President Chaffee returned Sunday, March 21, from a 16-day trip that took him to St. Louis and Chicago. He left the fifth of March to attend the annual meeting of the American Association of Junior Colleges, at St. Louis.

President Chaffee is the former president of this association and now chairman of the constitutional revision committee.

The next week was spent visiting 17 colleges and universities between St. Louis and Chicago. A tour was to inspect new science buildings and gymnasiums that have been recently completed, see any new developments in the field of building. President Chaffee stated that he saw buildings that cost as little as \$200,000 and as much as \$2,000,000.

He arrived in Chicago the 19th for the meeting of the "National Commission of Accrediting." This is the organization that sets up accreditation for all colleges and universities in the United States.

President Chaffee represented the northwest at this conference.
