### Dr. Krout To Speak At BJC Assembly

As a part of the nation-wide program for the observance honoring the 200th anniversary of the founding of Columbia University, Dr. John A. Krout, vice-president of Columbia, will appear at Boise Junior College in the auditorium tomorrow at 9:45 a.m. He will speak on the theme of the observance, "Man's Right to Knowledge and the Free Use Thereof." Dr. Krout has been associated with Columbia as instructor, assistant professor, associate professor, professor and executive officer since 1922. He is the author of "Origins of Prohibition," 1925; "Approaches to Social History," 1927; "The Completion of Independence," 1941, and others. The observance of the bicentennial of the founding of Columbia is officially begun on January 1 and will extend throughout the year, closing on December 26 with a radio talk by scientist J. Robert Oppenheimer. The theme has been adopted this year for the Borah conference.

### McCann Is Granted Leave of Absence

Lester McCann of the BJC faculty, has been given a leave of absence from the school so that he can accept an instructorship at the University of Utah, where he hopes to earn his Ph.D. degree. Mr. McCann will leave within the next few weeks to begin the spring quarter there. He will remain there during the fall quarter, after which he will return to Boise. During Mr. McCann's absence Mr. Jack Wilson, a former BJC student, will take his place. Mr. Wilson received his bachelor of science degree at Oregon State and has taken graduate courses at the same institution.
