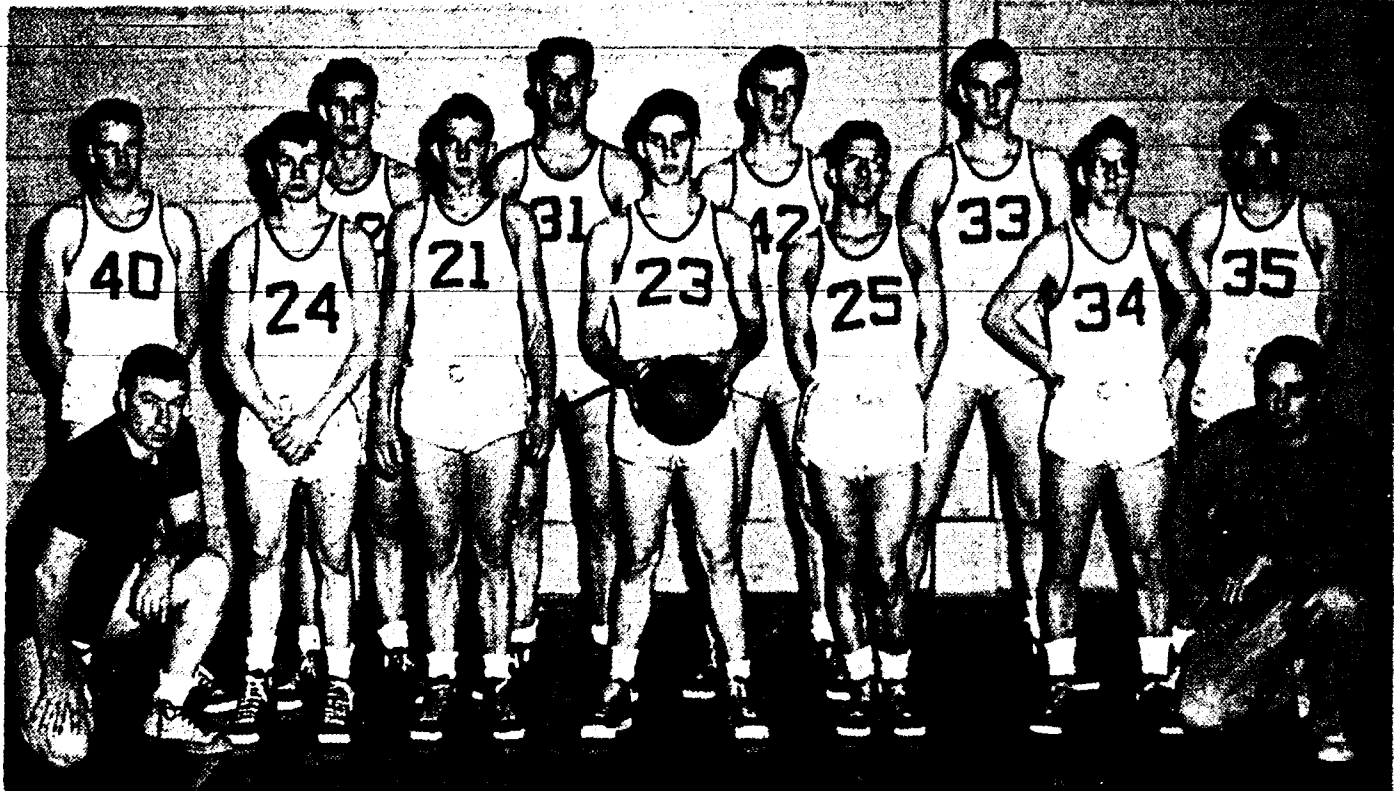
