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C Freshman Wins

Carl Obenchain, BJC freshman, received a copy of the "Handbook of Chemistry and Physics" for having achieved the highest grade average in general chemistry during the first semester.

Dr. J. B. Spulnik, head of the department, who made the presentation Friday for the Chemical Publishing company, said the cover of the book is imprinted with the following: "Achievement award for first term 1953-54 freshman chemistry, Boise Junior College."

"This is the first time such an award has been received by the chemistry department," said Dr. Spulnik, "and we were most happy to be able to award it to Carl Obenchain, whose grade average in chemistry for the first semester was 95%."

Obenchain is taking a course that will lead to a degree in chemical engineering.

Francisca Egurrola Arrives from Spain

When you have lived under conditions where your very thinking is controlled and your actions dictated, and you have tried for six years to leave that country and come to the United States, and when all your efforts have been in vain, you are bound to feel like you have dreamed of a flight on a magic carpet when you finally arrive by plane.

Such was the experience of Miss Francisca Egurrola, who arrived last Thursday evening after three days of traveling.

Through the efforts of the Boise Junior college exchange-visitor program and the able assistance of Senator Herman Welker, she has reached our campus and will take up residence in Morrison hall. Her program of study will include English and American history. She will assist the Spanish department by conducting practical conversation hours with the advanced students. Those registered in Spanish 12 will each have a complete hour with Miss Egur-

rola and they will not be limited to working entirely in the classroom.

Miss Egurrola speaks the Castilian type of Spanish which varies from that used in the western hemisphere principally in the pronunciation of the "c" and "z". It is a soft type of Spanish and very musical.

Students now have the opportunity to hear spoken Spanish from various areas, including El Salvador, Guatemala and Bolivia. Mexican influences were felt when Silverio Ruiz was on the campus the past two years.

Besides doing conversation work with the students, Miss Egurrola will record many of the Basque legends and stories because she speaks that language as well as the Spanish. These recordings will be made in Spanish, Basque and English and will be kept for reference. Cooperation with the English department will result in a collection of Basque materials.

Parakeets Are Hobby For Freshman Girl

"Raising parakeets can be a lot of fun . . . and work," says Karen Ferre of BJC. Karen first became interested in raising and selling the beautifully colored birds when her family purchased a pair for pets. They now have about 50 adult birds.

Karen bought a bird aviary from a friend when she began her hobby. One pair of parakeets have four or five young at a time. In caring for them, she has made nests two inches across, with a panel to serve the double purpose of keeping the baby birds warm and keeping the parents from sitting on them.

One corner of the Ferre garage is reserved for the parakeets, where the temperature is kept at about 45 degrees. When the babies are six weeks old, they are put in a separate cage to be sold. Karen has birds of a variety of colors, which sell for \$7.95 each.

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BJC Cataloger Finds Book of Maps In Rockwell Collection

Leroy Hewlett, BJC cataloger, announced last week that he had found in the Rockwell collection a book of maps contemporaneous with the Revolutionary war. The book also contains a list of subscribers to John Marshall's "Life of George Washington" (1807).

Two clues were discovered in Albert J. Beveridge's "Life of John Marshall" volume three; the name "T. Jefferson, P.U.S." and the name "John C. Calhoun." Jefferson's name elsewhere is not simply spelled with "T" nor is Calhoun's name spelled "John" instead of with the "J".

The discovery was made while cataloging books in the Rockwell collection that was given to the college in 1944 by Senator Irvin E. Rockwell in memory of his wife, Lallah Rookh Rockwell. There were 1516 volumes in the collection and the Lincoln group constituted the largest single unit.

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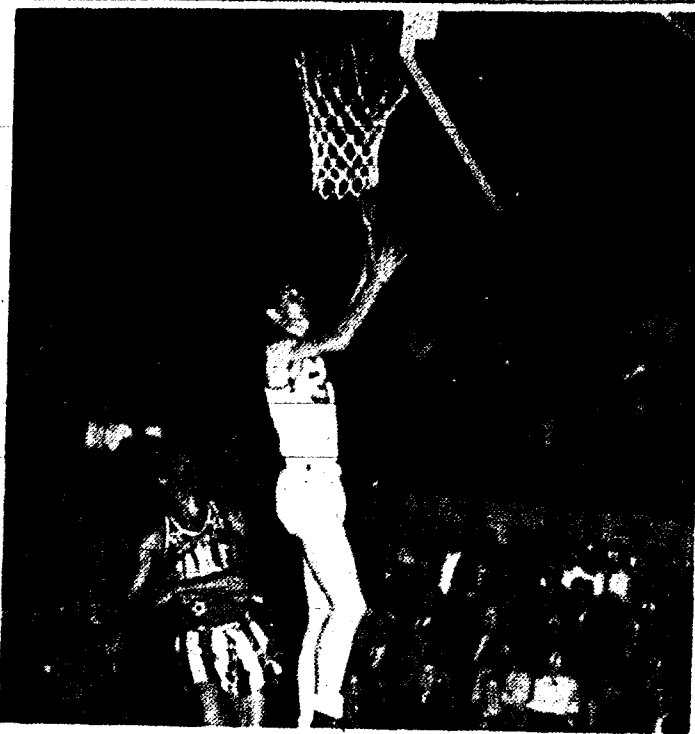

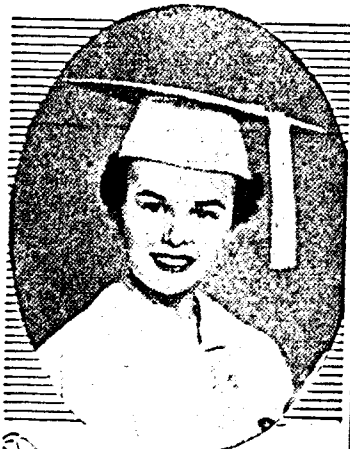
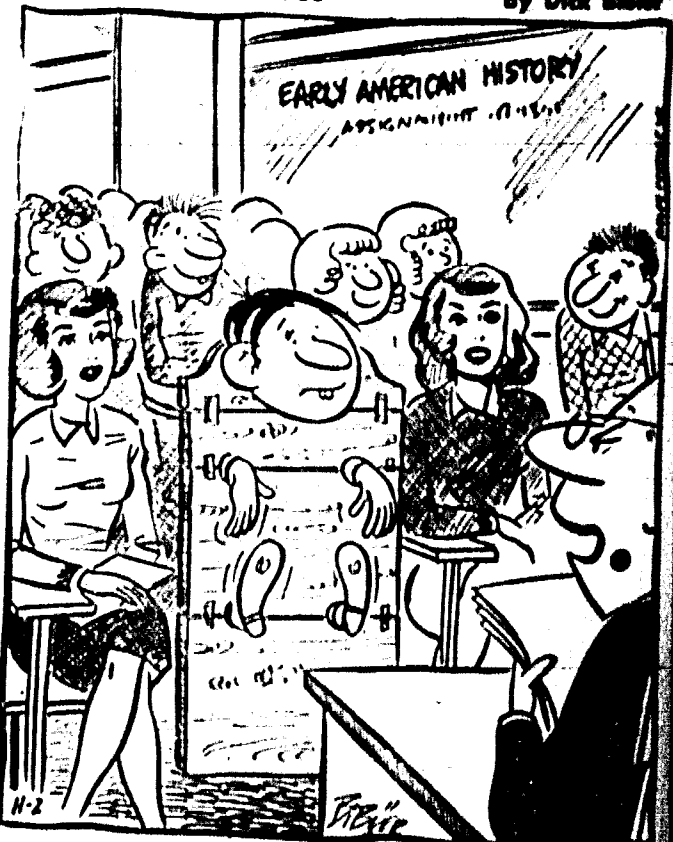
