## Nine Coeds to Compete for Miss BJC Title Saturday Night; Array of Talent, Beauty Being Rehearsed for 2nd Pageant

The second annual Miss BJC Pageant "Younger Than Springtime" will present nine coeds in competition for the 1965 crown on Saturday at 8 p.m. in the gymnasium. The pageant, co-sponsored by Golden Z's and the Intercollegiate Knights, will feature talent, evening gown, and swimsuit division judging, with emphasis on the talent selections.

Linda Lee Anderson, of Morrison Hall, will give a dramatic reading of her prize-winning essay on Optimism for the talent competition. She graduated in three years from a private high school in Portugal and fifty traveling among her hobbies. She is a blue-eyed blonde, stands 5'4" tall, she is a Valkyrie pledge, and is an amateur snow skier, chess, children, dogs, water skiing, cooking, people, and horseback riding. She will continue her education in Idaho. Her measurements are 37-24-36.

The winner will represent BJC in the Miss Idaho contest in June, the preliminary to the annual Miss America contest in Atlantic City. Final preparations and dress rehearsals are now under way for the Misses Virginia Wilkerson,

She was a member of band and choir in high school and not only has twirled for bands since 1957 but has taught twirling for the past two years, and is a member of the national baton twirling association. Virginia Wilkerson, an honor student and Phi Theta Kappa member, has chosen her vocal piece, Schubert's Impromptu, Opus 40 for piano talent. She also was a candidate for Homecoming Queen. She has had 10 years of piano instruction and is fond of all kinds of music. Standing tall at 5'8", Miss Wilkerson has a 36-24-36 figure and is a blue-eyed brunette. She is a veteran skier of Sun Valley and Idaho slopes and enjoys baking and cooking and reading. A member of Golden Z's, Miss Wilkerson is a psychology major and plans to attend the U of I next fall.
