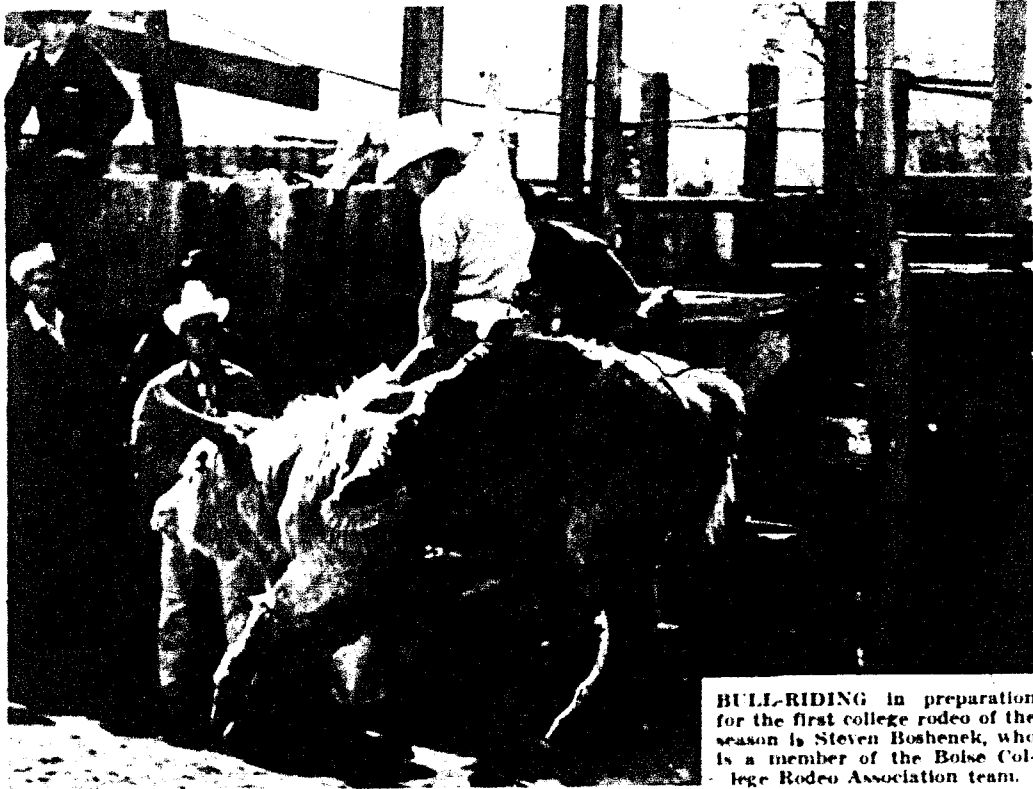

JUDO COMPETITION TO BE HELD IN GYM

The sixth annual Boise Capitol Judo tournament will be held in the Boise College gym on March 30.

The BC Judo team will represent the school in competition with groups from Ogden, Utah, Ontario, Oregon, Twin Falls, Nampa, and Caldwell. Divisions of competition will be according to age. They are Junior (under 12 years old), Intermediates (12-16), and Seniors (16 and over). Individual competition will start at 12 noon and continue until 2:30 p.m. They will be followed by team matches which will take place at 3:00 p.m.

There will be no admission charged. Lunches and refreshments will be sold at the competition.

The tournament will end with competition for the Grand Championship trophy to be awarded that evening.

Blackbelt Expert To Hold Demonstration

On Saturday, March 30, a fifth degree black belt karate expert, Master Tsutomu Ohshima, will visit the Boise School of Self Defense at 612 N. Orchard. Master Ohshima can justly be called the "Father of American Karate." He was the first to not only teach organized classes of karate in the United States, but also to establish the first university karate club in this country.

Born in Nagasaki, Japan, in 1930, Ohshima was a top student under the founder of Japanese karate, Master Funakoshi, and the Master promoted him to the third dan, black belt. Ohshima was later

Foreign Languages Festival Set Mar. 30

The Foreign Language Festival is slated for March 30 with three colleges participating. They are the College of Idaho, handling the French program, the Northwest Nazarene College taking the German program, and Boise College playing host to the Spanish program. Students from the various high schools and junior highs in this area will be attending the festival with about 350 expected at Boise College.

At BC the visiting students will be sampling bits of the Spanish and Latin-American culture. The students will also be testing their proficiency in the Spanish language in a series of tests given in the morning. These tests will be divided in four areas: listening, speaking, reading and writing. Each student will participate in only the areas they wish and the tests will be given at three levels, ranging from the beginning student to the more proficient. For the students not participating in a test, films, artifacts, displays and music will be presented in the Liberal Arts building, where the festival will be held. In the afternoon an assembly will be held in the auditorium. At the assembly, awards for the tests will be given, followed by skits which will be given by some of the visiting schools.

The Boise College Spanish students play an important part in the success of the festival. These students not only help plan and decorate for the festival, but they will also play hosts. In addition, the students will represent a Latin-American country or Spanish province and must be prepared to answer questions on their country. The chairman of the festival is Sr. Luis Valverde, head of the foreign language department at BC.

PERFORMANCE NEARS FOR STUDENTS CAST IN SHAKESPEAREAN CLASSIC

Beginning April 17 and 18, with invited performances and ending with five additional public showings April 19-21 and 23-24, the Boise College Drama department, under the direction of Robert Dewey, will present Shakespeare's immortal "A Midsummer Night's Dream." Assistant director for the classic is student Maridee Hill.

Rehearsals are proceeding fine, according to Dewey, yet the cast is in need of a small dog, one comparable to the spaniel breed, for use in the final scene of the play. Robert Dewey expressed the fact that the dog needs to be well-mannered and gentle enough to behave on a stage before an audience.

Performances will begin each scheduled evening at 8:15, lasting for two hours with an intermission part way through the presentation. Admission at the door will be \$1.50 for adults, 75c for high school students with their activity tickets, and Boise College students will be admitted free with their college ID's.

Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream" was a signal triumph. Designed primarily, perhaps, as a masque (a type of aristocratic dramatic entertainment popular in the 16th and 17th centuries; usually based on a mythical or allegorical theme) for a courtly wedding, the play is in actuality a composition based on romance and reality.

The Boise College production of the English masterpiece will include comedy, dancing, and singing as well as exciting fight scenes. The 130-seat auditorium places the audience almost upon the stage with the actors.

CINDERMEN BLAST NNC AND C OF I AT CALDWELL MEET

Coach Ray Lewis's Bronco track team opened the 1968 cinder campaign by dumping Northwest Nazarene and the College of Idaho in a relay meet at the C of I oval Wednesday, March 20.

NNC came in a relatively distant second, with C of I close behind in third. BC rolled up 25 points by grabbing three firsts and clocking some impressive times.

The team of Buzz Renn, Jim Owsley, Bob Packer and Doug Ward picked up wins in the 440 relay with a time of :44.5, and in the 880 relay with a recorded winning time of 1:32.

The Broncos also showed a fine second-place effort in the sprint medley relay as Al McPherson finished his anchor leg in 2:02, right behind NNC distance ace Hal Perkins. The Broncos clocked a 11:00.7 time for the event.

BC's mile relay quartet — Jim Owsley, Dave Rolfe, Doug Ward and John Kaufmann — climaxed the meet by speeding to a 3:28.1 time, just two seconds slower than the Broncos' winning NJCAA team ran it last season.

Coach Lewis has rescheduled the Broncos' next meet (at NNC) for Friday, March 29.

Boise Broncos Finish Tenth at Nationals

The Boise College Broncos finished in tenth place in the NJCAA tourney in Hutchinson, Kan., with a 66-64 win over St. Louis (Mo.) Baptist and a decisive 85-68 loss to Iowa Central College of Fort Dodge.

In the St. Louis Baptist contest March 21, the Broncos and the Baptists fought it out in the first half and the Boise crew led 35-24 at that point. The Broncos continued to widen the margin in the second period, and with 8:37 to play, Boise led 54-36. Then Wendy Hart left the game by the foul route and the Baptists made it 62-all with 4:22 left. Boise then pulled the game out of the fire and won 66-64.

In the Iowa Central clash, the Broncos held their own for six minutes and the score was knotted at 10-all. Then the Broncos turned cold in both shooting and rebounding and the Panthers out-scored Boise 17-5. At the half, the Iowa team led, 44-28.

Late in the contest, Boise closed to within 11 points in the absence of the Iowa regulars. However,

the regulars returned and Iowa Central won the game, 85-68.

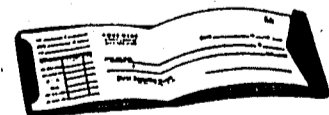
