Heading the list were such former high school stars as Howard Koppel, Jim Reed, Phil Bailey, followed closely by Glen Seibel, Bob Robbins, Bob Baxter, Bob Hamilton, Gordon Kinney, Nash Baranaga, and Bill Brassfield, according to ratings at the beginning of the season. The boys were coached by Dr. Donald Obee.

Despite the lack of early season intercollegiate competition, rugged matches were provided as a school ladder tournament was organized. Howard Koppel eventually beat Jim Reed for the title.

As the season progressed, the College of Idaho and the Northwest Nazarene College provided the competition, and 10 matches were played during the months of April and May.

Our scores with the Nampans were evened; Boise lost three games, and won three.

B.J.C. tennis men were not so fortunate in their first game of the season with the College of Idaho men.
